
### PATRONAL FESTIVAL


attending with the Friends of Becket Keys hosting the event.

After getting knocked out of the cricket cup to Boswells, who have made it through to the MESSSA final, we are now touring some of the local schools to see how we get on in friendlies.

All of a sudden we were on the back foot. Finley came in and swung viciously but to no avail and it was unlucky that when he played a defensive shot the ball hit the stumps. Tom Walker and Tom Burkert put on a fantastic partnership, with both batters having to retire on 30 runs. Oscar, Joe and Alex all collected runs too. Our total was 113, which is a Becket Keys record. Hopefully, one that can be broken again soon. Bowling wise, we were a little less consistent compared to our figures against Boswells. However, tidy bowling from Tom Walker and

## DISTRICT ATHLETICS

On Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> June Year 7 and 8 students travelled to the Brentwood School to take part in the Brentwood district sports. The weather was perfect, sunny with some cloud to provide shade. For some students it was their first experience of district sports and they represented the school with their best performances.

Notable girls' performances came from Farran Deal who reached the finals of the 75m hurdles after only learning the event very recently. Uchechi Nze and Tobe Uchelgbokwe both reached the finals of the 200m and narrowly came 4th place in their respective races. Grace Burrell had a great race in the 1500m and came 2nd only being beaten by 1 second! Divine Okwuosa came 4th place in the high jump after working hard during training for the past couple of months.

In the boys' competitions Jesse Agunsoye's training at his athletics club paid off and he came 3<sup>rd</sup> in the 200m and 2<sup>nd</sup> in the triple jump, earning him 2 medals. Tom walker was one of 2 students to gain a gold medal from Becket Keys with a fantastic throw of 26.48 m in the discus. Jack Buckland was the other gold medallist with a win the long jump. Daniel Ogunleye had an excellent performance

in track and field coming 2<sup>nd</sup> in both the 800m and the high jump. A closely contested Year 8 boys' 800m race saw Brandon Wood and Alex Savage come within 0.04 seconds of each other to finish 3<sup>rd</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> respectively. Finally the Year 8 boys' 4 x 100m runners came 3<sup>rd</sup> overall. This achievement helped the Year 8 boys to an overall placement of 4<sup>th</sup>.

### THE WORLD IS WATCHING SYRIA Written by Peter Angeli (Year 7)

Most people find the situation in Syria hard to understand but don't worry, it's nothing to be ashamed of! We have managed to find a way to explain this to you as our readers. We hope you get a better understanding of this crisis.

Countries around the world are trying to figure out what, if anything, to do about the situation in Syria. The Middle Eastern country has been waging a civil war since 2011. That's when Syrians began to protest against the country's 13year-president, Bashar al-Assad. Instead of listening to the people's call for better living conditions, al-Assad and his supporters fought violently against the protesters. The two groups have been fighting ever since. On Aug. 21 many people were hurt or killed in an attack by al-Assad and his government forces; the deaths appear to have been due to "chemical weapons." There are reports that put the number of people killed by the chemicals at more than 1,400. Many countries, including the U.S. and Canada, are condemning (putting down) Syria's government because it used the deadly chemicals against thousands of its own people. The United Nations has also condemned Syria's use of chemical weapons. Chemical weapons are not considered acceptable by most countries in the world. The United States wants to do something more than just use words to punish al-Assad; they are still trying to

figure out what action they may take against Syria's government and al-Assad.

In the meantime, there are many questions surrounding the situation in Syria. For one thing, Assad denies using chemical weapons. Doctors who treated the people who had been attacked, however, say a chemical weapon was definitely used. Proving that it was al-Assad, however, "is not a slam-dunk," according to some members of the military quoted in the New York Times newspaper. The United Nations recently sent weapons inspectors into the country; they will write a report on what they found.

Other issues include what, specifically, should be done to punish al-Assad and prevent further attacks; and whether countries such as Canada should help the U.S. do something. Canada's Prime Minister, Stephen Harper, said Canada supports the U.S. but will not send troops to Syria. The situation in Syria is complicated and difficult, but the world is reluctant to turn a blind eye to what is happening there.
