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
FINAL WEEK CELEBRATIONS!

During the day, students worked through various activities which related to the world of work and the realities of earnings and outgoings. Students were led towards thinking through important life choices and the potential impact on future opportunities and options. On Tuesday, we welcomed Bishop Norman Banks (Bishop of Richborough) to present the prizes at our Governors' Speech and Awards Evening.

Families joined students, staff and governors at this prestigious evening. Bishop Norman began the evening by consecrating our new altar table with holy water and oil. He then gave his speech about Captain Charlie Plumb and his famous 'pack your parachute' story. The public speaking team followed this with their speech about Iqbal Masih, the Pakistani martyr.

Awards were given for each subject and for progress and attainment across all of the curriculum. The most important awards were given for character and a new award was given for the first time in memory of Dave Warriner.

Head Teacher's Challenge

Students were challenged by Mr Scott– Evans in the final collective worship of the year to press on with completing as much of the Head Teacher's Challenge as possible by the end of the summer holiday.

Mr Scott-Evans said: "My Challenge is one which should enhance character. It is full of things which can make you a better and stronger person. The most successful students here tend to be those who will rise to this challenge. I look forward to seeing how much you will have completed by the end of the summer holiday. You will learn a lot about yourself through this process! It's also good fun!"

Year 7s should give some money to charity as part of their challenge. It would be good if as many as possible would choose to do this by giving to our on-going school charity: 'Lend with Care' (LwC). Student-raised funds have been put into a LwC account. People in developing countries who need financial support to start a small business, so that they can become selfsufficient, can apply to have a loan from us via the LwC website. They pay the loan back to us over a number of months. As the money is paid back, the school then chooses someone else to invest in.

We would like to increase the amount of money that we can loan out from this account and therefore we are asking students to consider doing ONE thing over the holiday that they could earn money from. They can donate this to charity once back at school. Examples of what they might do include: wash and clean a car for a donation; make and sell cakes to

neighbours and friends; do some gardening; donate part of their pocket money. All donations should be brought in on the first week back in envelopes marked: 'Lend with Care'.

SPORTS DAY

We were extremely lucky to be able to host our Sports Day on a beautiful sunny day this week. The site and PE team came in early to set up all of the equipment and facilities and students arrived at school excited and prepared for their events. Mr Fenn and Miss Honey took a selection of students across to Brentwood School during period one, where they competed at the long jump and triple jump. In Year 8, Jesse Agunsoye and Shona Olulode won the triple jump; Astrid Mullan and Brandon Wood won the long jump. In Year 7, Rachael Davison and James Jackson won the triple jump while loss Wooden and Ban Gapper was the long jump.

After break, the main event started on the field. Students sat in their houses ready to support their team. In the middle of the track, field events began, with athletes attempting their best throws at javelin and shotput. Meanwhile, the heats of the sprint races took place on the track. This proved to be a very competitive session with an excellent atmosphere created with support from students, staff and parents. The longer distance races followed.



They were a somewhat challenging task in the heat, but all participants gave maximum effort and tried their best to gain vital house points! Grace Burrell and Luke Savage both set new records for the Year 7 1500m race – congratulations!

Both Year 7 and Year 8 form groups selected students for the Tug of War – a highly competitive and fun event that really got the crowd cheering. In Year 7, 'Ennis and Whitehead' proved victorious while in Year 8, 'Ainsley and Cockcroft' dominated to take maximum points!

After an exciting morning of events, the staff stepped up to complete the cross country course in the sweltering heat at the start of lunchtime. Students had been donating money all week for staff to run and they had raised enough money for Mr Wray, Mr Conway, Miss Webb, Miss Whykes, Mrs Cavalier, Mr Fenn, Mrs Alhner, Miss Rounding, Mrs Rowan and Mr Scott–Evans to compete. Mr Wray took an early lead, with Mr Fenn, and Miss Webb trying to keep up! However, Mr Conway started to creep forwards and increase his pace, and had overtaken everyone except Mr Wray by the half–

way point. However, Mr Conway kept getting faster and overtook Mr Wray to take the lead and finish in first place! Close behind in second place came Mr Wray, in third came Mr Fenn, fourth was Miss Webb, with Miss Rounding finishing fifth. Well done to all staff who took part and for the students who raised £140 for the event.

After a busy lunch of cross country and high jump, everyone headed back to the field. Students competed in the discus and 'welly' throw in the middle of the track, while the sprint finals, relays and 'three legged races' occurred on the track.



Some particularly fantastic performances came from the following winners: Daniel Ogunleye (Year 7 – 100m and high jump); Tom Walker (Year 8 – discus and 100m), Tom Burkert and Jack White (Year 7 Javelin); Karise Gunner (Year 8 Javelin); Grace Duffy (Year 8 – discus); Uchechi Nze (Year 8 shotput and 200m); Moshope Omole (Year 7 100m); Rachael Davison (Year 7 triple jump); Owen Day (Year 7 discus); Jack Buckland (Year 7 200m).

Some notable performances in terms of **progress** came from Alex Evans (Year 8) who came second in the 200m final, Gracie Higgins who came second in the triple jump (Year 7), Hannah Bennett (Year 8) who won the 800m, Serena Spicer (Year 7) who came second in the girls' 100m and Cameron Heywood (Year 7) who came second in the boys' 200m final.



At the end of the day, all the results were collated and the final scores are below. It was fantastic that **every student who was able to compete did so;** this was vital as every finishing position was worth house points. All the individual results will be published and issued to parents on Monday via email with a special supplement photo page.
