SPORTS NEWS

District Athletics

Students and staff had a fantastic day at Melbourne Park last Wednesday. While we cannot mention everyone's performances in the newsletter, we would like to congratulate all athletes for taking part and competing! We also commend our students for their fantastic behaviour throughout the day.

Girls' District Athletics

Overall, our track performance was stronger than our field. In Year 7, Olivia Mullan performed fantastically, winning both her heat and the final of the 200m. Her time was 28.98 seconds and she was just a second over the record! Isla Bradley maintained her pace during the 1500m, finishing in 2nd place and achieving a silver medal with a time of 5.38 seconds. In Year 8, Grace Burrell set the pace in her 1500m race and confidently ran to win and take 1st place and a gold medal with a time of 5.37 seconds. In Year 9, Catherine Barker finished 4th in the 1500m with a time of 5.54 seconds. Both Farran Deal and Megan Johnson qualified from their heats to make the hurdles final and came 6th (Megan) and 11th (Farran). In the field events, Charlotte Todd (Javelin) and Grace Duffy (Discus) can 6th out of 12 in their throwing events. As a team the girls came 6th overall. The day was a great experience for the girls to compete at an athletics stadium and to be involved in such a big event with local schools.

Boys' District Athletics

Somto Okpalauka stole the show from the Year 7 boys' team, winning the long jump with a jump of 4.53m. He also qualified to the finals of the 100m, but unfortunately pulled a muscle and was unable to finish. David, who also qualified for the 100m final, ended up in 3rd place receiving bronze medal. There were some strong performances in the 1500m with Harry Howard and Jacob MacDonnell coming 2nd and 3rd respectively; both receiving medals and both setting personal bests.

In Year 8, Daniel Ogunleye qualified first in his heat for the 300m and won the final in 41.50 seconds. Luke Savage came 2nd in the 1500m setting a new personal best of 5m10s. Tom Burkert also performed well in the shot put, throwing 9.22m and coming 2nd.

In Year 9, Thomas Walker threw the discus 29.9m, winning the discus for a second year in a row. Jesse narrowly outperformed a student to come 2nd in the triple jump, with a new personal best (PB) of 11.06m. Brandon Wood jumped well in the long jump; 5.28m earned him a bronze medal. Alex Savage got a bronze medal in the 800m with a PB of 2m 23s. The proudest performance from the Year 9 boys was the 4x100m. Thomas Walker ran a strong bend, Billy Mead picked up the baton well and held his position, Jesse Agunsoye then ran a quick bend gaining on those in front and Brandon Wood took the baton home. The boys smashed their previous record by over 3 seconds to set a new PB and school record of 50.13 second. The boys think that with a smoother baton change they could have broken the 50 second barrier.

Well done to all who competed! It was great to see our school start to establish ourselves at a high profile event, particularly in the long distance and field events.

Year 7 District Rounders

The girls played in their first ever rally on Tuesday 23rd June. Understandable some of them were nervous! They focused as soon as the warm up started, with Miss Honey making sure they were all supporting each other in the field by backing up. During the first game the girls took a few balls to get their heads into the game. Due to some good hitting from Isla Bradley, the girls won their first game.

The second game was incredibly close, with Becket Keys fielding first. Some great decisions were made in the field to keep Brentwood Ursuline down to 8 rounders. During the batting, Becket Keys had a mini collapse with some of the girls making risky decisions and getting themselves out early on in the game. In a very close game, Becket Keys managed to win from the last ball! The A team's best performance was against Brentwood School, even though they lost. The girls managed some fantastic fielding displays, in particular from Olivia Mullan who caught out 3 Brentwood players in quick succession. We managed to get out 6 of Brentwood's 9 players! Becket Keys narrowly lost to Shenfield in the group stages by half a rounder, unfortunately meaning they came 3rd in their group behind Brentwood School Is and Shenfield Is. All in all, the girls had an excellent day and have come away with lots of positives and some things to work hard on for next year.

Year 7 B team

Anna Jackson bowled fantastically well all afternoon making the opposing batters afternoon a nightmare. Rosie Howse performed backstop duties well and used the quick pick up effectively to get several players out on first base. Beaux Hinwood-Young caught well on first base and Georgie Loader was fantastic in her catching but also in her decision making in and around second base. We adopted the 'gun fielding' tactic where Rosie was backstop and in charge of fourth base, third base was empty unless a close fielder stepped in for a run out and Georgie hovered between 1st and 2nd. This tactic was massively effective and helped us to win a couple of games, particularly a tight game between Brentwood County High School 'A' team.

Lola Webb, Rebecca Slaney and Abigail Carey were kept busy in the field and often retrieved the ball with speed and accuracy. With the bat, Evie Skinner hit a few lovely shots, as did Elizabeth Endicott, who was awarded the MVP (most valuable player). The girls enjoyed the afternoon and improved significantly throughout the afternoon as well. They look forward to training over the next few weeks and are all keen to raise their 'gun fielding' to even more effective levels.

Year 9 Rounders

The Year 9 team also had their district rounders rally this week. They played fantastically well. A few last minute changes to the team were made with Lily McDonald, Paige Parnell and Eloise Wilson stepping in. We arrived at St Martin's in good time, ensuring we had 10 minutes to sort out positions and warm up. Bethany Hancox (bowler), Uchechi Nze (backstop) and Lucy Uwins (first post) had several minutes to practise their routine in getting players out at first post and this was definitely worthwhile as we were able to use this effectively in matches. Charlotte Todd and Hannah McCarthy combined excellently to get players out at second and third. There were some great throws and long barriers in the deep field from Eden Hatch, Elisabeth Hayes, Elloise Wilson, Paige Parnell and Lily McDonald.

Each game was short with 18 good balls. In our first game against St Martin's 3s we won 6-3.5, we drew 3.5-3.5 Brentwood Ursuline, lost 5-2 against Shenfield, won 3.5-3 against Brentwood County High and lost 7-4.5 to St Martin's 2s. The girls played fantastically; the best they have all year and should be really proud of their performance.

Year 7 Boys' Cricket MESSA Cup Semi-Final

Becket Keys (89-8) beat Shenfield (79-3)

The Year 7 Boys Cricket team enjoyed a great win against Shenfield on Thursday evening in the MESSA Cup Semi-Final. Shenfield won the toss and put Becket Keys into bat. Becket Keys started well, scoring consistently against an accurate Shenfield bowling attack. Jasper Stuckey opened with Adam Sedgewick and the pair scored 17 and 21 respectively, including some fine batting shots along the way.

Becket Keys then needed to up the scoring midway through the innings, which they did, but inevitably whilst attempting some big shots, some wickets were lost. Will Davey scored a quick-fire 21 and Patrick Warriner a steady 11, but Becket Keys' rhythm was disrupted by timely wickets for Shenfield. Becket Keys finished on 89-8 after their 15 overs.

The team felt they could have scored more but they were still confident of defending their lead. Shenfield then started their run chase. Becket Keys were able to start fantastically well, with Patrick Warriner and Jasper Stuckey each picking up the wickets of the Shenfield opening pair for 0 and 1 respectively.

However, Shenfield then increased their run rate, with their number 3 batsman retiring on 26 and their number 4 finishing unbeaten on 13.

The biggest concern for Becket Keys at this point was the extras. The bowling attack conceded a few too many wide deliveries and byes, which added runs to Shenfield's score, without the batsmen really having to work.

This set up a tense finish, with Shenfield needing 14 from their final over. Will Davey was able to keep his discipline when bowling the final over, conceding just 3 runs and picking up a wicket. This included surviving the final ball drama when Shenfield were able to run 4 before being run out at the wicket keepers end!

Having reflected on the performance, the team are overjoyed and proud to get to the final. The boys are aware that there are improvements they can make, particularly in the field, but they are determined to put in their best performance in the final. Good luck boys!
