I'd also like to thank you for your cards and kind wishes for Christmas and say the same to each of you! Merry Christmas!





PRINCE'S TRUST XL PROGRAMME

This year, some of our Year 9 students have been participating in the Prince's Trust XL programme. This inspiring programme provides young people with the thinking space and attention they need to build confidence, as well as to form a sense of ownership over their learning and development. Jess Barry has written about her experience so far.



"Our unit has been about teamwork. In this unit we did memory games, characteristic hats, bridge building, tower building, desert island and lots more. We started this in Year 9 and the people who run it are the Prince's Trust, they help to give people the opportunity to learn in a different way. We work in C20 and are all learning about team roles and teamwork.

There are 8 of us in the XL Programme and our teacher is Mr Thorpe. All the tasks have helped with different parts of teamwork. When we did the bridge building we focused on team roles. The tower building taught us about the importance of clear goals. This worked because one group knew what to do (they had clear instructions) but the other didn't. The group with instructions built a bigger tower.

We all learnt about the advantages and disadvantages, team roles, and negative characteristics that affect a team. You definitely don't want negative teamwork characteristics in a team. We worked together in all of the activities and are now very confident at working in a team.

I am not the only one to have positive comments to make, "It has been a fun, exciting and new experience and I'm looking forward to the next unit." (Freddie Mattock).

I would love to move on to Participating in Sport as the next unit because that sounds fun, and it would be good to do something different. I would try Customer Service as a different option because this can help with our social skills and we have not done something like that before; it would be enjoyable".

YEAR 8 GIRLS' BASKETBALL

Essex Cup – GBHS vs BKS (23-22, after over-time)

The Year 8 girls' Essex Cup Basketball team were involved in an extremely competitive game against Great Baddow High School. Becket Keys started the game slowly, with Great Baddow taking a lead and keeping it until half-time. The girls' defensive work kicked in in the third quarter, where they made a few stops on the defensive end.

The girls were then able to add offensive creativity in the fourth quarter, to come back from 22-16 down to draw level. Neither team were able to score for the remainder of the quarter, taking the game to over-time. After 5 minutes, the only points scored were from a single free-throw from Great Baddow to win the game, despite a number of chances at both ends of the court for both teams. The girls were disappointed to get their Essex Cup campaign off with a loss but they can take confidence from knowing they ran a strong team with a victory very close.

Mid-Essex Development League BKS vs St Martins

A new team of Year 8 girls went up against St Martins in a basketball development league game. The girls competed well, moving the ball quickly on the offensive end and adjusting well to a new defensive system. The girls worked hard to create lay-up opportunities, which they did well, but could not take enough of them to stay close to a strong St Martins' team who were able to take their chances clinically. The girls enjoyed the experience, progressed well and learnt a great amount from the game. They hope to continue this progress throughout the season.

Essex Cup Competition vs Billericay

The Year 8 girls' team enjoyed their game against Billericay in the prestigious Essex Cup competition. Billericay started the game strongly and were clinical in their shooting early on. This put Becket Keys on the back-foot as they adjusted to their defensive system. Becket Keys did not give up and persevered with their system, which paid off in the second half. The speed of their passing increased and, as a result, Becket were able to take more lay-up opportunities. The girls played well overall, but needed to be more clinical around the basket on both ends of the court. Billericay had a similar number of shots, but scored considerably more points. The girls have one more game against Eastwood Academy, which they are looking forward to.
