## **Hold Nothing Back!**

#### Mr Scott-Evans writes

Shaquille (Shaq) O'Neal was 17 when he heard the words which changed his life.

If you do not know who Shaq is then you would be in good company – several teachers had never heard of him when I spoke about him this week in Collective Worship! Therefore, for those who don't know, he is one of the most successful and admired basketball players ever! He was the most valuable and most effective player in the NBA for several years. Google him!

Anyway, he very nearly did not reach his potential or even come close. At 17 his life changed.

At 17 he went to a summer basketball camp and finally came across other players who were

better than him! He had never experienced this before! It knocked his confidence; he had always been the best and did not know how to cope.

I see this with students here all the time. Year 7s who used to be "the best" at Primary School come here and find the competition is a lot more fierce. I see it with Year 10s and 11s who have taken it easy for a couple of terms and suddenly students who were supposed to be below them are taking over and moving ahead of them. Even those who are working hard and doing all they can seem to find it incredibly demotivating when others come past them. Why does it happen? There are reasons. I have three simple tips to help counter them. But first: Shaquille O'Neal.

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Help us break the record for the amount of shoeboxes sent.

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Shaq told his mother that he was going to take a break from basketball and come back to it later. His mother then said the words that totally changed his life. She said: "Later doesn't come to everybody." And that snapped him back into reality and gave him a plan.

Shaquille says: "You work hard now. You don't wait. If you're lazy or you sit back and don't want to excel, you'll get nothing. If you work hard enough, you'll be given what you deserve."

I am sure you can see why I have been telling this story in school this week. I've told it alongside the story from Mark's Gospel about the widow who gave all she had into the treasury. I've been looking at the rewards we can expect to reap if we give our all. Shaquille made a conscious decision to give everything. And he reaped the rewards.

It is clear that he made a decision to excel. He recognised that you get what you deserve. Very few of us can be Shaquille O'Neal, but we can choose to excel. As Bill Shankly once said: "If I became a bin man tomorrow; I'd be the best bin man who ever lived." Excellence is a choice.

I have been challenging students to think about what they are spending their time on and what they want to excel in. 'You get what you deserve.'

I have been seeing a few students flipping plastic bottles of water onto walls and picnic benches recently. This is a craze going round which some of our younger students are enjoying. Some of them are getting very good at it – their practice is paying off. They will get what they deserve, namely, an uncanny knack of being able to throw a bottle and make it land on its bottom. Well done!

However, if they looked around them they would see other students practising other skills which will be more valuable: acting in the school play, performing with school choir/orchestra, playing for our many sports teams; collecting money for charity, fixing computers and learning new skills or simply practising Spanish in readiness for the oral exams.

Each one will get what they deserve!

I spoke to the students about the widow who gave the very little she had, but she gave it all. Sometimes there are students I see who feel poor, like they have little to offer. Perhaps that is why they are choosing to perfect bottle tossing—it is the first thing they've found that they can excel in!

All through my career I have tried to concentrate on things that students can ALL do, things that facilitate them in being able to give of their best. Three simple things all students can do which I guarantee will make a difference to their performance, progress and self-esteem are listed here.

 Push yourself to be presenting yourself and your books as well as you can. Get a bit better every day.

- 2. Get to lessons early every time don't be late. Don't miss a minute.
- 3. Make the most of every lesson, learn something every time. Don't get distracted and don't be a distraction.

Everyone can do these things, everyone can excel at these, and if you do: you will get what you deserve. It is our job as teachers to inspire them to give all they can.

Something or someone inspired that widow to give her all.

A few wise words from his mother inspired Shaquille.

Who will inspire your son or daughter? Will it be you? Will it be me? Will it be one of our teachers? Someone needs to do it! Maybe this week's newsletter is the breakthrough for someone. I live in hope!

The widow gave her all. Around her were the rich who gave out of their abundance. There is a stark warning here. Those who have so much are sometimes the most likely to hold something back. Hold nothing back! You'll get what you deserve!


## All Saints' Eucharist

## **BOYS**

Blazer: Black blazer with Becket Keys Logo

Trousers: Charcoal grey – not black or grey. Straight leg.

Shirt: plain white with stiff collar for wearing with a tie (short or long sleeved) – top button done up and shirt always tucked in. No polo or open necked shirts.

Socks: Plain grey or black.

Shoes: Traditional flat, black sensible leather shoes – lace up shoes to have black laces. No trainers or boots, no white or coloured laces. Lace up shoes preferable to Velcro. No sandals.

Jumper or slipover: Grey with purple stripes.

Tie: Worn to top of trousers.



## **GIRLS**

Blazer: Black blazer with Becket Keys Logo

Becket Keys Purple 'Warrior'
Tartan must be purchased from
SmartyPants. Skirt must be worn
no higher than 5cm above the
knee

Blouse: plain white revere collar – top button done up, no polo shirts

Socks: Plain white.

Tights: Plain/neutral or black tights, neutral trainer socks or no socks/tights at all.

Shoes: Traditional flat, black sensible leather shoes – lace up shoes to have black laces, no trainers or boots. Lace up shoes preferable to Velcro. No kitten heels, sandals, platform shoes, ballet pumps, white or coloured laces.

Jumper or slipover: Grey with purple stripes.

Now that the weather is getting colder please remember that all students will be in need of a **COAT** - Plain **BLACK** without coloured flashes, logos or slogans, no "fashion items", no "puffer" jackets

**JEWELLERY** - Medic alert chain, if necessary. Girls may wear one small silver or gold sleeper or stud in the lobe of each ear, but they must be removed for all PE lessons. It is not acceptable to put tape over the ears. No other jewellery or body piercings are allowed.

## How to pack a shoebox:

- 1. Get an empty medium sized shoebox, wrapping the lid and box separately in colourful wrapping paper. Attach the appropriate boy/girl label and the age category 2-4, 5-9 or 10-14 to the top of the shoebox.
- 2. Fill with a selection of gifts, fun toys, hygiene items and school supplies along with a 'wow' item such as a cuddly toy or deflated football and pump.
- 3. Make your shipping donation, online is best, you can then discover the destination of your box if you add the barcode supplied to the shoebox. Please donate £3 for each shoebox you send to cover the transportation

## **Gift Suggestions**

Something the child will immediately embrace like a cuddly toy, doll, skipping rope or a small puzzle.

Pens, pencils & sharpeners, crayons or felt pens, stamps & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks & paper, solar calculators, colouring & picture books etc.

Toothbrush and toothpaste, bars of wrapped soap, comb or hairbrush, flannel.

Hat, cap, gloves or scarf, sunglasses, hair accessories, jewellery set, wind up torch, wrapped sweets (best-before-date must be at least March of the following year).
