We are all pushed out of our comfort zone from time to time (see above!) The way in which we react to the opportunities that this can offer is the key to our success.

Everyone is familiar with the idea of a comfort zone. Many young people like the feeling of being in this zone (both in life and in their learning). This is where they feel confident and secure, so of course they like it here - it's easy. But when students are in the comfort

zone, they are not learning anything new. If children are getting everything right, if they can do everything correctly without much effort, how can they be learning?

Equally, if students are pushed too far out of their comfort zone they reach the 'panic zone'. We don't want children to be in the panic zone. This would happen if we ask students to do more than of what they are capable. Panic releases chemicals that stop children from learning.

Just outside of the comfort zone before hitting the panic zone - is the 'challenge zone'. This is where students don't feel overwhelmed but their brains are beginning to be stretched and challenged. The challenge zone is the place to be! It is where new learning takes place and children

Twiddlemuffs are a soft knitted muff with items attached so that a patient with dementia can twiddle them in their hands. They contain strands of textured ribbons, beads and various fabrics attached both inside and outside. People with dementia often have restless hands and like to have something to keep their hands occupied. It provides a wonderful source of visual, tactile and sensory stimulation whilst at the same time keeping hands snug and warm.

We are asking for any donations of the following items:

Buttons – different shapes, sizes and colours
Offcuts of ribbon, lace, fringing
Old bead necklaces, bracelets, earrings – anything that can be
threaded onto a needle and sewn on
Zips, small fastenings (metal or plastic)
Oddments of wool – particularly different thickness and textures
Needles size 6.5mm or old imperial size 3.




