#### Mr. Scott-Evans writes:

#### Making the Grade

Your son/daughter's reports use GCSE grades. Whichever year your son or daughter is in - you will see new RET grades based on the new 9 to 1 GCSE system. This change was made last year and gives all students a clearer route to GCSE success and a more accurate sense of 'where they are'. Year 10 and 11 students are now very familiar with this; Year 11 will be the final cohort to ever use the traditional A, B, C style gradings (and they are only left in two subjects: DT and Mandarin – so in fact most will not have any such grades at all). Year 10 are using 9 to 1 in all of their subjects.

It is impossible to 'convert' old national curriculum grades or old GCSE grades to the new system – they are simply not the same. It takes a lot more work to start to see where a student is against GCSE grades and they can fluctuate as they tackle different topics. For example, they might be excellent at algebra, but weaker in trigonometry.

I know for many parents, 9-1 is still a bit of a mystery so I have set out some 'signposts' here, which I hope will help:

- The highest grade possible is 9. This is reserved for the very 'best of the best' and it is extremely difficult to achieve. It is well above a traditional A\*.
- 2. The lowest GCSE pass grade is a 1, but we are introducing informal 'Bronze', 'Silver' and 'Gold' grades beneath this, for students who are not yet working at this level.

- 3. We would expect a student at the national average level to be starting in Year 7 at around Grade 1 on the GCSE scale, but many of our students are above the national average and so could be as high as a Grade 3. Lower ability students will be on Bronze, Silver or Gold.
- 4. We know students will move slowly through the grades (there is a big difference between a 2 and a 3) so we are using + and to show progress within a grade. For example, a student who started the year at a 3, may move to a 3+ and then to a 4-. This would be good progress within a year.
- 5. We are finding across the Russell Education Trust that it can be hard for students to move through the lower grades. Do not be too perturbed if your son/daughter stays on a Grade 2 or 3 for more than a year.
- 6. A Grade 5 is the new grade to aim for like the old 'C' Grade. However, the 5 is higher and harder to achieve than the 'C' was. Therefore, employers, universities and colleges are advised in some circumstances to accept a '4' as a low pass. This new

understanding will emerge over the next few years. At present, a 4 is 'good enough' to claim a pass in English and Mathematics and a student will not be required to resit it.

It is an exciting time to be a secondary school student. The exams are more challenging and more rigorous, however, they will deservedly gain more prestige as employers start to recognise the extra work that must be put in to achieve well with them.

Course work is being cut back and we are moving to a more exambased system. This does not suit every student; however, many argue that it is more reliable and a more 'level playing field'. In any case, standards must rise to meet the challenges of the new exam and using this new system we are well placed to ensure our students do that right from the first year in our school.

Year 10 and 11 students do not have long to adjust to the new exams. Rote learning key facts to remember in exams is an important skill again. Learning exam rubric and methods and how to apply learned knowledge to exam questions is essential. Students need to be revising regularly and reading back over previous notes. Parents can help by regularly testing students on what they have learned in previous terms. Our friends at 'Inner Drive' have written a useful Blog about effective revision

https://blog.innerdrive.co.uk/studies/4-the-one-about-spacing-your-learning. All Year 11s need to be aware of how they should be spacing their revision.

Another important skill for the new exams is proofreading. Students need to get into good habits; checking their work for capital letters, full stops, correct punctuation and spelling. Failure to get the basics right will lose students valuable marks. In some subjects, students will be 'stuck' at Grade 1 for a long time whilst they remember to put capital letters for proper nouns and at the start of sentences. Checking your son/daughter has proofread their homework and looking at it with them will help with this enormously. I have attached to the newsletter the RET 'Rainbow Checking Guide' - perhaps you could print this out and place near your son/daughter's work space at home.


# COMMIT TO SUCCEED

"Commit your work to the Lord, and then your plans will succeed" (Proverbs 16:3).

Proverbs, as a literary form, communicate general life principles and not exact promises. In other words, we can generally expect God to bless the things we do when we operate according to His ways in dependence upon Him. However, this does not mean we will always find things easy, whether preparing for exams or being successful in an interview. Instead, we can expect God to fulfil His promise of Romans 8:28, "We know that in



all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose."

This proverb is similar in context to Psalm 1:1–3:

"Blessed is the one who does not walk in step with the wicked

or stand in the way that sinners take

or sit in the company of mockers, but whose delight is in the law of the Lord,

and who meditates on his law day and night.

That person is like a tree planted by streams of water,

which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither whatever they do prospers."

When we commit our ways and our work to the Lord, He will bless our efforts according to His perfect will in ways beyond our understanding. We should serve the Lord faithfully and then leave

the results to Him. Though we will still face times of difficulty, we can trust that God is working for His ultimate good, and ours, through our efforts to please Him in our daily lives.

How can we commit our ways and our work to the Lord? Below are seven key ideas to apply every day, so that you can be a witness for God and receive His blessing:

**S**tart working enthusiastically.

Understand who you really work for.

Concentrate on building your character.

Care about the people you work with

Exceed what is expected of you


Expand Your Skills to SUCCEED


