**Exam Revision & Preparation** 



As the Lent holiday approaches and the second series of mock exams for Year 11 is looming on the horizon, I thought I would take this opportunity to write about exam revision and preparation.

I am pleased to report that the vast majority of Year 11 students are continuing to take their GCSE courses very seriously. There is a real air of purposefulness in Year 11 lessons and there are a good number of students staying in school after 3.10pm voluntarily to work on coursework or to do

revision. Students are also using the library at lunchtime to continue to work.

If your son or daughter is yet to begin a formal revision schedule, they should be doing this as a priority over the Lent holiday. Many Year 11 students have been invited to intervention sessions next week and students should be spending the rest of their time doing revision at home. course, Year 11 need some time to relax and unwind at home, but with carefully planned revision sessions, both will be possible. I always recommend that students should write down which topics they are revising and what specific activities they will do during revision sessions. Just writing 'English' is too vague and leads to revision lacking direction. Students also need to ensure that

Tips for revision planning:

- work out a revision timetable for each subject
- break revision time into small chunks - hour-long sessions with short breaks at the end of each session often work well
- make sure your child has all the essential books and materials
- condense notes onto postcards to act as revision prompts
- buy new stationery, highlighters and pens to make revision more interesting
- go through school notes with your child or listen while they revise a topic
- time your child's attempts at practice papers


#### **BRENTWOOD FUN RUN**

#### <u>Using Lent to focus on</u> <u>the Light</u>

Loving God, walk with me on this journey as I enter a time of reflection and prayer with you. Kneel with me in my humility as I acknowledge those times when I have lost sight of you. Welcoming God, embrace me with your open arms, as I find a space to call my own with you. Living God, open my eyes and my heart to you and guide me on the journey you wish

me to take. Amen.

During Lent, we enter into a season of preparation, self-reflection and repentance when we seek to literally 'turn around', realign our lives, and focus towards God. It is a time to give up things as well as take on new life-giving practices; helping us rid ourselves of our own selfish desires and distractions.

#### Revelation 3:20 reads:

'Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come and eat with him, and he with me.'

This reading always reminds me of the picture "The Light of the World" by Holman Hunt 1827-1910 (shown opposite) and a prayer my mother wrote about the impact this picture had on her spiritual wellbeing as a child:

Dear Father,

I thank you that this picture was in my life when I was so young and that this image has stayed with me ever since. No matter where I stand, your loving eyes are focused on me, reassuring me that you are always there.

The door has no latch, but I know that you can come through it into my heart, at any time. The door is a symbol of your call 'come into my world'. Some say that everything is overgrown around the door and

all is withering. What I saw as a child was the wonder of your world. Father, I thank you that whenever I look at or visualise it, I can still see that beauty and wonder.

The lamp you hold shows that you are the Light of the World. Thank you for your light.

Thank you for the times that I have found your light in my darkness, and that I know it never goes out.

I pray that you will continue to knock and come into my heart.

I pray that I will continue to move into your light.

I pray that I will never forget that you are journeying with me.

Your nail-pierced hands show me how much you love me.

Amen.

I hope that this image and this sense of light will help you focus on your Lenten journey. You may like to use these readings to help you focus on the Lent story:

MATTHEW 26-28

MARK 15-16

LUKE 22-24

JOHN 17-20

How will you use this precious time of lent? Will you do some spring-cleaning? During the Lent period, there will be opportunities to join others in preparation or you may feel that you would like to do something on your own. There is a variety of Lent resources available, at the Diocesan Center or online, that will guide you through this time.

Before we start our time with God, we pray to center ourselves, to be empty and ready to receive ('the usefulness of a pot comes from its emptiness' Lan Tzu).

Mother Theresa said:

"In the silence of the heart God speaks. If you face God in prayer and silence, God will speak to you. Then you will know that you are nothing. It is only when you realise your nothingness, your emptiness, that God can fill you with Himself. Souls of prayer are souls of great silence".

I cannot remember origin of this poem analysis, but I found it quite inspiring:

'Gerard Manley Hopkins has a wonderful poem, "The Wreck of the Deutschland," where he uses the phrase "Let him Easter in us." In this phrase, he uses the noun 'Easter' as a verb. Hopkins writes, "Let him Easter in us, be a dayspring to the dimness of us."

It is a splendid phrase. It is a beautiful prayer really, "Let him Easter in us." In fact, I think this is a great way to look at the truth, the transforming reality of Easter. Let Easter get into us. Let Easter come and live where we live. Let Easter permeate our souls. Let him Easter in us, and be a dayspring to the dimness of us. Is that not what we all desire most? Not Easter as a noun, about a long-ago event, but, rather, Easter as a verb, as something that transforms our

Let him easter in us, be a dayspring to the dimness in us, be a crimson, cresseted east!

present lives, as something that gives us new life now, as something that gives us hope and meaning and courage. Is that not what every human heart longs for? Let him Easter in us!'

So, let us pray that "God will Easter in us" I know that He listens to us all the time and He is ready to hear us when we pray in our hearts or out loud; when we

are seeking the light at Lent and generally in our lives.

With Chinese New Year fast approaching, Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> February saw the Becket Keys Year 7 students treated to a celebration of all things Chinese. During the day, no grain of rice was left unturned as students took part in an oriental carousel which took them on a dragon-like rollercoaster of Chinese cultural practices, culinary customs, and history.



At 8.30 the students congregated in the hall for a 'fake news'-themed presentation by our keynote speaker, Mrs. Webb of Benendon School, who had the students on the edge of their seats with a quasi-pantomime style hour of entertainment, wit and factual insight into Chinese

culture. Following the assembly, students dispersed towards their respective activities.



In Runcie Province, expert calligrapher Miss Wang, manager of the Essex Jiangsu Centre, led a masterclass in the art and history of Chinese writing. In the kitchens, our resident expert Mrs. Norman ensured students would not go hungry with a session on how to make tasty Chow Mein.

Chinese design and art with Ms. Cherry had students designing items of clothing with an oriental twist.



Mrs. Webb's classroom was an orchestra of scissors as students learned the delicate art of paper cutting.



In the science labs the gunpowder specialists Mr. Fenn, Mrs. Barden and Ms. Brown delivered an explosive education into one of China's most notorious inventions which one student described as 'mind blowing'.





For some, the main event of the day took place at lunchtime when students were transported east with an enchanting display of strength and rhythm as the Surrey Tai Chi Club performed a lion dance to the rumbling sound of Chinese drums.

#### **BOYS**

Blazer: Black blazer with Becket Keys Logo

Trousers: Charcoal grey – not black or grey. Straight leg.

Shirt: plain white with stiff collar for wearing with a tie (short or long sleeved) – top button done up and shirt always tucked in. No polo or open necked shirts.

Socks: Plain grey or black.

Shoes: Traditional flat, black sensible leather shoes – lace up shoes to have black laces. No trainers or boots, no white or coloured laces. Lace up shoes preferable to Velcro. No sandals.

Jumper or slipover: Grey with purple stripes.

Tie: Worn to top of trousers.



#### **GIRLS**

Blazer: Black blazer with Becket Keys Logo

Becket Keys purple "Warrior" tartan must be purchased from SmartyPants. Skirt must be worn no higher than 5cm above the knee.

Blouse: plain white **revere** collar – top button done up, no polo shirts.

Socks: Plain white

Tights: Plain/neutral or black tights, neutral trainer socks.

Shoes: Traditional flat, black sensible leather shoes – lace up shoes to have black laces, no trainers or boots. Lace up shoes preferable to Velcro. No kitten heels, sandals, platform shoes, ballet pumps, white or coloured laces.

Jumper or slipover. Grey with purple stripes.

Now that the weather is getting colder please remember that all students will be in need of a **COAT** - Plain **BLACK** without coloured flashes, logos or slogans.

**JEWELLERY** - Medic alert chain, if necessary. Girls may wear one small silver or gold sleeper or stud in the lobe of each ear, but they must be removed for all PE lessons. It is not acceptable to put tape over the ears. No other jewellery or body piercings are allowed.


