Mr Scott Evans writes...

Welcome back to the new school year!

I hope you have enjoyed a restful summer and enjoyed some special times with friends and family.

Warm greetings to you if you have just joined us. I can assure you that all my experiences with the new Year 7s and Year 12s have been nothing but an utter pleasure!

I have chosen to write for my first newsletter, as I did last year, a brief report on how our Year 11s performed in their GCSEs.

For me, the last few weeks of the summer holiday are dominated by thoughts of exam results. Like the students and their families, there is a mix of trepidation and excitement.

I was confident this year, that our Year 11s would do well, we knew they were an excellent cohort and we have come out in the top 10-15% of schools for 'value added' and in many measures the top 5% of all schools nationally. This is where we expected to be and I am delighted to congratulate teachers and students in this achievement.

In terms of attainment, once again, we have scored highly. Last year we were in the top 20% of schools for performance in Essex. This year we are 9th in the whole of Essex. Obviously, the 4 grammar schools top the attainment chart, but we are the 5th best comprehensive school. Of all the schools in the top 40

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comprehensives we have the smallest gap between the 'disadvantaged' students and the main cohort. This means that regardless of a student's background and circumstances: he/she will do well here. As you can imagine, I am particularly pleased with this.

41% of our students passed the prestigious English Baccalaureate (National Average is 24%). 13% of our students gained at least 8 GCSEs at grade (7,8,9 - the new A, A* and super A*). A few individuals stand out including, Emma Sanders who gained an incredible 8 grade 9s. This must put her in the top 500 students in the country. Ben Cooper gained five 9s and six 8s. Charlie Johnson gained four grade 9s, five grade 8s and 2 grade 7s. Bernice Yeboah gained the highest progress score of 3.2 (which means she scored an average of 3.2 grades higher per subject than students, nationally with same attainment from Primary School).

There are many individual stories of hard work and determination, it is hard to know which ones to pick. My congratulations to everyone.

Our ambition is to provide students with an Outstanding education. Outstanding whenever OfSTED (or others) come to inspect us, and Outstanding progress towards Outstanding grades in exams. Students coming here should be confident that they will get better

exam results than they would, if they went anywhere else.

How do we do it? How do we achieve this objective? Our strategy remains the same. We are first and foremost a Church of England School; we have strong Christian values and teaching. Secondly, we have an expert trust (The Russell Education Trust) who advise us; we listen to their input and adjust our practice in line with the support and quidance we get from their examiners, inspectors and consultants. Finally, we know our students by name; we know their needs and their character. We support and develop them individually, caring for them personally, as if they were a member of our own family.

I am incredibly proud of last year's cohort, not just because their exam results look like they should have come from a grammar school, but also because they have Christian Character, they aspire to be the best that they can be, they listen to advice and they care deeply about other people. They are now the embodiment of our school strategy!

And so, onto Sixth Form. We are confident that this wonderful group of students will excel in our Sixth Form. It was wonderful yesterday and today to see them in their suits and to see them join the founding cohort in the Sixth Form area. With the new Year 7s, resplendent in their uniform, a full school has finally been

established. Students in all 7 year groups!

I am honoured to be the leader and founder of this school. I look forward to this time next year when I will be writing about our first set of A-Level results!

Assistant Headteacher Pastoral

I am local man, brought up and educated in Billericay and, bar attending the University of Brighton, have lived in Essex all my life. My passion has always been sport and physical activity. I have played football to a high amateur level and played club tennis. As I have become older my new sporting endeavour is golf where I am currently a 22 handicap. Outside of competitive sport I have completed other physical challenges such as the Duke of Edinburgh award and the three peaks challenge on two occasions.

I have been teaching ten years, nine of which have been at one school, The James Hornsby School in Laindon, Basildon. I have held many leadership positions including Head of PE, head of house and been part of

the senior leadership team.
Outside teaching PE I have been teaching Mathematics and Science as well, something in which I really enjoy.

Teaching is not only my job but my passion, I work hard in school ensuring the best outcomes for every student in my class. However, I do value my time outside of school spending time with my friends and family, watching box sets and reading.



Mrs Phipps Psychology Teacher

Teaching is my second career but one that I have always strived towards. Family circumstances forced me to leave school at sixteen after achieving my GCEs. I worked in the banking sector in the City, starting as a settlements clerk and eventually progressing on to the trading floor of one of the major European Banks trading within the Repo and Money

Markets. Teaching was never far from my mind and whilst you cannot teach someone how to trade, I took pride in mentoring the younger trainees on the trading floor and helping them build their confidence in their abilities. My banking career afforded me the opportunity to meet a diversity of characters and personalities which stimulated my interest in psychology and sociology. I wanted to understand what creates the behaviour of certain individuals, and how their experiences may have affected them.

Banking as a career, however, did not personally fulfil me and it had always been my aim to return to education to achieve my ambition of teaching. My opportunity to return to education came when my son started at primary school - he thought it was cool that both of us were going to school! Through hard work and determination, I achieved a First Class Honours degree, BSc (Hons) Social Studies, which is a combined psychology and sociology degree. At university I was one of the eldest in my lectures but spending time with individuals who had just completed their A levels confirmed that I would like to teach older teenagers.

I secured a teaching position to begin after I had graduated at a further education college in Essex and studied for my teaching qualification whilst working full-

time. I have taught A-level psychology and sociology for the last seven years and thoroughly enjoyed every aspect of my career so far in teaching; at Becket Keys I will be solely teaching psychology. It is not just the academic success of those I teach that matters to me but also helping them to grow into confident and independent individuals who believe in themselves and their abilities. As a subject, Psychology opens up the minds of young people to the world around them and can be applied to many different careers and pathways. I consider it a privilege to work with young people in developing their understanding as they begin their journeys into adulthood. Furthermore, throughout my teaching career I have been a personal tutor providing guidance on university applications and career pathways. Moreover, as a personal tutor, students learn early on that they can approach me at any time for help and guidance both academically and pastorally.

Spare time is rare as a working mum, and therefore it is spent with family and friends. I am a lifelong West Ham supporter, which if nothing else has taught me loyalty and humility! Whilst I was not unhappy at my previous employment, I recognised that I am ready for a new challenge at an outstanding institution. I have already been made to feel very welcome by the staff and students that I have met so far and look forward to building strong and supportive

relationships with parents, staff and students and upholding the Christian ethos of the school.



Miss McClenaghan English Teacher

My A-Levels were in Religious Studies, English Literature and Sociology. English always being my favourite subject at school, I decided to study it at degree level.

Whilst having lived in Essex for most of my life, I moved away from home to study English at the University of Leicester. A city in which I now call my second home (did you know in 2015 King Richard III was found buried underneath a car parking lot in Leicester?). My degree was fascinating, allowing me to study some of the earliest literature recorded, written in Old English, all the way through to 21st Century Global Fiction.

After graduating, I moved back to Essex and began working as a graduate in London. However, my career in London was shortlived. I knew exactly what I really wanted to do – to teach English. Leaving a secure job in London to

train as a teacher was initially a very daunting decision! This experience was a great lesson in knowing the importance of pursuing goals and embarking on challenges.

I began working as a Teaching Assistant at a secondary school in Harold Hill and applied to a Graduate Teacher Training course, including gaining a PGCE in Secondary Education at University College London. The following academic year, I began my teacher training year and trained at two local secondary schools. Next, I aim to complete a part-time master's alongside teaching.

I am fortunate to be joining Becket Keys at the early stages of my teaching career and am very much looking forward to the year ahead.

Born in London, raised in Enfield with a great passion for food. I came into food teaching after being inspired by my A level Food Teacher who was called Mrs Cook! After training at The Polytechnic of the Southbank, I was approached by the school that I had completed teaching practice in for my first full time post.
