Mr. Peggs writes...

It has been a great couple of months enjoying a full Sixth Form for the first time, with the students in Year 12 and Year 13 integrating fluidly and plenty of new opportunities being taken advantage of. Here, I have tried to summarise some of the highlights so far. No doubt I have forgotten a great deal and the Sixth Form students will point this out to me with enthusiasm — so please expect another update soon!

Both year groups are to be commended for how they have interacted with each other. Clearly, there were many close friendships formed between students of different ages already, but seeing new ones grow every week has been gratifying to witness. We also welcomed a number of students from other schools and, as was

the case last year, they were welcomed into the Sixth Form by all of their peers.

There has been a clear focus on the academic with Year 12 relishing the chance to focus on three or four subjects that they are passionate about and Year 13 building on their successes of last year. The older students have mock examinations coming up and these will provide the firmest indication yet of how close they are to fulfilling their potential, as well as allowing them to streamline their plans for the future. Meanwhile, Year 12 students have found the different rooms they use during their study periods of great benefit: many are appreciating the silent study area in order to get on with their essays and research independently, the group work

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area has been utilised exceptionally well for collaborative learning and, of course, the Deli has been extremely popular with even more impressive food than last year available all day.



This year will be both equally exciting and sad as those who remain from our founding cohort in 2012 prepare to move on in life. There is a great deal of anticipation surrounding this and it has been thrilling to hear about - and support - the students who have already organised degree level apprenticeships or who are going directly into employment in varied industries. Our first applications for university courses have been sent, with these being as diverse as Classical Singing at different conservatoires, Theology at Oxford, Medicine at several prestigious institutions and Business Management at Florida State!



At the same time as Year 13 are finalising their next steps, Year 12 are beginning to understand what it is they need to start to put in place for these. The Scholars are looking forward to organising their own trips, speakers and events in order to ensure that they have this wider enrichment to enjoy now and show off in the future and many Year 12 students have already signed up to apprenticeship schemes or have visited universities.

Of course, our Sixth Form students are role models to younger students and they fulfil this value of responsibility with great pride. Year 12 have been outstanding in their volunteering and are supporting younger students in lessons through the second expert in the room, by mentoring students who need this extra guidance and by taking the lead in extra-curricular clubs such as sports coaching and music tuition. They are also heading up all the great charity work we do as a school.



We now have a team of over sixty Prefects who are undertaking duties each lunchtime in order to assist other students in different ways. They have also been extremely effective in the ways in which they have supported events like the different open evenings and the fireworks night

- at this time of year the social calendar is full and so their support is hugely appreciated. This has all been organised by the team of the Head Girl, Head Boy and the four Deputies who are also putting together plans for the Year 13 Prom – an event that, to use an oxymoron, will be one of the last firsts we have at Becket Keys!



Having a larger Sixth Form means that we can now play more sports fixtures against other schools and this has been the case with football and netball so far. We have had some excellent results in both sports and look forward to continuing, as well as broadening our teams to include rugby, rounders and athletics - as well as anything else that the students wish to participate in. Like at university, the idea is that the students take responsibility for forming clubs and organising fixtures, something that they do with relish

Becket Keys Church of England School has three Enrichment Days over the course of an academic year. Enrichment days, where we collapse the traditional timetable, encourage our students to thrive on challenge and respond positively to different situations. The experience of each Enrichment Day is designed to augment the current classroom curriculum and extra-curricular provision. The Enrichment Days include schoolbased events with visits or the involvement of local employers and volunteers. Occasionally, there are also visits or trips scheduled for these days. All activities are animated by a desire to offer students further opportunities to not only acquire new knowledge and understanding, but also, significantly, to develop skills and habits, which help broaden horizons and strengthen character. We desire our students to be responsible citizens and enthusiastic lifelong learners. The days provide an opportunity for students to study a subject in

more detail, develop additional skills such as teamwork, and to take part in activities and challenges that are different to their normal everyday lessons. Timely delivery of elements of the Personal, Social, Heath and Economic Education (PSHEE) programmes of study and Careers Education are also facilitated by these days.



Our first Enrichment Day was yesterday. A great deal of creativity and industry is evident in the Enrichment Day programme. We would like to thank all staff for this and congratulate them on ensuring a productive and enjoyable day. Year 7 journeyed back to Medieval England to solve a mystery, report the news and be creative. Year 8 focused on developing a growth mindset and the day included a visit from the Fire Service. Year 9 student activities were based around the NHS. They participated in a First Aid workshop, discussed mental health, as well as relevant interests and skills for a career in the NHS.



The vital topics of relationships and study techniques were covered in the Year 10 workshops. Several Christian couples (and a baby) visited our school to explore healthy, long lasting relationship and marriage with students! Revision and stress management tips were shared in order to help students prepare for future exams. Year 11s were involved in their GCSE Spoken English exams. In addition, they explored 'Unifrog', considered careers and had an opportunity to discuss their revision timetables with teachers and, importantly, revise! All whilst Year 12 and 13s took part in the 'London Challenge'! These days definitely prove that learning is what you make it!

Remembrance Service



This morning, all members of our school community gathered on the playground for an Armistice Day Memorial Service led by Mr. Scott-Evans and Mr. Silver. Euan Inverarity sounded the beginning of the two minute silence with The Last Post and signaled the end with The Reveille. Reverend Michael Child, Essex Wing Padre for the Royal Air Force Cadets, concluded the Act of Remembrance with a prayer and blessing.

In addition, Becket Keys was invited by the Royal British Legion to be represented at a remembrance service for schools at Brentwood War Memorial. Beltran Gracia-Martin, Saskia Bashford, Samuel Smith, William Sainsbury, Bethany Hancox and Evie Walker, accompanied by Mrs. Sharp, attended the service and laid a wreath on behalf of the school community. At the service, a memorial stone was

also dedicated to William Merrifield, who was awarded the Victoria Cross in World War I.



Sergeant William Merrifield of 4th
Battalion, 1st Central Ontario Regiment,
was awarded the Victoria Cross for acts
of bravery and devotion to duty in 1918.
He was born in Brentwood in 1890. He
later moved to Canada to work and
enlisted with the 4th Battalion when the
war broke out. The commemorative VC
pacing stone is to honour him, his
bravery and dedication to duty and to
mark the 100th anniversary for when he
was awarded the Victoria Cross. Evie
Skinner sounded the two minutes
silence with other members of the
Brentwood Imperial Youth Band.



FROM TRAGEDY TO HOPE



What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Micah 6:8 (NIV)

In the face of tragedy, neglect and disaster - whether through war or terror - it is right to lament the destruction of lives and communities. In doing so we can be brought from a realm dominated by individual pain to a shared resolve for a better world. In reading the scriptures (especially psalms of lament) we can become more sensitive to the sufferings of others whose experiences may be very different, and begin to hope. Our



increased understanding helps us to see what justice, peace and reconciliation might look like, and how they might be accomplished. This will take not only courage and vision, but also the humility to listen and be changed.

Poppies growing in battle-scarred fields were the symbol of remembrance and hope adopted by the Royal British Legion; flowers which, whilst delicate, were resilient and grow in their thousands, flourishing even in the mist of chaos and destruction. Bright red Flanders' poppies (Papaver rhoeas) were the inspiration of Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae's now famous poem 'In Flanders' Field'.

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow,

Loved and were loved, and now we lie

In Flanders' fields. Take up our quarrel with the foe;

To you from failing hands we throw

The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow

In Flanders' Fields.

As we mark the centenary of the First World War Armistice, may we remember with gratitude all those who served, sacrificed and changed our world during the First World War. May we also look forward and strive 'to act justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with our God'. The torch is ours to hold high.

Let us pray:

God of infinite compassion, give us the strength to seek healing, justice and peace for all; the humility to listen to the voices of the marginalised and those who feel excluded; the ability to pursue tolerance amid difference, yet be intolerant towards evil and injustice; for the sake of your kingdom, demonstrated in Christ.

Amen.
