Sixth Former for a Day

After a few months of excited expectancy, today saw the occasion of our third Sixth Former for a Day event – and this year it was bigger and better than ever as word of our excellent Sixth Form has spread!



157 Year 11 students, including 34 from other schools, experienced a day of Key Stage 5 lessons in order to help them gain an insight into what they can expect at Becket Keys next year. They also

had the chance to become familiar with important parts of the Sixth Form programme as they attended a Collective Worship and tutorial period. Both of these are central to keeping the students bonded as a tightly knit community where there is plenty of support (and laughs) for each other.

The tutorial groups are also the basis of the House Cup that runs over the academic year and the Year 11 students took part in the weekly current affairs quiz. Mr. Fox's form for the day won this, meaning that Katherine and Aryan were able to come up at the final debrief and collect the prizes on behalf of their tutor group.

Of course, with the main objective of the day being to discover what is different

between Year 11 and the Sixth Form, there were plenty of opportunities to gain this knowledge and ask interesting questions. During a talk in the morning, a dozen Year 12 Prefects explained what they found interesting and enjoyable about their time in the Sixth Form so far, as well as pointing out the main differences to last year and what has surprised them. This meant that the younger students were able to understand:

- how external students are made to feel extremely welcome and settle in successfully
- how they will be supported with their learning and their emotional wellbeing
- the extra-curricular opportunities on offer
- the structure of the 'Next Steps' programme that will help them apply for university, apprenticeships and employment
- the ways in which our more able students are given chances to develop as part of the Scholars' Society
- o the House Cup
- and much more!





Another important way for students to find out crucial information about the choices that they have to make was through the subject fair. Year 12 and Year 13 students ran these 'market stalls' all day and answered a huge number of interesting questions about the content of different courses, the ways in which lessons are delivered and how the pressures of studying at this advanced level need to be handled. Naturally, Year 11 students were curious to see the older students' work and - naturally! - the Sixth Form students enjoyed showing off their organised subject folders, skilled exam responses and creative coursework.

Reactions to the day have been extremely positive. Lauren, an external student, explained that she attended because one of her friends at Becket Keys had told her "how good the school was". She elaborated by saying that she "really liked it because all of the students are so friendly" and that the "Sports Science lesson was the best because of all of the collaborative learning through group work". Other students were equally as happy, with Denzel (Becket Keys) enjoying "Theatre Studies due to the

creativity of the performance in the lesson", Ethan (external) engaging in the "interactive experiment" about osmosis in his Applied Science lesson and Ofe (Becket Keys) relishing the "very interesting topics of gender roles and the criminal justice system" in her Sociology lesson.



Many teachers made comments about how impressed they were with the Year 11 students. Mr. Hughes, Lead Advisor for Science in the RET, loved this "fantastic opportunity to see young people engaging enthusiastically in the application of scientific theories" in his lessons, as well as remarking how special it was to see "external students with such positive attitudes fitting in perfectly alongside our own students who we are proud of". Mr. Fenn, Assistant Headteacher and a Sixth Form tutor, explained that he "enjoyed the naturally competitive attitude of the students" in his tutor group during the House quiz, before declaring that "they are 'House Competition ready" and starting to cherry-pick his tutees for next year! Mrs Course, Head of Year 13, described how she was taken aback at "the wonderful atmosphere and blending of students from different backgrounds".



In no particular order, my top five highlights of the day were:

- watching the Theatre
 Studies class execute a
 scary silent performance
 to a chilling soundtrack in
 semi-darkness (I shall
 have nightmares this
 weekend!)
- being pleasantly surprised by how the external students were so confident in chatting to our own students in Years 11-13
- feeling pride at how our own students in Years 11-13 made the external students feel so welcome (I no longer get surprised at this, but never take it for granted)
- seeing students being introduced to the latest Spanish pop sensation in the subject of that language
- witnessing students in a Biology lesson, who had never used powerful microscopes before, be astounded at what they could discover when looking at blood cells.

In short, it has been a fantastic day and this experience only makes us all look even more forward to next year as our school continues to grow!

So far, we have had nearly 200 applications from students who are interested in joining our Sixth Form next year, including over 60 from students who currently go to other schools – and they keep on coming in on a daily basis. The closing deadline for applications is Friday 15th February; please see the information at the end of this article for details of how to apply. Every student who applies will be interviewed and these will commence shortly after the deadline.

All students who are interviewed will be offered a place in the Sixth Form and invited to our compulsory Bridging Event that will last for two days towards the end of June. There will also be several other occasions that prospective Sixth Form students will be able to join in activities in order to prepare for their time in Years 12 and 13 at Becket Keys. Please keep an eye out for notices about these.

Still dews of quietness

One of the richest forms of prayer can occur when the heart is absolutely quiet. As the psalmist says, "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). These words tell us that to know God (that is to know a deep and loving relationship with Him) we must be still. It is in stillness that He will come to us; it is in stillness that we can listen; it is in stillness where He can speak to our hearts. This message reminds me of a verse from the popular hymn 'Dear Lord and Father of mankind':

Drop thy still dews of quietness, Till all our strivings cease; Take from our souls the strain and stress, And let our ordered lives confess The beauty of thy peace.

On my journey of prayer, I have found that a very precious way to pray is just through silence. There are times when we can wear ourselves out by trying to seek the 'right words'. So try no thoughts or words, just wanting to be silent in the presence of God. One of the high points in prayer is where two silences meet, God's silence and our silence. No need for thoughts and



words can get in the way. I do not think that we consider the value of silence often enough. It is rare to come across it in our world of loud music and mobile telephones. And yet, silence is essential for spiritual growth and healing. I have found that many people that I talk to consider silence as awkward. We have all witnessed silence in a small group or perhaps when in a lift with strangers. Now one is sure what to say. On the other hand, there is a silence that consoles us: the silence of a sleeping child, the tranquility of a church and just sitting in the middle of God's creation.

Saint Anselm, a Benedictine monk and Christian philosopher (1033-1109), wrote:

Come now, little man,
Turn aside for a while from your
daily employment, escape for a
moment from the tumult of
your thoughts.

Put aside your weighty cares, let your burdensome distractions wait,

Free yourself awhile for God and rest awhile in him.

Enter the inner chamber of your soul, shut out everything except God .

And that which can help you in seeking him, and, when you have shut the door, seek him. Now, my whole heart, say to God, 'I seek your face, Lord, it is your face I seek'.

To hear the whisper of God, we must turn down the volume of the world. We must find time to disconnect from everything and be still in His presence today. He waits for us to draw near. The world asks us to be busy. God asks us to be still so that we can receive love, peace and guidance.

You may like to try this simple prayer exercise:

Just sit down and, keeping your back straight but free, begin quieting your mind and your body by taking a few relaxing, deep breaths. Close your eyes, if you wish. Centre your awareness on the silent and infinite presence of God within your heart.

Let the Spirit lead you beyond the noisy world of space and time and into the silent realm where God dwells as the source and ground of your being. Center your attention on that hushed point within you where the human touches the divine, where the branch (you) intersects with Jesus, the vine—where you and God are one and dwell in each other.

Let yourself sink into the silent immensity of God. Simply let your prayer be a silent being there with God. Without any need for thoughts and words, exchange quiet love with God for as long as you feel inspired to do so.

Let us pray:

Father God your world is in such a hurry – timetables, schedules and deadlines. There are ever increasing demands on our time and on our lives. Help us, Lord, to find the hollows and pockets of peacefulness within the days: where we may stop and sit and share in peace with you; where we can expose the secrets of our hearts; where we may hear your still small voice more strongly than the loudest clamour on our time; where we may sit in solitude and silence at the foot of your cross. Timeless.

Amen.

I pray that we thank God for His peace. A peace that reminds us that we are created to live that

peace and that we can find this by simply being still and silent.
