By the same token, as we approach another holiday, I would like to encourage you as parents and carers in our school community. The work of a parent is a very difficult one; it can be joyous, but often challenging. No one cares about your child as much as you and each tough day that they have hits you hard. Young people today are under enormous pressure and I think the work of a parent is more difficult than ever. Thank you for the care and love you pour into the students of this school.

I am proud to be the headteacher of Becket Keys and share the joys and trials of adolescence with the students and you as parents. I am privileged to be part of your family in this way.

In recent weeks I have seen a number of significant school highlights:

- Our Year 8 Boys were runners up in the Essex Basketball Cup – well played!
- Fourteen Year 12s were interviewed for Head Boy/Girl positions (congratulations to all – you made it a very hard choice!)
- Yesterday, we had a Spring Concert with many of our talented students performing in ensembles and solo performances.
- 4. Superb work in practical GCSE subjects (Food, Drama, DT) has been completed over recent weeks staff have been telling me how delighted they are with our students' effort and commitment.
- Two wonderful Eucharists yesterday (last one for Year 13 and some Year 11s).

It has been a real pleasure to see the students putting themselves 'out there' and taking risks in these ways. They have clearly been proud of their school and should be rightly proud of themselves.

Before, I finish for this term, I would like to also draw your attention to a couple more items. Firstly, I must write a huge thank you to everyone who has contributed to our Playground Appeal. We have now received

over £30,000 towards new play equipment, benches, trees, shelters and landscaping. The first fruits of this investment (benches, netball posts, table tennis tables and basketball hoops) will be arriving after Easter and the new 'Green' will be open for students. Once we can see how the space is being used, we will then install paths and landscaping features and some sheltered areas.

As you can see in the photo on the Front Page, 'Friends of Becket Keys' have given us half of the money. I must give a huge thank you to Alison Butler as chair of the committee and everyone who has taken part in leading or attending our many events over the past year. Raising £15,000 in a year is no mean feat. This is the most we have ever raised in a year! Thank you!

The rest of the money has come from our 'Just Giving' page. 100 families have donated to this page, raising the rest of the £30,000. It is inspiring to see such commitment. Thank you for your generosity towards our beautiful school.

Similarly, parents have been responding rapidly to our appeal for the new School Fund (see https://www.parentpay.com). Just £30 from every family for each student will raise much needed money for our school. In addition to the items I wrote about in the letter, we are also looking to invest in new computers to maintain our extensive four ICT suites at

Becket Keys. Please do give generously to this new fund so that Governors can give our students the superb high standards that we have come to expect.

I trust that the holiday will bring some good quality family time for you to enjoy with your sons and daughters. In the midst of all that excitement, if you could take a few moments to respond to our survey, I would really appreciate it. We have a school here that we can all be rightly very proud of, please help us to tell OfSTED about it!



 Revise areas of weakness!! Do not revise topics you know, it's a waste of time!

 Reward yourself for hard work; this could be a takeaway, a new item of clothing. Reward positive behaviour!

Spring Concert


