"Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it."

Proverbs 22v6

Sometimes it has been confusing and frustrating but always miraculous and wonderful. I love working with teenagers and seeing them grow physically, mentally and spiritually.

Going out with them on Monday night was delightful. Walking round, shaking their hands, talking to them about their plans for the summer and beyond was simply delightful. We chatted, posed for photographs, sat together, even danced (albeit briefly in my case to one or two classic tunes!) and related to each other, as adults should. I was proud to the point of tears!

It has been an incredible journey and one I shall always treasure.

Having the two events on the same day was, I think, God's way of showing me what we have achieved. Watching Year 6s bounce on inflatables over on the school field and then going to see Sixth Formers in suits and cocktail dresses in a club was just the juxtaposition I needed to see the full transformation.

One Sixth Former wrote me a card that said: "I have to say that you have shown me how a Godly leader should lead, thank you. This school is special...The ministry that Jesus has given you – I can see you are advancing the Kingdom of God."

I am deeply touched by these words. To have a student, stop, reflect, and see what we have been trying to do with such clarity is a joy to me.

My prayer now is that they all achieve the results they deserve in their A-Levels and that they can then open their wings and fly!

Student Achievement PJ Pruce



PJ competed in 9 competitions over two days at the All Britain Fleadh in Kirkby Lonsdale last weekend; Solo's, Duet, Trio, Grupa Cheoil and Ceili Band.

He won a gold medal and is now the u15 British Bodhran Champion and his trio got silver in the u18 age group; they qualified for the Fleadh Cheoil na nEireann in Drogheda in the summer holidays.

He won a bronze medal in the u15 Ceili Drums and his u15 Grupa Cheoil also won bronze, but only first and second places qualify for the World Championships.

Hebrews 12:1-3 came to mind today. I have seen some great races!

A race is a good example: it is long and difficult; you cannot stop in the middle and take a break; there is a leader; and there is a finish line. The same is true for Christianity. The race in Hebrews:1-3 is a metaphor for the day-by-day life of faith. It would be wrong to simplistically use this as encouragement for runners. Indeed, it is not actually even a verse about sport. There is a much deeper meaning for us to explore.

Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles. And let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy that was set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. Consider him who endured such opposition from sinners, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart.

The passage begins with "Therefore," so we look back to



find the reason for this verse. The writer of Hebrews has just finished listing Old Testament saints who displayed faith in God, including Abraham, Sarah, Moses, and Rahab. The author wraps up that section by noting the horrible persecution Christians underwent, including imprisonment, stoning, and being sawn in two (Hebrews 11:35-37). He states that all of these people gained approval through their faith, just as New Testament saints were saved by faith.

The passage tells Christians to put down the distractions and sins of the world and live the Christian life with our eyes fixed on Jesus, the One who gave us faith and who will perfect it; the One who has completed the work the Father sent Him to do.

By taking these words at face value, we miss the great truths and great encouragement in the passage. The verses are

describing Christianity. All of the verbs in the first two verses are ongoing verbs. Christians do not lay aside sin, run, and fix their eyes on Jesus once. We do it every day. We are to continue to abandon sin and believe in Christ with endurance, not losing heart. We continue, knowing that the saints who came before us persevered and gained approval and that our own Saviour endured hostility so that we would not lose heart. Our Patronal Festival Eucharists reminded student of this earlier in the week.

The Christian lives life and runs the race, by watching Jesus – first to see who He is, and then to follow the example that He gave when He came to this world. We are told to fix our eyes on Him and not to look away from Him. We stop looking at ourselves and our sins and turn our eyes to Jesus, and we follow Him. This is faith.

The sportsmanship shown on the field today was inspiring; a sense of fellowship with competitors, gracious winning and losing, fairness and respect. Returning to the race as a metaphor for the day-by-day life of faith. Living life, through faith, with Christ-like character, we should, every day, let go of anything that hinders us from believing in and following our Saviour, set our faces towards Jesus, and live looking unto Him.



Let us pray:

Dear Lord,
A life of faith does not promise
to be easy. Help us keep our
eyes fixed on you and follow
you. May we run an amazing
race, encouraged by your
example and those of our
patronal saints. May we pass
on the Good News to others
along the way, in the glory of
your name and in the service of
your kingdom.
Amen.



With the final scores coming in, it was clear the battle for the




