This week students have been making bread and you can make a similar recipe at home!

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We have had our daily Advent reflections and prayers and I have also been grateful for the work of our school ministry team at this time. Year groups have come together to worship via Microsoft Teams and have received recorded messages from **Brentwood Schools Christian** Workers Trust and Good News for all (formally Gideons UK). St Thomas of Canterbury Church sent Advent bags for our Year 7 students with activities for each day during Advent to share with their families.

We have raised over £2000 for our school charities this term. There has been a non-uniform day as part of our Advent journey and, whilst we have not been able to fill shoeboxes this year (due to Covid regulations), over 120 students from across all year groups donated £5.00 to provide a shoebox for every child in New Hope Children's Centre in Kenya. The money was transferred over at the beginning of December to allow Anne Chenge, the founder of the orphanage to go and buy essential and non-essential items for every child - even the babies.

Our Music department was delighted to be invited to submit

a virtual recording for the Chelmsford Diocesan Board of Education which put together an Advent Service for schools. They performed the song "Emmanuel" by Peter Johns. Students were recorded separately, both on video and with the audio. This was then put together and edited to give the impression of an ensemble performance. Last week, Mr. Romhany also appeared on Phoenix FM with the head of music from Brentwood School and the head of music from St Martin's School where they discussed their virtual music concerts during lockdown and how they are preparing for their Christmas Concerts this year. Becket Keys stage band







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School Nurse




We would like to thank Mr Yaxley for his expertise and time. We hope to make this an annual event for students.

The Chronicles of Narnia PG


This film tells the story of four siblings who find the magical land of Narnia through the back of a wardrobe. Their destiny is to free it with the help of a mystical lion.


Light in the Darkness



A small book explaining the difference Jesus makes to life, history and eternity written for teens and young adults.


















Recipe of the Week

In our bread lesson, the students used a basic bread recipe and created a Christmas tree bread by following my instructions and demonstration.

If you would like to try something similar at home I have found this recipe online for a Christmas tree bread which you can have as a festive treat ©



Christmas Tree Garlic Bread

Ingredients 500g strong white bread flour

7q sachet fast-action dried yeast 2 tsp golden caster sugar 100g <u>butter</u>, melted (buy a 250g pack and use the rest in the garlic butter) drizzle of oil, for greasing 2 tbsp. fine polenta or cornmeal 150g pack mozzarella (about 20 balls) For the tomato dipping sauce small knob of butter 1 garlic clove, crushed 2 x 400g cans chopped tomatoes 1 tsp dried oregano 1 tbsp red wine vinegar 2 tsp golden caster sugar For the garlic butter 140g <u>butter</u> 4 garlic cloves, crushed small bunch parsley, finely chopped (leave a little leftover to garnish, if you like)

Method

Tip the flour into a large bowl or the bowl of a freestanding mixer. Add the yeast and sugar to one side of the bowl and 1 tsp fine salt to the other. Mix together, then add the melted butter and 275ml warm water. Mix to a dough, then knead for 10 mins by hand (or 5 mins in a freestanding mixer) until the dough feels stretchy and soft. Clean out the bowl, then lightly grease with a little oil. Turn the dough over in the oiled bowl until it's well coated. Cover with cling film or a tea towel and set aside somewhere warm until the dough has doubled in size. Alternatively, put the dough in the fridge and leave to rise slowly for two days (bring it to room temperature before continuing to step 2).

Line your largest baking sheet with parchment, and dust with polenta or cornmeal. Drain the mozzarella and dry the balls on some kitchen paper. Tip the dough onto your work surface and punch out the air bubbles. To make a Christmas tree shape, you'll need 23 balls. Tear off lumps of dough, ensuring each one is roughly the same size (if you want to be exact, weigh the dough, divide the weight by 23, then weigh each ball of dough as you break them off).

Shape each piece of dough into a disc and place a ball of mozzarella in the middle. Pull up the sides of the dough to encase the cheese, pinching the dough together to seal. Roll into a ball and place on the baking sheet, sealed-side down, in a tree shape. Leave a little space between each ball, as they will grow when proving. You are likely to have two or three balls without mozzarella, so use these pieces of dough for the trunk – for anyone who doesn't like cheese. Cover the tray with a sheet of oiled cling film and set aside for 30 mins until almost doubled in size.

While the dough proves, make the tomato dipping sauce. Melt the butter in a saucepan, add the garlic and sizzle for 30 seconds until fragrant. Add the tomatoes, oregano, vinegar, sugar and some seasoning. Bubble for 30 mins until the sauce is thick. Heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. When the dough is ready, uncover the baking sheet and bake for 20-25 mins until golden

brown. Meanwhile, make the garlic butter. Melt the butter in a saucepan, add the garlic and sizzle for 1-2 mins until the garlic is a shade darker (but not brown). When the bread is cooked, transfer it to a platter. Stir most of the parsley into the garlic butter and use a pastry brush to brush it all over the bread. Leave it to soak in, then brush on more. Sprinkle over a little extra parsley to garnish, if you like. Reheat the tomato sauce and serve it alongside the bread with any remaining garlic butter.











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Christ our Joy
