We have had another exciting summer at the school as during August, Becket Keys Church of England School celebrated its very first set of A-Level examination results.

A number of students achieved truly outstanding grades. One student, Bethany, achieved three A grades and one B grade (in Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Chemistry and Biology) and she is going on to study Pharmacy at Cardiff University. Joshua achieved one A* grade and two A grades in Geography, Maths and Economics, and will be going on to a 'flying start' degree in Accountancy and Business at Reading University sponsored by PricewaterhouseCoopers. Three A grades in English Literature,

History and Politics has secured a place for Annie to read English Literature at Durham University. An offer from Loughborough University to study Aerospace Engineering for achieving two A grades and a B grade in Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry was delightedly received by Elliot.

Other exciting courses that students are choosing to follow include Korean and Asia Pacific Studies (Roisin), and Law with Spanish (Emily).

Our Head Boy, Alex, is going to Newcastle to study Chemistry with Biomedical Chemistry. Alex secured two A Grades and a B (Biology, Mathematics, Chemistry).

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New Staff

An introduction to some of our new staff starting this term. Welcome to Becket Keys!

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Canterbury Kent University. Her journey has been an interesting one. When looking for a secondary school, and not living in Brentwood, she hadn't even heard of 'this new Church of England school' until a friend phoned her. She immediately called Mr. Scott-Evans and secured her place. Since then, she has gone from strength to strength and she has thoroughly enjoyed her time at Becket Keys. The family believe that coming to Becket Keys was a 'gift from God'.

This is another important milestone for our school; our very first set of A-Level results. When we opened the school in 2012, of course, we had our eyes fixed on this point and had high expectations for what our students would go on and achieve. We have seen our vision come to reality. We are delighted that our founding students have so many exciting plans for the future in the world of work, apprenticeships and university. I am thrilled for them. We are now able to further expand our Sixth Form provision, are offering new subjects next year and we are welcoming more students from other schools to join us here. This year we have 126 students joining us for A-Levels in the Sixth Form, more than 30 of these are external students.

The following week we also celebrated another set of excellent GCSE results. For the third year running, the school is

pleased to see that results have improved. The school was one of the top ten performing schools in the county last year (9th) and has seen an improved position (7th) this year. The top four schools are Grammars, which means we are the third best comprehensive in our County.

There are a number of individual success stories that result from notably high performance in the subjects within the English Baccalaureate. One in six students in the school gained at least one of the most prestigious Grade 9s. This new "rare grade" demonstrates performance above that of the old A*.

Two girls, Millie and Lola were the joint highest attaining students in the school with ten Grade 9s and a Grade 8 each. This should place them comfortably within the top few hundred highest performing students in the whole country. Both are looking forward to staying at Becket Keys for their Sixth Form.

Andrea, who speaks English as a second language had the highest progress of any student in the school. He achieved two Grade 9s, five Grade 8s, two Grade 7s and three Grade 6s and will stay at Becket Keys for the Sixth Form.

We have 25 students who study Chinese Mandarin at Becket Keys. Once again, all of the students passed Mandarin, no one has ever failed this language at GCSE or A-Level. 19 of the 25 students got a 7, 8 or 9.

A particularly good set of results were for Serena who joined the school in Year 10, she has worked hard to develop her skills in Music and she gained a Grade 9 in this subject alongside a 9 in Religion and Philosophy. Like many students, she prepared for her exams with a prayer each time and she gave glory to God for her results saying: "It is only since I joined Becket Keys that my grades have improved to this level. I want to thank my teachers and all the staff at this school for their help and support". She also gained six Grade 8s, two Grade 7s and a Grade 5. She intends to continue her time at Becket Keys by studying Psychology, Politics and Business.

We are now in a new academic year and looking forward to being part of the education journey for our new students in Year 7 and those who have joined us in Year 12. The school has a growing reputation for academic excellence which has been demonstrated again this year. However, it is the progress that students make here which really makes us proud. For three years, our school has shown that students make much better progress here than they do nationally it was wonderful to see so many happy faces when the students opened their envelopes on results day, it was a wonderful occasion for the students, parents and staff who had all worked extremely hard to achieve these results.

Meet Some Of Our New Staff



Mr Sedgley Mathematics Teacher

Originally from Staffordshire, I graduated with degrees in mathematical economics from the University of Bath and University of Warwick. After 25 years working as a financial analyst in the City, I have enjoyed started my new career teaching secondary school mathematics which is already proving to be stimulating and rewarding. I am relishing the new challenge. Why the career change? I was fortunate enough to receive an excellent education in mathematics and have used this during my career in quantitative finance. I think it's underappreciated what a vital skill mathematics is, giving people confidence to make better choices in both their personal lives (e.g. shopping, money and health), and in their working lives, being the foundation of many subjects and careers. I believe that the skills I have gained in the business world also help me to teach engaging lessons, motivate students, and my extensive experience presenting to clients of varying abilities and enthusiasm certainly helps me to think on my feet in the classroom.

I trained at a secondary school in Enfield, and am affiliated with Now Teach (www.nowteach.org.uk)_, an organisation set up to find experienced career changers. The opportunity to work one day a week at Becket Keys during the spring term last year allowed me to get to know staff and some of the pupils. I am grateful for the time the staff have spent with me, making me feel welcome, and have been impressed by the collegiate atmosphere between the staff, the overall ethos of the school, and the students I taught also made me feel welcome. Becket Keys is much closer to home (I have lived in Essex for the last 10 years), so the shorter commute will be more beneficial in terms of spending more time with my family. I have two boys aged 14 and 12, who keep us very busy with lots of sport, music and drama productions. My hobbies include cycling, skiing, piano, music and pretty much any team sport (I still playing the occasional game of cricket).

Much as I was inspired by my Mathematics and Economics teachers, I want to encourage pupils to believe in what they can achieve and stretch their goals. And in a broader sense, I'd like to be able to look back and say I played a small part in raising standards in mathematics. I am very excited to be joining Becket Keys, not only as a maths teacher, but also as a member of the wider school community.

I am very excited to be starting my teaching career with Becket Keys this year! I'm originally from Brentwood and went to secondary school in Chelmsford where I studied Geography, History and English Literature as A-Levels. 




Back to School – Be encouraged by faith



Families Learning About Self-Harm

Do you have a young person aged 11- 17 who is self-harming? Do you want more information on self-harm and how to manage the concerns within your home? Do you feel alone and would like the opportunity to discuss the problem with people who will understand?



Then this FLASH course may be what you're looking for:

FLASH is a group programme, free for parents/carers whose young person is exhibiting self-harming behaviour and how this may impact on the whole family.

In September 2019 FLASH will run over ten consecutive Tuesdays. Each session is designed to build on the previous sessions.


