# **Training Day**

Today, we have enjoyed the opportunity for training. All five RET schools sent delegates to Turing House School in Hampton Court with around 30 colleagues from Becket Keys attending. All the English, Mathematics and Science teachers attended this, alongside other specific subjects, pastoral leaders for Year 10 and 11 and all those who lead on careers and supporting 'disadvantaged' students.

At Becket Keys, I have led training for the remaining staff. We had a great day (even if I say so myself!) looking at what our priorities are for the year ahead and discussing our provision for the disadvantaged students.

We also looked at our newly

adapted model for teaching called 'The Becket Keys 5'. This model highlights for teachers what we know works in terms of teaching and learning here. It can be summarised into 5 key areas and the acronym: S.T.E.E.P.

S = Starting smartly

T = Teaching technically

E = Everyone excelling

E = Exploring the why

P = Progressing over time

#### 1. Starting Smartly

You may already know that all Becket Keys lessons start with 7 minutes of silence. During this time, students will be asked to do an activity based on 'the five Rs' – Reinforce, Respond, Reveal, Revise or Retrieve.

- Reinforce Students reinforce learning that took place in the previous lesson(s).
- II. Respond Students respond to marking from the previous lesson.
- III. Reveal The 'Do Now'
  that reveals key learning
  concepts that students are
  about to explore in the
  lesson, and encourages
  them to consider and
  respond to ideas about to
  be presented.
- IV. Revise and Retrieve The 'Do Now' that creates 'spaced learning' opportunities. Revise previous topics. Retrieve information learned.

Making sure that lessons start promptly and, in this way, ensures that students and staff feel calm and relaxed as they prepare for the lesson.

2.Teaching technically – draw on established proven pedagogy

# "Plan it, Teach it, Manage it, Assess it."

As an RET school we are surrounded by advisors and researchers of the highest quality. Through collaborative working (like today's INSET day) we are able to share what we know about learning across the trust.

Teaching is very simple really; we do not use gimmicks and tricks.

We just concentrate on the very basic things that make students engage well in lessons and succeed. We do not force teachers to do certain things at certain times or deliver things in particular ways. All we do is ensure the lessons are well planned, taught through modelling, clear explanations and with plenty of opportunity for feedback to students, metacognition and collaborative learning. We know how to make knowledge stick and we expect staff to use these techniques regularly. We also ensure that books are marked carefully and frequently.

#### 3. Everyone excelling - Differentiation and Challenge

Our school would not be successful if we did not see students, across the ability range, excelling at school. Everyone needs to be reaching and stretching beyond their targets. Teaching lessons where this happens regularly is not easy, it is an art that takes time and development for teachers to master. I have been teaching for 20 years and I am still working on it. Knowing how to help every student with his or her particular needs to make progress is not easy. But over time, we have learned the following are the most important elements:

- Knowing every student's needs
- Being aware of students who need more help during a task.

- Providing 'scaffolding', where necessary.
- Giving students extra support and strategies, where necessary.
- Asking different questions of different students.
- Having extension work to challenge and stretch.
- Expecting different outcomes appropriate for individual students.

#### 4. Exploring the 'why?'

Students are more motivated, engaged and ambitious when they understand the 'why?'.

Students are not 'inspired' by – "because it comes up in the exam"!

We ensure that we inspire students through the clear presentation of context for the learning each day, week, term and year. Classroom walls for, example should, answer these context questions:

- Why are we studying this subject?
- What important/relevant life skills are we learning?
- Why have the units been chosen? Why are we learning them in this order? How do they link to previous units and units to come?
- What outcomes can we expect? How will they help us later in life?
- In what way will we be assessed? How does that link to real life?

#### 5. Progressing over time

Progress is not something that can really happen in 10 minutes. Yes, students can learn something new, but will it stick? No one can really claim to have made progress if they cannot replicate the skill or recall the fact that was learned in 6 weeks' time. Our teachers are trained with strategies to ensure that progress is developed over time.

Key to this is encouragement for students. We always look to praise effort rather than performance. We will sometimes praise progress, but avoid praising attainment. Praising attainment just puts students under pressure to feel like they have to perform or be 'talented'. The key is to support students in recognising that progress requires effort. If we encourage them to put the effort in, everything else will look after itself. Moreover, you cannot look back with any regrets if you 'gave it your best shot'!

If you want to learn more about learning and teaching and what works. I can recommend the following:

"Understand how we learn – a visual guide" by Weinstein, Sumeracki and Caviglioni – a superb book

As I said, we avoid fads, tricks and stunts – good teaching is simple really – plan it, teach it, manage it, assess it – repeat! Days like today have helped all our staff especially new colleagues to the school to learn more about what helps make Becket Keys so effective.

# Healing

Last Sunday, Becket Keys led the intercessions at St. Thomas of Canterbury Church. When writing prayers for students to read, I like to ensure that they clearly link to the Gospel reading and the sermon. The sermon was inspired by Jesus' healing of 10 men with leprosy:

Now on his way to
Jerusalem, Jesus travelled along
the border between Samaria and
Galilee. As he was going into a
village, ten men who had leprosy
met him. They stood at a
distance and called out in a loud
voice,

"Jesus, Master, have pity on us!"
When he saw them, he
said, "Go, show yourselves to
the priests." And as they went,
they were cleansed. One of
them, when he saw he was
healed, came back, praising
God in a loud voice. He threw
himself at Jesus' feet and
thanked him—and he was a
Samaritan.

Jesus asked, "Were not all ten cleansed? Where are the other nine? Has no one returned to give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Rise and go; your faith has made you well."



Carolyn Robertson, Licensed Lay Minister at St. Thomas of Canterbury Church, has again given me permission to share these words:

There are not many people who can recount word for word verses from the Bible. Scholars and priests, those who read the Bible regularly and have a good memory - yes, but for most of us, it does not come easily. But what most of us can do, is recall the vivid stories of Jesus. In particular, those incredible and awesome accounts of miraculous healing. For example, in our reading from Luke 17, we heard about how Jesus, on His way to Jerusalem, cleansed ten people with Leprosy. As is typical of accounts like this, the stories are told just as they are. There are no waving flags. No trumpets. No boasting. And hardly ever, any mention of loved one's reactions. It is left to us to imagine how the loved ones

of those who were healed, reacted. How did they comprehend instant healing - the miraculous healing of someone who was blind or paralysed or afflicted by a skin disease?

In the 21st century, we hear accounts of modern-day miraculous healing. We may even witness it, perhaps through laying on of hands that cures the incurable. And indeed, it sounds extraordinary. Authors like CS Lewis insist that miracles are happening all around us. Could that be true? A few years ago, on a Pilgrimage to Lourdes, I was encouraged to take part in traditional healing. Stone baths are filled with spring water that flows into the caves. I refused to enter the baths, for I felt well. Yet I was propelled towards them with a clear purpose that I should pray for healing of the world's sin.

The experience ended up being unexpected and overwhelming. Afterwards, outside the baths, I saw a lady wrapped in a towel, weeping uncontrollably. I imagine, that the lady, sitting in a wheelchair, was inconsolable that she had not been miraculously healed that day. Like that lady, millions of people are praying for healing. Some rejoice at what appears to be a miraculous cure. But at other times, there is sadness and disappointment when nothing appears changed at all. At Lourdes, only 70 healings have ever been declared as scientifically inexplicable miracles. So what about the remaining millions of people who are still awaiting God's healing? This makes you realise that we must be missing something. When we collect a prescription, we trust that the medication will make our ailments go away. At the doctors, we shake their hand, trusting that they can treat our illness. We are ecstatic when a surgeon repairs our injury or removes disease. And we thank

our pharmacist for our pills and the doctor and the surgeon for their cures. Unfortunately, like nine of the 10 lepers in Luke's gospel, we forget to give thanks and praise to God. It is as if medication is just a magic pill, rather than the result of years of work by God-gifted researchers. We thank our doctor or surgeon in relief, but forget to thank God for those who have been blessed with healing hands, gifted to assist myriads of people seeking a cure. In our forgetfulness, what we are surely missing are the millions of healings that are coming indirectly, yet obviously from God. What we are not seeing clearly is the divine link that made CS Lewis say that miracles are happening all around US.

The Bible is full of God answering prayers. But so too, pharmacies, hospitals, surgeries are full of God answering prayers. But what happens, when healing in any form, just does not come and suffering worsens and God seems not to be listening. What about

the loved ones praying deeply in faith, asking for healing? Did not Jesus say to the only leper who returned to give thanks and praise, 'your faith made you well?'

I do not think anyone has answers to questions like these. But is it possible, that not only are we not seeing the divine link, but we are not looking in the right direction either? Should we not consider, that the two Holiest people in the world, closest to God the Father, were denied, the healing they wanted? We may not be able to recount Bible verses, but we certainly remember the world's most famous story of suffering. All four Gospels intensely describe, almost hour-by-hour Jesus' arrest, trial and crucifixion. Did not Mary, Mother of Jesus, blessed and Holy and human, at some point pray fervently that, perhaps, her Son could be delivered from His fate? And Jesus, on the Mount of Olives, knowing he was going to suffer greatly, asked His Father, to take the burden from Him. In Luke 22, it is written 'And being in an agony he prayed more earnestly; and his sweat became like great drops of blood falling down to the ground.' At the ninth hour, as recorded in Matthew 27, Jesus cried loudly from the cross: 'Eli Eli Larma Sabacharnee'. My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?

The unanswered prayers of Jesus and Mary provides us with the perfect example of how to handle our own suffering. Every day of our life, God, who has already taken away the great weight of our sins, asks us to carry the

crosses we are given, with the exact same patience, humility, love and trust that Jesus and Mary carried their crosses with. Of course, we should never stop praying through illness and suffering. Healing may come, from medicine, gifted surgeons and even directly by the miraculous hand of God. But, whatever the outcome, the true healing process for each of us, actually began from the day we were born. A miraculous healing of our spirit, our sins and our broken ways. A healing that enables us to enter God's eternal Kingdom. A place where, as written in Revelation chapter 21 verse 4, God will wipe away every tear. Where there will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain. God's healing is forever with us.

Jesus faced the cross and suffered anyway, even though He specifically asked: 'Father, if You are willing, remove this cup from Me'. But He also prayed: 'Nevertheless, not my will, but yours, be done' (Luke 22:42). We pray for our healing. We also pray Thy will be done. Because ultimately, we trust in God's plan for us and the world. Even on those few occasions when it may cost us dearly.

The prayers of the two holiest people suffering on earth were not answered, because of God's love for us. Because His plan is for the good of all. Mary and Jesus knew this. And like us, were strengthened by this. We all know now, that their suffering brought

the greatest healing to all mankind, to you and to me. The healing, of forgiven sins and the promise of eternal life in the glorious embrace of God's great love. And that is the greatest healing of all.

#### Let us pray:

O God, so often we take You for granted. We take for granted that You will answer our prayers, that You will heal us and make us whole. We take for granted that You love us. Forgive us for not appreciating Your grace and presence in our lives. Help us to be more thankful. Give us faith to see You in everything and everyone around us, so that we may be truly grateful.

Holy Father, never forget Your solemn covenant and grant us new life each day. Make our hearts turn in gratitude, for all we are and have is by Your grace and we are as nothing without You. May our minds, hearts and souls sing with love and thanks to You. Grant us new hearts by the prayers of all the Saints in heaven, who always lived with grateful hearts, praising You always. In moments when we are conscious of human frailty or limitation, may we be alert to You and allow Your thoughts to stir our spirit, Your mind to encompass our thinking, and Your will to engage our will. May we reflect Your love in our families and our community; so that the world can see that we are followers of Christ and children of God, and draw others into his loving care. Amen.



# Year 8 - Marine Society Visit

#### "EUREKA!"

On Wednesday and Thursday of this week, Year 8 had a visitor from the Marine Society & Sea Cadets. Mrs Suzy Green came to provide a workshop for the students about buoyancy and vessel design. This was a fantastic opportunity for the students to be exposed to an area of STEM that they had never experienced before.



Students completed calculations and lots of practical investigation without managing to get too soaking wet! Mrs Green brought the Archimedes principle to life and the students tested the theory with their very own mini crowns complete with a hidden unknown material inside.

The Archimedes principle arose in the first century B.C. when Archimedes, a famous mathematician in his time, was asked to prove that a new crown made for Hieron, the king of Syracuse, was not pure gold as the goldsmith had claimed. Archimedes was able to determine that the crown was not pure gold due to the volume of the displaced water, because even though the weight of the crown was identical to the weight of the gold that the king gave the crown maker, the volume was different due the various densities of the metals. When Archimedes figured this out, he very famously ran through his hometown to the king shouting "Eureka!" "Eureka" means "I have it!" in Greek.

The final activity involved the students learning about vessel design, and then having a go at creating their own buoyant vessel in a bid to carry the highest number of marbles aboard.



Mrs Green finished by informing the students about the incredible opportunities that the sea cadets offer, from adventures to qualifications and future careers.

"This week we had a Marine Challenge Session, where an engineer came to the school to talk to us about how a 9,000 tonne cargo ship is buoyant on the sea. She explained how this has to do with the amount of water it displaces according to its weight. It was incredibly interesting and we also had the opportunity to make a (covered in foil) paper boat to carry 20g marbles. It was very nervewracking as my group managed 41 marbles and came second. It has been a fantastic experience. I had lots of fun and enjoyed learning something new about mass and how a huge cargo ship can float."




