

It has been an engaging, exciting and enjoyable term and I look forward to hearing about the students' adventures from the All Saints' Holiday when they return.



Year 11 - History Trip to Berlin

From 16th-21st October, three members of the History department: Mr Braniff, Mr Foley and Mr Lock accompanied by Ms North took 45 students in Year 11 to Berlin and Kraków. After an early but, smooth flight to Berlin, we were taken by coach to the Hotel Meininger where we were greeted by Steve, our guide for the duration of the tour.

Students quickly unpacked before heading off by underground to the Alexanderplatz food court for lunch. Many students decided to partake in the culinary delights of Germany's most popular dish, Currywurst, basically a fast food dish consisting of steamed, then fried pork sausage seasoned with curry ketchup!

As we left for our visit to the Berlin Wall, the clouds crowded together suspiciously overhead as the sky darkened and the inevitable downpour began. Students braved the weather and stood listening to Steve in the rain, transfixed as he mesmerised us all with stories on the many people who had lost their lives attempting to cross the wall in search of a better life in the West.

After a short trip back to the hotel for dinner, we were lucky enough to visit the Reichstag (German Parliament) and saw once again stunning views of Berlin – this time by night – from the dome of the Reichstag. Students learnt all about the history of the Reichstag Fire, a key factor enabling Hitler to consolidate a Nazi dictatorship



in the 1930s. We could also see right into the actual chamber where the current German parliament debate, prompting one student to say it was: "impressive as it suggests there are no secrets from the German people".



The group then departed for some photos of Brandenburg Gate in Berlin. Steve was excellent and the students were very engaged asking many insightful questions. It was also an opportunity for others,

including me, to purchase a doughnut or two before the walk back! Once again we were taking in some of the wonderful architecture that Berlin has to offer.

On day two, a tired group visited the sombre Plötzensee Prison, where hundreds of Germans were sentenced to death by hanging and quillotine for acts of resistance. A short coach ride on to the magnificent Olympiastadion, the current home of Hertha Berlin football club. Students learned how when the Nazis came to power in Germany (1933), they decided to use the Olympic Games in 1936 for propaganda purposes emphasising the might of the Third Reich. Staff and students alike were in awe at the sheer size and history of the stadium as we shown where black athlete Jesse Owens won his 4 Gold medals

negating Hitler's Aryan ideologies.

On returning to the city centre in the afternoon, students were given some time to eat and shop at the very glamorous Potsdamer Platz mall before another walking tour of the city taking in the iconic Jewish memorial and the Topography of Terror museum to learn about the Third Reich's effective use of the Gestapo and the SS.



Day three and students were up and out early for an uneventful nine-hour journey to Kraków. Upon arrival, and after dropping off their luggage, students were taken to the main square to soak up the atmosphere and view some of the stunning architecture. Testament to this is



the fact that during the Second World War, the Nazis decided they rather liked Krakow, so made it their home in a country whose population they wished to exterminate. While the rest of Poland was bombed, the old city was preserved.


On the fourth day students had the opportunity to visit Auschwitz/Birkenau, one of the most infamous concentration death camps built by the Nazis during WWII. It was clearly an emotional experience for staff and students alike, who were able to see up close where over one million Jews were killed (along with other minority groups such as Jehovah's Witnesses). In Auschwitz I, we were taken to see the possessions of the Jewish victims such as their shoes, luggage and even their hair, that was taken from them, as well as actually entering one of the gas chambers where scratch marks can be seen as the victims tried desperately to escape. The students were deeply affected by the visit, which can be seen in some of their own words:

"I nearly cried in Auschwitz. Whilst we are taught about the devastating tragedies that happened in this monumental place, the tone and atmosphere is truly something that can only be experienced by physically being there."

"I enjoyed Auschwitz as it was very real and reminded everyone that these things did happen. It also really helped to highlight what we learnt in lessons." "Seeing the children's clothes was really emotional."



The last full day was spent visiting the Jewish district of Kraków. Students were then given the opportunity to listen to a Romani Auschwitz survivor, whose deeply moving, personal story of the horrors she experienced was truly shocking to hear. After a short Q&A session with our speaker, we were off again for a walking tour of the wartime ghetto of Podgorze and Oskar Schindler's factory. Schindler, whose story is immortalised in Spielberg's 1993 film, 'Schindler's List', is credited



with saving the lives of 1,200 Jews during the Holocaust by

employing them in his enamelware and ammunitions factories. We then walked back to the main square via the University District, Wawel Hill and Kazimierz (the former Jewish quarter). Overall, another very busy day and students and staff alike took the opportunity to rest for an hour before dinner and a trip to the main shopping mall in Kraków for some much needed retail relaxation.



On the last day, students were up early to pack then out to the main square for lunch before returning to the hotel to vacate rooms and check out of hotel. After six eventful days the journey back to England was uneventful. We took back some incredible memories that will live with us forever. The rest of the staff and lagreed what a privilege it was to be associated with such sensitive and mature young people and for that I'd like to finish by saying a big "thank you" to you all involved!

Light shines brightest in the darkness

"You are the light of the world ... let your light shine among men that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matt. 5:14-16)

What will you do this Halloween? Join in with the secular celebrations? Creep around in the darkness? Hide with the lights off? Hustle the family out of the house? Think again. Instead, simply let your light shine! After all, where does your light shine the brightest. In the darkness! Be inspired by the Saints and remember with gratitude all those dear to you that have departed from this world. In Matthew 5:14, Jesus tells His disciples "You are the light of the world". He also calls us to illuminate and make visible the reality of Christ's presence. Remember, it is the reflection of the Light of the World, Jesus Christ Himself, that people will see in us.

In Philippians 2:15, the apostle Paul says, "Believers, you are to shine as light in the world". The Greek word used here is very



similar to the word for the beacon that a lighthouse emits. That beacon is bright and unmistakable in its purpose. It warns of danger. It directs to safe harbour. It provides hope for those who have lost hope. Every day we are surrounded by people searching around in the darkness, separated from the God who loves them. God uses His children, like beacons from a lighthouse, to show the way to Him.

As we begin our All Saints' holiday, may we take time to celebrate the feast of All Saints' Day and, on All Souls' Day, take time to pray for the faithful departed. It is comforting to know that no Christian is solitary. Through baptism that we become members together of the body of

Christ. We become members of a company of saints and our mutual belonging transcends death:

One family, we dwell in him, one Church, above, beneath; though now divided by the stream,

the narrow stream of death.

The Church of England website eloquently explains All Saints' Day and the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed on All Souls' Day:

All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, and for the wonderful ends to which it shapes a human life; it is a time to be



encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that sanctity may grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living. The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Redemption is a work of God's grace; it is God who redeems us in Christ and there is nothing to be done beyond what Christ has done. But we still wait for the final consummation of God's new creation in Christ; those who are Christ's, whether or not they have passed through death, are joined in prayer that God's kingdom will be revealed finally and in all its fullness. We also sense that it is a fearful thing to come before the unutterable goodness and holiness of God, even for those who are redeemed in Christ; it is

searing as well as life-giving to experience God's mercy.'

Reflect on these words and take time to pray this All Saints' holiday:

Dear God,

We praise you for giving us the glorious example of the Saints. We aspire to meet their company, praising you forever in Heaven. Help us to follow in their footsteps and the example of Jesus Christ. Help us submit to Your call, seeking Your order in all things, just as the Saints did. Help us to commit ourselves to Your glory, and to the service of our neighbours. As we remember those we love, but see no longer, may we give thanks for the ways that they nurtured us and touched our lives. May we remember that we are saved by your amazing grace and shine as lights in the world always.

Geography Field Trip

Last week, at 5 o'clock early Monday morning, the Year 13 Alevel Geography class headed off to Slapton Bay in the South of Devon, to undertake experiments and collect data for our Non-Examined Assessment (coursework in old money).



During the six-hour drive, we stopped off at a small town called Totnes as we have studied this area during our course. Here we experienced the town's history in a small Victorian house that had been converted into a museum. We then wandered the streets, to find an array of vintage shops, antique bookshops and even a hairy barista!

Once we arrived in Slapton, we headed straight to the coast to learn different techniques for measuring the shape and size of the beach and to be able to assess the processes at work.

The next day we drove into the city centre of Plymouth, again collecting different types of data to measure the urban growth of the area. Even though the weather was pretty awful and rained for most of the day, we





were all happy to end up nice and warm!

By the end of the week, each of us had planned and produced a selection of investigations, either about the area along the beach at Slapton Ley or about urban issues within Plymouth. These recordings are being used in our individual investigations that contribute 20% to our overall grade.









We also investigated the role of HS2 on the surrounding Chiltern Hills and this area of special scientific interest.

Finally, after seven hours of travelling we arrived home, having thoroughly enjoyed our week as well as learning all about the coast of South Devon.







Did you know?

Teenagers are more at risk on the roads than they think. Most teenagers do not realise that they are more likely to be killed or injured in a road collision than any other age group. Find out how to help your teenager stay safe.

Help protect your child

Please talk to your son or daughter and reinforce road safety messages to help keep them safe:

> Stress the need to concentrate and be careful at all times

- Warn of the dangers of distractions – listening to music, texting, phoning or even chatting to friends while walking are big distractions
- Keep talking about the dangers of traffic
- Point out people who are endangering themselves
- Encourage your teenager to practise judging the speed and distance of approaching vehicles on busy roads and identify safe gaps in the traffic
- Stress that you should never lose concentration and follow others blindly into dangerous situations



Cycling

It is a good idea to:

 Buy and encourage your son or daughter to wear a cycle helmet, and something fluorescent and

- reflective to improve their visibility
- Encourage your son or daughter never to take lifts on the back of a friend's bike
- Remind your son or daughter not to listen to music while they are cycling
- Make sure they are aware that cyclists must obey all traffic signs and traffic light signals

Becket Keys has always had a good reputation for the way our students behave when they are going home. We have teachers who walk with the students towards the High Street every day. However please remind your son/daughter to be considerate of other people and families using Sawyers Hall Lane, whether in cars or pedestrians and to acknowledge their thanks if they are given the right of way. We understand that the pavements may be congested; however, it is not sensible to walk in the road at such a busy time.

We would also remind parents to take care and be considerate of other drivers when travelling along Sawyers Hall Lane. Please note that the road by the new entrance next to the Justin Welby Building is for Grove House School (permit holders only) – please do not park there at any time.
