Having watched Eliud Kipchoge perform the impossible on Saturday 12th October in Vienna, Austria by running a sub two hour marathon, I felt compelled to learn more and to share it with our students through Collective Worship. His story is amazing. Having already failed once at completing a marathon, in under 2 hours he set out to do it again. To succeed, he would need to complete every mile just one second faster. This time he wasn't going to fail.

The preparation and attention to detail was quite breath-taking. The setting for the marathon was Vienna, and the route carefully chosen to avoid unnecessary bends and undulation, thus shaving vital seconds off his time. The day and date were chosen carefully so that the weather conditions were perfect. Vienna is close to sea level, optimising the oxygen levels in Kipchoge's blood. The time in Vienna is only

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one hour behind the time in Kenya, so Kipchoge suffered no jet lag.

Teamwork was also crucial.
Kipchoge had 41 pacemakers
who rotated in and out of the
race. All were top-level athletes.
They formed a V shape around
him to set the pace, but also to
minimise wind resistance. The
team car was fitted with a special
cruise control, more accurate
than the one in an average car.
The car emitted a green laser
light behind; the pacemakers had
to keep up with the line exactly to
ensure the record would be
broken.



The result was that Kipchoge cruised to the line with 20 seconds to spare. He had broken a widely considered impossible record. He did it by maintaining a pace of 17.2 seconds for each 100 metres – which he had to repeat 420 times in a row!

Kipchoge stated at the end of the race that 'no human is limited'. I hope that his story has inspired our students. With belief in themselves and in God, everything is possible!

Enrichment Day – November 2019

Becket Keys Church of England School has three Enrichment Days over the course of an academic year. Enrichment days, where we collapse the traditional timetable, encourage our students to thrive on challenge and respond positively to different situations. The experience of each Enrichment Day is designed to augment the current classroom curriculum and extra-curricular provision. The days include school-based events with visits or the involvement of local employers and volunteers. Occasionally, there are also visits or trips scheduled for these days. All activities are animated by a desire to offer students further opportunities to not only acquire new knowledge and understanding, but also, significantly, to develop skills and habits, which help broaden horizons and strengthen character. We desire our students to be responsible citizens and enthusiastic lifelong learners. The days provide an opportunity for students to study a subject in more detail, develop additional skills such as teamwork, and to take part in activities and challenges that are different to their normal everyday lessons. Timely delivery of elements of the Personal, Social, Heath and Economic Education (PSHEE) programmes of study and Careers Education are also facilitated by these days.

Our first Enrichment Day was yesterday. A great deal of creativity and industry was evident in the programme. We would like to thank all our wonderful staff for this and congratulate them on ensuring a very productive and enjoyable day.





Year 7 journeyed back to Medieval England to solve a mystery and study some art of the period. They also were seen around the school being creative and filming a news report.



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Year 8 focused on developing a growth mindset and teambuilding, this included working together to build newspaper towers.







Mr Sedgley was working with a group of Year 8 students and said:

"There were some excellent attempts at the newspaper tower. The winning tower was made by

'The Sailors' at 248cm (team named after their paper hat!).

Second highest 'The Giants' at 228cm – at one stage they looked like they were going to pip 'The Sailors', but couldn't quite manage.

Team groups worked exceptionally well from planning, through to team work in construction and adaptability when things didn't quite go to plan.

There were many other valiant efforts but a few of the higher towers weren't quite strong enough to stand up on their own.

Key motto of the day 'Perfect planning prevents poor performance'".



Year 9 student activities were based around the NHS. They participated in Health & Fitness sessions in the Sports Hall, a Mental Health and Body Image workshop, as well as relevant interests and skills for a career in the NHS.







The vital topics of relationships and study techniques were covered in the **Year 10** workshops. Several Christian couples visited our school to explore healthy, long lasting relationship and marriage with students! Revision and stress management tips were shared in order to help students prepare for future exams.







Year 11s were working hard during Enrichment Day on planning and preparing their English speech, as well as starting the preparations for their mock exams. Students brought in an array of revision materials to start preparing for their mock examinations in a few weeks. They have been using their learning journals to decide which type of learner they are and how best to revise for their upcoming exams. Over the last few weeks, students have been working on their revision timetables and planning how to revise certain topics. The Enrichment Day provided an opportunity for all students to revise different subjects, complete revision notes, prepare revision cards and practise past papers.

All of this in school whilst Year 12 and 13s took part in the 'London Challenge'! We look forward to hearing about their adventures next week.

FROM TRAGEDY TO HOPE



What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

Micah 6:8 (NIV)

In the face of tragedy, neglect and disaster - whether through war or terror - it is right to lament the destruction of lives and communities. In doing so we can be brought from a realm dominated by individual pain to a shared resolve for a better world. In reading the scriptures (especially psalms of lament) we can become more sensitive to the sufferings of others whose experiences may be very different, and begin to hope. Our increased understanding helps us to see what justice, peace and reconciliation might look like, and how they might be accomplished.



This will take not only courage and vision, but also the humility to listen and be changed.

Poppies growing in battle-scarred fields were the symbol of remembrance and hope adopted by the Royal British Legion; flowers which, whilst delicate, were resilient and grow in their thousands, flourishing even in the mist of chaos and destruction. Bright red Flanders poppies (Papaver rhoeas) were the inspiration of Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae's now famous poem 'In Flanders Field'.

In Flanders' fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place: and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the dead. Short days ago
We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset
glow,

Loved and were loved, and now we lie

In Flanders' fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe; To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high, If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow . In Flanders' Fields. Today, I attended a 'Remembrance for Schools' service with student representatives of Becket Keys at the Brentwood war memorial. I am also grateful that students have volunteered to help prepare and welcome those attending the civil service at St. Thomas of Canterbury Church on Sunday. In addition, I am pleased to confirm that Father Mark North will be joining us on Monday, when the whole school will be coming together on the playground for a short service, including the observation of the two minutes silence. We will remember with gratitude and also look forward and strive 'to act justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God'. The torch is ours to hold high.





We do not want any student to miss lunch or the great choice of food available every day in our restaurants so please keep the balance topped up!


