Mr Scott-Evans writes ...

Dear Parents/Carers

I expect that all of you will be aware that the Government has published guidance to support the decision that schools should be open full time for all students in September. The full guidance can be seen online and has been much reported in the media. We had already done quite a lot of work on different possible scenarios – now we are focused on the risk assessments, protocols and plans that need to be in place. These will be significantly informed by the successful experience of the last few weeks when we have had students from Years 7 to 12 on site.

There will be a range of information which we will be sending out next week and late in August, and this will need to be

read carefully. However, I thought it might be helpful to outline some of the elements here as a foundation.

The expectations are that students will continue to study the full broad curriculum in Years 7-9, and that in Years 10-13 students will continue to study all their subjects leading to public exams. This means that we will essentially be running our normal timetable in normal specialist teaching rooms. It is also expected that school uniform will be worn – we intend to follow this, although we will ask students with PE on a certain day to come to school in PE kit to avoid too much use of changing rooms.

Following the guidance, we will be minimising contact between students in different year groups.

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This will be achieved through staggering of various timings and through limiting things like extracurricular clubs which normally see students from different years working together. Within classrooms, desks will face the front. Hygiene and ventilation measures will be particularly important and there will be supplies of hand sanitiser in every room, and on every entry and exit point into every single building. We will also install stations for this outside so they can be used on arrival to school.

Transport to and from school presents a considerable challenge. The government quidance encourages walking or cycling, but this is clearly not practical for everyone. The guidance recommends use of face coverings and hand sanitiser for those who must use public transport. We will be talking to the NIBS Buses about arrangements on routes that they facilitate, but as a school we do not have any authority over the companies who provide transport.

We will send out further information about arrangements for students who are currently shielding or self-isolating. Although we would like to see as full attendance as possible, we do understand that there may be serious individual medical, or family circumstances and we respect this.

We hope that the school will continue to remain open

throughout next term, but we should be prepared for either a partial shutdown (e.g. for a year group) or a shutdown of all schools in the area. Staff have learnt a lot from the past term's experience, and we will be building on this to try to ensure a smooth transition to remote learning using Microsoft Teams for all classes in the school, should this be needed. We would ask that all parents try to make sure that their son/daughter can safely and reliably access the internet from home as we plan in event of a lockdown to make more use of Teams for teachers to keep in contact (for example at the start of each "lesson" at the scheduled time and to check for queries). We will continue to use Show My Homework (Satchel One), our VLE and occasionally other platforms for setting and collecting work.

I would like to thank all parents for their support. Your feedback to our recent survey (please check your emails) has been extremely encouraging and understanding. It is an extraordinarily challenging time for many people in our community and I hope that we will continue to support each other as we have done in the past months.

I look forward to writing to you in more detail about our plans for September next week.





Mathematics Department

Maths Challenge

After a delay to the usual event, in June, over 120 students from Year 7 and 8 were invited to take part in the annual UKMT Junior Maths Challenge.

The UKMT individual mathematics challenges are a national competition involving lively, intriguing multiple choice question papers, which are designed to stimulate interest in mathematics in large numbers of pupils.

The three levels cover the secondary school range 11-18 and together they attract over 600,000 entries from over 4,000 schools and colleges. The papers contain 25 multiple choice questions. Of these, the first 15 are more accessible whilst the final 10 will provide more of a challenge.

Gold, silver and bronze certificates are awarded to 40% of participants nationally. This usually takes place with paper certificates presented in the hall, but this year we went online for the first time as we learnt a new way to work in lockdown. Students had to complete the challenge under timed conditions. We had an excellent turn out and well done to all that entered. We are pleased to share the results of those that have excelled in the competition.





Charities Update

It has been lovely to hear from Anne Cheng at New Hope Children's Centre this week. Let me share her news.

'Firstly, thankfully, everybody remains well at the centre. One young man, known to us all as 'B' broke his arm and it wasn't healing properly. The only way to get him to a specialist to correct the problem we had was it was necessary to raise £1500, as the regular health service in Kenya would not provide this service. In a fantastic gesture of generosity, regular supporters of New Hope have fundraised this amount of money, so B will be able to get his broken arm sorted!

The centre is currently caring for over 110 children and young people up to the age of 19. Having enough food is a daily challenge, particularly at this time.



Sadly, during the Covid virus pandemic we have seen a dramatic increase in the number of abandoned babies, some slightly older, others new born. New Hope has taken in and is now caring for seven babies who were abandoned since the start of the virus. Here you can see the youngest, who was

abandoned at just one day old (we think). Now, thanks to New Hope he is a healthy 4 week old baby boy.



They have all been practising and we are making sure that they are doing this regularly. The main person behind making this happen was one of the children, 7 year old Jane. She had asked Anne what would happen if she didn't wash her hands - would she die? Anne explained that she wouldn't die but that she might get very sick and have to go to hospital. She started washing her hands thoroughly from that moment, and has ensured that all of the other younger children have learnt how to do the same'.

The news I get from New Hope reminds me of what an incredible place it is, and I look forward to being able to return there again. If you want to visit their website, the link is



ARE YOU LISTENING?

Take a few moments to quiet yourself. Breathe slowly and deeply and become aware of God present in this moment with you.



In Matthew Chapter 13 verses 7—9 we read:

"Some seed fell among the thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked it. But some seed fell on rich soil, and produced fruit, a hundred or sixty or thirtyfold. Whoever has ears ought to hear."



In the parable of the sower, Jesus tells his listeners that in the act of scattering seed, some seed fell on unsuitable soil and withered. However, the seed that fell on rich soil grew and produced an abundance of fruit. God's Word, heard by those willing to accept it, will also bear an abundance of fruit. Christians are called to be faithful to the task of proclaiming the truth of God's Word, having faith that those words will find rich soil and produce abundant fruit.



What kind of soil would you use to describe your spiritual life at this time?

What message does God's Word have for you today?

In prayer, we experience God's love. In our response, we humbly return that love. And, if we have ears to hear, God always pushes us to go deeper. Jesus' life shows us that prayer always extends to our neighbour; it pushes us to notice the divine spark in all of God's children, to show love without reservation. It is this love that bears much fruit for the Kingdom.

Speak to Jesus, using this prayer or a prayer of your own and listen:

Jesus, you are the master farmer. Help me to follow your example of planting with grace, confidence, and love. Help me to have a listening ear and to hear all that You have to say to me. Give me a teachable spirit and may I grow in a knowledge of You. Help me to

trust implicitly Your Word, for Your Word is truth. In Jesus name I pray, **Amen**.



In the coming days, set aside a little extra time to pray and read the Bible. God sent His only begotten Son into the world and He expects us to listen to Him. God speaks to us through His Word; His living Word (the Lord Jesus Christ) and His written Word (the Holy Scriptures). God calls us to 'hear Him', because faith comes by hearing and hearing from the Word of God. Many times in scripture we are admonished: he who hath ears to hear, let him hear!


Music Department
