Research into Breast Cancer.


Research into Childhood Cancer.

Black History Month

October marks British Black History Month which commemorates all that black people have contributed to history.

Some of our Sixth Form students have been sharing just a few of the many Black Britons who have made their mark.

Mary Seacole



Mary Seacole was a nurse who funded her own trip from Britain to the Crimea to take part in the war effort. She risked her life going out on the frontline and frequently came under fire while bringing support to wounded and dying soldiers.

John Kent



John Kent was a British police constable at Maryport, then with the Carlisle City Police, and is reported to be the first black police officer in Britain.

Maggie Aderin-Pocock



Maggie Aderin-Pocock is a space scientist and educator.

Since 2014, she has co-presented the long running astronomy TV programme The Sky At Night.

In 2013, she was named on the UK Power List as one of the UK's most influential black people.

Sharon White



Sharon White spent two years as the second permanent secretary at HM Treasury, the first black person and the second woman, to hold the position.

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She took over as chief executive of telecoms regulator Ofcom in March 2015.

Samuel Coleridge-Taylor



Samuel Coleridge-Taylor was one of few black classical composers to catch the imagination of the white British musical establishment.

Claudia Jones



Claudia Jones, Claudia Vera Cumberbatch was a Trinidad and Tobago-born journalist and activist who was deported from America for her communist views. She founded Britain's first major black newspaper, West Indian Gazette

She was also the founder of the Notting Hill Carnival

Margaret Busby



Margaret Yvonne Busby OBE, Hon. FRSL is a Ghanaian-born publisher, editor, writer and broadcaster, resident in the UK.

She was Britain's youngest and first black female book publisher when in the 1960s she cofounded with Clive Allison the London-based publishing house Allison and Busby.

Clive Sullivan

Clive A. Sullivan MBE (9 April 1943 — 8 October 1985) was a Welsh rugby league player.

A Great Britain and Wales international winger Captaining Great Britain in 1972 he was the first black captain for Great Britain in any sport.




Diane Abbott

Diane Julie Abbott is a British politician who served as the Shadow Home Secretary in the Shadow Cabinet of Jeremy Corbyn from 2016 to 2020.

She has been the Member of Parliament for Hackney North and Stoke Newington since 1987.

She made history as the first black woman to be elected to Parliament, and she is the longest-serving black MP in the House of Commons



My apprenticeship is a level 7 degree apprenticeship in Accounting and Finance with a company called Mazars which is an audit, accounting and tax advisory service. I have only just started studying for my first accounting exam and if I'm being honest you need to make sure you know what you're applying for and if there's any pre-course material to give you a head start as it is really beneficial.

Being honest and fair with your time on both weekdays and weekends are key if the work load for you apprenticeship is high. However, it's really important to look after yourself whether that's physically or mentally as you're the key to your own success. Also, don't feel scared to ask for help if you are struggling as there will be so many people in the same position as you that will enjoy working with you and you'll learn so much from each other also it builds a close relationship with not only a colleague but a future friend. To be honest I enjoying making money! Whether that's personally or for the business it works in my favour. I think the idea of learning and earning just suits me better as an individual. Also, after 22 months I will be at the same level as graduates minus the debt so that's even better.

The challenges I am currently facing comes from the work, social life balance. Sometimes, it's hard to "switch off" when you're working full time but make

sure you're having frequent breaks and enjoying the times where you're in your own space doing what makes you feel the most relax. For me that is listening to music. Finally, I have enjoyed the social interactions with all the new recruits. There are 164 new joiners, both being school leavers or graduates. It's nice to have a mix as you learn a lot from your older peers and you're on the same page as the school leavers so it makes it a lot easier if you're unsure about something you're working on.

Overall, in my opinion the apprenticeship route is a great way to both develop yourself in the working world and meet loads of new people. However, university is great too as a lot of my school mates are truly loving the university life and the independence of the experience. Either way you're going to love it you just need to find your niche and what best suits you.

I applied to the University of Essex this year through Clearing after taking a gap year to work

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abroad in the entertainment industry. I am studying BA Drama at the Colchester campus.

The Brentwood Foodbank is part of The Trussell Trust's network of 428 foodbanks, working to tackle food poverty and hunger in the local community, as well as across the UK.

The Foodbank Network was founded in 2004 after four years of developing the original foodbank based in Salisbury. Since then The Trussell Trust has helped communities work together to launch foodbanks nationwide in a wide range of towns and cities.

In 2019/20, The Trussell Trust's Foodbank Network provided 1,900,122 three-day emergency food supplies and support to UK people in crisis. Of these, 720,504 went to children.





Recipe of the Week

Minestrone Soup

Serves 2

Ingredients

1 Teaspoon Veg Oil
1/2 Onion chopped
1/2 Carrot - chopped
1/2 stick celery - chopped
1 Clove Garlic – crushed
1 tsp tomato puree
1/3rd can chopped tomatoes
200ml water
1 pinch Dried Herbs
1 tsp broken spaghetti pieces

1 Teaspoon Peas

1 Teaspoon Sweetcorn

Method

Carefully chop the "soffrito" of celery, carrot, garlic and onion and gently sauté them in the oil until the onions are translucent, about 6-8 minutes.

Add the tomato puree and cook out for 2 minutes.

Add the tomatoes, water, herbs and pasta.

Simmer for 10 minutes then add peas and sweetcorn and cook for a further 5 minutes.

Carefully pour into a bowl and enjoy.



Light shines brightest in the darkness

"You are the light of the world ... let your light shine among men that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matt. 5:14-16)

What will you do this Halloween? Join in with the secular celebrations? Creep around in the darkness? Hide with the lights off? Hustle the family out of the house? Think again. Instead, simply let your light shine! After all, where does your light shine the brightest but in the darkness! Be inspired by the Saints and remember with gratitude all those dear to you that have departed from this world. In Matthew 5:14, Jesus tells His disciples "You are the light of the world". He also calls us to illuminate and make visible the reality of Christ's presence. Remember, it is the reflection of the Light of the World, Jesus Christ Himself, that people will see in us.

In Philippians 2:15, the apostle Paul says, "Believers, you are to shine as light in the world". The



Greek word used here is very similar to the word for the beacon that a lighthouse emits. That beacon is bright and unmistakable in its purpose. It warns of danger. It directs to safe harbour. It provides hope for those who have lost hope. Every day we are surrounded by people searching around in the darkness, separated from the God who loves them. God uses His children, like beacons from a lighthouse, to show the way to Him.

As we begin our All Saints' holiday, may we take time to celebrate the feast of All Saints' Day and, on All Souls' Day, take time to pray for the faithful departed. It is comforting to know that no Christian is solitary. Through baptism that we become members together of the body of Christ. We become members of a company of saints and our mutual belonging transcends death:

One family, we dwell in him, one Church, above, beneath; though now divided by the stream, the narrow stream of death.

The Church of England website eloquently explains All Saints' Day and the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed on All Souls' Day:

'All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, and for the wonderful ends to which it shapes a human life; it is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that sanctity may grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living. The Commemoration of



the Faithful Departed celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Redemption is a work of God's grace; it is God who redeems us in Christ and there is nothing to be done beyond what Christ has done. But we still wait for the final consummation of God's new creation in Christ; those who are Christ's, whether or not they have passed through death, are joined in prayer that God's kingdom will be revealed finally and in all its fullness. We also sense that it is a fearful thing to come before the unutterable goodness and holiness of God, even for those who are redeemed in Christ; that it is searing as well as life-giving to experience God's mercy.'

Reflect on these words and take time to pray this All Saints' holiday:

Dear God,

We praise you for giving us the glorious example of the Saints. We aspire to meet their company, praising you forever in Heaven. Help us to follow in their footsteps and the example of Jesus Christ. Help us submit to Your call, seeking Your order in all things, just as the Saints did. Help us to commit ourselves to Your glory, and to the service of our neighbours. As we remember those we love, but see no longer, may we give thanks for the ways that they nurtured us and touched our lives. May we remember that we are saved by your amazing grace and shine as lights in the world always.
