What do you call a year like 2020?

Our Advent season started this week. Our reading for 2nd
December was Isaiah 9 v 6 which tells us that 'a child is born, a son is given' and lists some of his names: 'Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace'. Look at the names Jesus is given. There is no doubt who we are worshiping!

Names are some of the most powerful words we can use. When I introduce myself, I give my name and the name of the school as two features of who I am.

You may know my first names are: Andrew Peter. Andrew was the first disciple that Jesus called, and Peter (his brother) was the disciple chosen by Jesus to build His church. I feel honoured to have such special names,

especially this week (St Andrew's Day – 30th November).

The name of the school is Becket Keys. After much thought and deliberation, I chose that name because I wanted to subtly recognise the incredible work of the two founding Primary Schools without whose generosity and spirit this school would not exist. Firstly, my previous school: St Thomas of Canterbury (St Thomas à Becket) and secondly: St Peter's (The Keys of St Peter). The subtle naming made sure that other schools would not feel excluded or unwelcome. All are welcome here. However, our school's name distinctly records the input of the founding team.

Face coverings are **absolutely compulsory** for students in the following areas:


- Stairwells

There will also be a session for students who may be considering colleges run by Mrs Ellis.






Student Contact Information




In sentences:



Bring the Christian message of hope and peace





Comfort from Mary

"His Mother Mary kneeling down, Unto the Lord did pray. O tidings of comfort and joy Comfort and joy"



As we approach Christmas, the church's mission is to 'Rejoice with those who rejoice, and comfort those who mourn' (Romans 12 v 15). Mary can be identified as a source of spiritual comfort that also leads to joy in Christ, through her love of God and care for God incarnate. She also demonstrated that it is completely human to feel lots of different emotions. She rejoiced in Christ's birth, but also was bore the pain of Christ's humanity. I

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wonder if at the foot of His cross, she knelt and prayed, in the same way that she may have done at His birth. Through all, she remained committed to our salvation.

Thinking back to the first Christmas, it could hardly be described as 'comfortable'! Mary, the mother of Jesus, and Joseph, her husband, had to experience discomfort in order for the first Christmas to happen:



'In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you." Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end." "How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?" The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. Even Elizabeth your relative is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be unable to

conceive is in her sixth month. For no word from God will ever fail." "I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May your word to me be fulfilled." Then the angel left her.'

Luke 1:26-38

Mary did what God asked, even though it meant giving up her comfort. In addition, Joseph, her husband, was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace. He had in mind to divorce her quietly, but, after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit." Joseph also did what God asked, even though it meant giving up his comfort.

Whilst Mary and Joseph chose to give up their comfort, they gained something incredible. They became part of the greatest moment in history, the birth of our Saviour! You and I may never

be visited by an angel, but we all have the same choice to make. Christmas is not about you, me, or our comfort, it is about the coming of our Saviour.

So, this Christmas, how can we get a little uncomfortable in order to be part of something bigger than ourselves? Maybe we could:

- Be kind to someone you struggle to like.
- Volunteer to serve someone who is hurting or in need.
- Ask for less and give away more.

Mary's example can provide us with comfort. Faith and trust in the Lord can also provide comfort, but also calls us to step out of our comfort zone and reach out to others. What might God's plan for you be?

Let us pray:

Dear God,
We thank you for the example of
Mary. This Advent and Christmas,
may we take time to pray and seek
direction from our Lord. May we
find comfort and draw nearer and
nearer to the joy of Christ. Help us
bring tidings of comfort and joy to
all we meet, through the true
meaning of Christmas.


