Dear Parents & Carers,

REMOTE LEARNING QUESTIONNAIRE

Thank you very much to everyone who filled in the questionnaire about their son or daughter's experiences of remote learning. It is very helpful to have this feedback. Overall, there was an extremely positive response to how we have been trying to organise things in this current phase of being away from school, but it is always useful to understand where there are issues or frustrations. It is also a real encouragement to me and the staff to have your positive feedback. Many of you have said that you keep meaning to write in and that this has given you a simple opportunity to do that!

Staff will be reviewing the responses in detail with Governors next week and I will attach a summary report with the newsletter. If you have not responded yet, please do so. The link was in the email that we sent out with this week's newsletter.



OUTLOOK FOR THE RETURN TO SCHOOL

The announcement last week that schools will not return until 8th March at the earliest gives us more certainty about the next few weeks ahead of us. On that basis, we are using the responses from the surveys to think about some of the changes that we would like to make.

We will have to wait and see what further announcements there are: we have been told that we will get two weeks' notice before any wider re-opening of schools. The rationale for that includes the Government's intention that all students would be tested in our lateral flow test centre before returning. We do not know whether different regions of the country will be treated differently in response to different infection rates or indeed new variants of the virus being detected (or not!) in certain places. Nor do we know whether particular year groups will be treated in different ways.

Put simply, we cannot assume that schools will be fully returning on the 8th March and should only regard this date as an earliest possibility. My own prayer is that we can reopen as soon as possible and I long for a time when it will be appropriate to do so.



PUBLIC EXAMS INFORMATION

The consultation over what takes the place of public exams has now closed. Hopefully, it should not be too long before we have confirmation of what will be happening as regards those "exams". I continue to talk with colleagues at The Russell Education Trust and Essex Local Authority about our plans to respond to whatever the

government announces. We are ready and confident. Once we know more, I will write to you in detail.

I have been very pleased to hear that classes have continued to work hard through this current period of uncertainty and remote learning – that is a real credit to all those involved. Students have a lot of curriculum to still cover and are doing so in the most challenging of circumstances. Additionally, everyone is pulling together marvellously to make sure the exam year groups get the best possible chance to secure good grades this summer.



PARENTS EVENINGS AND YEAR 9 OPTIONS.

Thank you for your warm and generous feedback regarding our recent parents' evenings. The technical issues we experienced earlier in the term seem to have been ironed out by the company we use, and these are running very smoothly.

Year 9s had their parents' evening this week and I know that attention will start to turn towards options once the next round of assessments has been sat. We have plans in place to support parents and students with this process and we will be hosting meetings using MS Teams for families to attend.

LATERAL FLOW TESTING

We have started to run lateral flow testing in school – for staff who are in school. I am very grateful to all those parents and friends of the school who are involved as volunteers. I had a test myself on Monday and was extremely impressed with the set up.

I would like to thank everyone once again for their prayerful support in the face of adversity. It is a period of time which presents difficulties and sadness on a scale which is sometimes extremely challenging for members of our community. In various ways parents send their love and support to the school and I am sorry that I do not manage to write back to everyone. However, please be assured that we are very grateful to you all. I would like to finish by thanking all the staff and students for their wonderful efforts over these past few weeks since Christmas. It is so pleasing and reassuring to see everyone working so hard to make the best of the situation we are in. If we keep pulling together, we will get through this and come out on the other side even stronger than we are already.

Time to Read!


A message from Esther Menon, Lead English Adviser from the Russell Education Trust, and RET Subject Leaders of English.

At this challenging time in the real world, there has never been a better moment to curl up with a good book to escape into another reality!

Here is 'a baker's dozen' of texts that we recommend for Key Stage 3 students. These authors have all written other novels too, so we hope these will encourage our students to read on and follow a pathway to more. A few books below, as noted, are recent publications in successful book series, so start with the first in the series and then you have lots to read afterwards! They are listed in approximate order of reading difficulty in each of the two categories - newly published and established favourites.


Some of these test are "gritty" and we advise parents to check their suitability.

Newly published:




Gamer by Chris Bradford

Scott jumps at the chance to be a Virtual Kombat gamer and battle his way up the ranks. But then his friend Kate goes missing in the battle arena, and Scott's reality becomes a nightmare ... The first book in a dystopian trilogy. Particularly suitable for students who find reading difficult.



D-Day Dog by Tom Palmer

A prize-winning book about a boy who is interested in war and heroes. When his dad is called to action and things at home get chaotic, Jack starts to question his interest in war. Finding comfort only in the presence of his loyal dog, Finn, Jack finds out about true story of a particular D-Day paratrooper. On 6 June 1944, Emile Corteil parachuted into France with his dog, Glen - and Jack explores what happened to them. Published by the always excellent Barrington Stoke who produce 'super-readable books' for students who find reading more difficult, this book is accessible but addresses topics that will be of interest to Key-Stage-3-age students.



The Humiliations of Welton Blake by Alex Wheatle

A prolific and popular author, who visited Bristol Free School last. This funny book is about the trials and tribulations of teenage life. A good introduction to reading Wheatle's books, for reluctant readers, and a step on for students who like the Tom Gates series by Liz Pichon. This book might encourage students to tackle the popular South Crongton Trilogy series next, which is equally lively but a slightly more challenging read.




The Night Bus Hero by Onjali Raúf The third standalone book from this author, which considers what it is to have a bad reputation and how a boy who is always in trouble wants to prove he can also be a hero. A book with some comic moments and lively views about school and people, which also tackles some serious issues such as homelessness and how others see us. The opening pages will definitely encourage you to read more.




A Kind of Spark by Elle McNicoll

Shortlisted for the 2021 Blue Peter Book Award for fiction. This story is told by Addie, an 11 year old autistic girl, who is shocked when she learns how witches in her village were persecuted in ancient times for being different. She starts a lobby for a memorial for the many women in the history of her village who were arrested, persecuted and executed for being witches. A book about fairness, human rights, friendship and school life. Written by an author who is, herself, neurodivergent.



Crossover by Kwame Alexander

For those with sport and particularly basketball in their blood, an energetic and innovative read. Written in short sections of text in a poetic style, the episodes of this text touch on relationships, sport and the rules of both games. This prize-winning book has been a popular read with the three boys I have passed it to. The graphic novel version was published last year.



One of Us Is Lying by Karen M McManus

Five students go to detention. Only four leave alive. A Page 4 of 23 gripping whodunnit with lots of twists and turns. (I know this because I've had to stop late-night reading of this book in my own household this lockdown!) This is the first in a series of 3 exciting books with an American high school setting. Suitable for more mature KS3 students (includes swearing).




Chasing the Stars by Malorie Blackman

A dystopian novel which touches on some more mature issues of love and relationships, this is a book that will certainly transport readers to another place. As the novel opens Vee and her brother, Aidan, are the only survivors after an incurable virus wreaked havocontheir Earth research vessel, leaving their parents dead. They are trying to reach Earth, their grandparents, the familiar, when Vee as acting captain makes a split-second decision to rescue other human settlers. Suitable for older KS₃ readers.






The Skulduggery Pleasant Series by Derek Landy


One of the long-awaited books of last year for many Key Stage 3 students – book 13 in the series. If you've not read this series, then start with book 1, Skulduggery Pleasant - a blend of magic, humour and adventure probably best summed up by the images below. Book 14 in the series is released this April.





Wonder by R.J. Palacio

After being home-schooled for years, Auggie Pullman is about to start fifth grade, but he's worried: how will he fit into middle-school life when he looks so different from everyone else? A book about friendship, determination, and acceptance.



Wolf Brother by Michelle Paver

This is the first book in the Chronicles of Ancient Darkness series. Book 8 (Skin Taker) is due out this April. A great fantasy series which will transport you to past times alongside the themes of survival, magic and folklore. For adults or able older readers in the family, who might want to join in with reading some Michelle Paver, her ghostly adult novel set in the Arctic, Dark Matter, is a compelling read.

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The Lie Tree by Frances Hardinge

When Faith's father dies under mysterious circumstances it is up to her to uncover the truth with the help of one of her father's plants: a tree that feeds on lies. A mysterious story which involves crime, deception, and fantasy – a dark and exciting read. A book for confident readers.



Bodyguard by Chris Bradford

the great Young Samurai series.
Bodyguard is an action-adventure
series that fans of Cherub and
Alex Rider will love. This is Lee
Child for younger readers — an
adolescent Jason Bourne for

Prayers for the Nation

Last week we shared the open letter from Archbishops Justin Welby and Stephen Cottrell inviting everyone across England – whether they have faith or not, to pause, reflect on the "enormity of this pandemic" and to pray.

Death, they insist, does not have "the last word", and the Christian faith promises that one day "every tear will be wiped away".

God, they write, knows grief and suffering and "shares in the weight of our sadness".

Acknowledging the wider impact of the pandemic on the whole of society through loneliness, anxiety and economic hardship, they invite people to "cast their fears on God".

The letter also speaks of the particular impact of the pandemic on poorer communities, minority ethnic communities and those living with disabilities. It acknowledges the many who have lost their livelihoods as a result of the economic impact of the pandemic and it speaks about those unable to be with loved ones as they died or even at their graveside because of the restrictions.



The archbishops give thanks for NHS and social care staff, who they describe as "a blessing and lifeline for our nation"; for clergy, other frontline workers and "so many good neighbours". They give thanks for the development of vaccines and reiterate a call to everyone to take the vaccine when it is offered.

They also urge people to support each other both by following the guidelines to limit the spread of the virus and in practical ways, reaching out in care and kindness.

The letter includes an invitation to everyone – whether they have faith or not – to join the archbishops in pausing and praying each day at 6pm.

The archbishops write: "100,000 isn't just an abstract figure. Each number is a person: someone we loved and someone who loved us. We also believe that each of

these people was known to God and cherished by God.
"We write to you then in consolation, but also in encouragement, and ultimately in the hope of Jesus Christ. The God who comes to us in Jesus knew grief and suffering himself. On the cross, Jesus shares the weight of our sadness."

They conclude: "Most of all, we have hope because God raised Jesus from the dead. This is the Christian hope that we will be celebrating at Easter.

"We live in the hope that we will share in his resurrection. Death doesn't have the last word. In God's kingdom, every tear will be wiped away.

"Please be assured of our prayers. Please join us."

Details for the Lent Holiday

Essex County Council have confirmed they will provide Free School Meals vouchers during the Lent Holiday via their voucher provider Wonde. This was the system used during the Christmas break and at the start of the academic year.

Parents and guardians of eligible children will receive an email from Wonde next week (8th - 12th February). This message will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'school vouchers' page where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed

off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.


Do you enjoy creative writing? Perhaps, you are a budding poet...

It is night and they have just one lamp.


People that cross the bridge must carry the lamp to see the way. A pair must walk together at the rate of the slower person:


- Rachel: -takes 1 minute to cross

- Yvonne: takes 10 minutes to cross


The second fastest solution gets the friends across in 21 minutes. The fastest takes 17 minutes.



Hope within us!

"There were days when I felt great anxiety, but when you are a nurse you show up and do your job – not because it is work, but because every nurse has a passion for compassionate care. This is the reason we show up and do our jobs well."



These are the words of Dorcas Boamah, a nutrition clinical nurse, who was named as one of the Royal College of Nursing's Rising Star Awards winners in December. During the pandemic, she volunteered to work for six weeks at the Nightingale Hospital. This was her first experience of ICU. In news reports she describes how challenging the environment was; every day would bring a new experience and mixed emotions. However, she wanted to make a difference.

It is her commitment to compassionate care that I relate to. Both my parents have medical backgrounds and, prior to moving into education, I was an auxiliary theatre nurse. I see 'passion for compassion' in the NHS and in the school community of Becket Keys as well. Differences in

expression, but something deeply rooted in a call and desire to serve.

Natalie Forrest, chief executive of Chase Farm Hospital met Dorcas at the Nightingale Hospital. She nominated her for the Rising Star Award. She said:

"Dorcas is charismatic, positive and oozes a fun personality - but she is also hardworking, and really demonstrates values that make her stand out."

In a church interview, she described the surprise of colleagues when she would spontaneously say 'Thank you God' at the end of a shift. What was she thankful for? She was thankful for being able to show God to others. She was thankful for being able to walk with God through the pandemic and for the knowledge that He was with her

in all the uncertainty. This is what made Dorcas stand out! She lived out her Christian values, even amid uncertainty, as she had confidence and assurance in the hope that comes from Jesus.

In Romans 12 verse 12, we read:

'Be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer.'

What powerful words to describe our lives in Christ! These three commands are key to the emotional and spiritual wellbeing of every Christian. In a difficult time, while waiting in hope, we should pray. As prayer brings a connection to God through the Holy Spirit (Romans 8:26-27). He hears, understands, and helps in response to even our clumsiest attempts to communicate with Him. Hope has a name - Jesus!

Let us pray:


