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The Log and the Speck – Guest Writer: Tobias Hancox Year 12

On Thursday 30th September 2021, Pastor Peter Jordan from Sawyers Church came to answer any (and all!) questions that my Core Religion class had. This sort of experience is common at Becket Keys Sixth Form as we are all encouraged to get involved with our local community and discover as much as possible. However, this was a little different.

Pastor Jordan was an excellent speaker, and it was a shame that we were limited to only 50 minutes of interaction. However, two weeks prior to the Q and A session, we were given a heads up by Mr Scott-Evans that we should prepare some questions to ask

the guest. But this is all the forewarning we had, the nature and theme of the question was up to us.

Personally, I struggled to come up with questions that were original and challenging for Pastor Jordan, as well as questions that I actually wanted to know the answer to. Finally, I found a rich vein of questions that I took a liking towards. My first was: **Do** you think society would/could exist without religion? Pastor Jordan's reply was as follows: No, I don't believe it could. I was a policeman when I was younger and the way that we handled things and the way the justice system works, there are many similarities to the 'rules' of many religions. For example, the ten commandments of Judaism and Christianity can be seen in the laws of many countries.

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This was an intriguing answer that provoked thought and discussion not only in the session but also within friendship groups. The consensus was that without religion, how is 'right' and 'wrong' defined? You need religion, whether you are a believer or not, to function within society, otherwise, 'right' becomes anything for selfish gain and 'wrong' becomes anything that harms personal profit.

Pastor Jordan then went on to talk more about his younger experiences and life as a policeman in east London. He explained the difficulties of remaining a Christian in the force as it was hard for him to share his faith and slowly Jordan drifted from God. Jordan was aware of his wanderings and as things became harder in the police, and as he experienced more and more horrible situations, Pastor Jordan was struggling. He described a particularly terrible case which nearly sent him to the point of no return, but instead he decided to revisit a church and reconnect with God. He used the word 'catalyst' to show how the things he saw as a policeman sped up the process of returning to God. I really enjoyed this story as it emphasised how, out of the suffering of this broken world, God prevailed to bring home the one who perseveres.

This led to the next couple of chapters of his life and his journey into Pastorship. Pastor Jordan's spiritual experience of reconnection and the feeling of warmth of God's love enraptured him again inspiring him to stay in the police force until he was ready for leading a church. Now he is the Pastor for Sawyers Church which meets at Becket Keys every Sunday. In addition to this, he is also involved in training new and young pastors to feel confident in God in their endeavours.

This brings us to my final question that I posed to Pastor Jordan: What is more important for you: strengthening your faith? Or the faith of your congregation? | could tell by his facial expression that this was the sort of challenging question that he could sink his teeth into and discuss! This is a tricky one, whichever answer I choose has potential criticism. Okay, I think that strengthening your own faith is more important, purely because I believe you cannot lead others, such as a congregation, if you yourself are not in a good position with God. How about you, what do you think? He had thrown the question back at me, something which is not done very much at these sorts of events, but I enjoyed the opportunity to share what I thought. At this point I quoted *Matthew 7:5* "first take the plank out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye." This is the Parable of the Log and the Speck, and I used it to explain that I agreed with what he had said, it would be hypocritical and foolish to try and lead others if you cannot walk

yourself. As a young Christian myself, this is helpful as it gives clarity on how to care for those around you, by not judging but by leading by example.

Thank you, Pastor Peter Jordan, your life stories, and answers to all our questions were amazing to listen to and we hope you will come again to share new stories, answer difficult questions, and occasionally ask questions of us.



Mandarin Department – MEP Hurdle Test



What is hurdle test?

Every year, our Mandarin
Excellent Programme students
will have a hurdle test as the end
of year exam. Their four skills,
listening, reading, writing, and
speaking will all be tested. In
other words, the MEP hurdle test
is like a mini-GCSE exam.
Because of the pandemic, the
hurdle test was replaced by a
showcase in 2020. So, this year
was the very first time our MEP
students took their hurdle test,
and they have done an amazing
job!

The results for each year group are here:

Year 8

58.6% of the students achieved Gold 31% of the students achieved Silver 10% of the students achieved Bronze

Year 9

23.8% of the students achieved Gold

38% of the students achieved Silver 28.6% of the students achieved Bronze

It is worth mentioning that several students in both year groups have achieved outstanding grades, their score exceeds 90%. This is even harder, especially for Year 9, because of the large amount and depth of the knowledge they need to master.

Below is the list of these outstanding students:
Congratulations to all our students on their commitment and hard work, especially for achieving such a good result in

spite of very difficult circumstances. We want the 2021 Hurdle Tests to be a celebration of hard work and determination.

BRENTWOOD FOODBANK HELPING LOCAL PEOPLE IN CRISIS

The Harvest Appeal at Becket Keys may have finished however you can still contribute to the local Foodbank.

The Brentwood Foodbank is part of The Trussell Trust's network of 428 foodbanks, working to tackle food poverty and hunger in the local community, as well as across the UK.

The Foodbank Network was founded in 2004 after four years of developing the original foodbank based in Salisbury. Since then The Trussell Trust has helped communities work together to launch foodbanks nationwide in a wide range of towns and cities.

In 2019/20, The Trussell Trust's Foodbank Network provided 1,900,122 three-day emergency food supplies and support to UK people in crisis. Of these, 720,504 went to children.

Recipe of the Week

This week Mrs Mullan is sharing one of her best-loved recipes. Mrs Mullan often bakes this for her friends and family and it is considered the best carrot cake recipe!

Ingredients

Zest and juice from 1 orange 50g sultanas 150ml sunflower oil, plus extra for greasing 2 eggs 140g soft light brown sugar 85g wholemeal self-raising flour 85g self-raising flour 2 tsp each ground cinnamon and 1 tsp ground mixed spice 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda 140g carrots, coarsely grated 50g walnuts, chopped, plus a few halves to decorate

For the icing:

- 200g soft cheese (I always use full fat Philadelphia)
- 50g butter, softened
- 85g icing sugar, sifted

Method

If you are able to plan ahead, the night before, put the orange zest and juice in a bowl with the sultanas. If you do not have time for this then simply stir the zest, juice, and sultanas together and microwave on Medium for 1-2 mins.



Heat oven to 18oC/16oC fan/gas 4.

Grease and line the base and sides of a 2lb loaf tin.

Whisk together the oil and eggs.

Mix the sugar, flours, mixed spice, cinnamon, and bicarb in your largest mixing bowl. Add the sultanas with any juice and zest left in the bowl, grated carrot, walnuts and whisked egg mixture into the dry ingredients, then thoroughly mix with a wooden spoon.

Tip into the loaf tin and bake on the middle shelf for 1 hour, or until a skewer comes out clean.

Cool the cake in the tin.

Once the cake is cool, remove from the tin and make the icing. With an electric whisk beat together butter, cinnamon and icing sugar until it comes together and is smooth. It takes a little while to come together (will look like breadcrumbs for a bit). Add the cream cheese and beat briefly until soft and smooth. Be careful not to overbeat or the cream cheese may split and become runny. Spread over the top of the cake and decorate with walnut halves.



out and support people through hard times. Although we are barely into October, it is time for our Christmas Card competition, in order for our winning designs to be professionally printed in time!


Charitable giving and the act of sending cards can both share the Good News and demonstrate God's love.



Year 9 Boys' Basketball


The Year 9 boys' basketball team opened up their season against Boswells.
