A DECADE OF ACTION TO REPAIR THE EARTH

The Earthshot Prize

This week in Collective Worship, I have been speaking to the students about <u>The Earthshot</u> <u>Prize</u>. You may have seen something of this on BBC 1, recently.

We talked about how Christianity, like all world faiths, encourages us to be stewards of God's world and how our aim should be to leave the planet better than we found it.

Barak Obama said, "We are the first generation to feel the impact of climate change and the last generation that can do something about it." The Earthshot rises to that challenge.

A previous American President (JFK) said, "We choose to go to the Moon!" This became known as the Moonshot. An audacious ambition to get to the Moon in

less than a decade. In a famous race against time the world united behind this ambition.

Prince William is attempting a similar feat and saying that in the next ten years we need to save the planet we all know and love.

In response to this, and in association with our new students' newspaper, I am taking a lead on our very own Earthshot project here in school. I want to offer practical and financial support to students' ideas to improve the environment here at Becket Keys. We will form our own Earthshot council and listen to ideas of students. We will choose some to put into action each year for the next ten years. We will use money from the School Fund to support their ambitions to change the way we work.

As part of this, I announced my own "Power of Ten Earthshot". I challenged our students and staff to do ten simple things consistently for the next year including planting a tree fruit to hopefully grow a sapling to plant in the school grounds next year. I am encouraging every student to collect an acorn or a conker (or similar) and to plant it over the next few days ready for next year.

If everyone (including all of you reading this) continued to do these ten things for a year and joined me in planting a tree next year we would make a significant impact. If we repeat it every year for the next ten years, it will make even more of a difference. And, if we could encourage ten other people, (or ten other schools) to join us just imagine what we could do! Especially, if those ten people (or schools) encouraged another ten next year. 10¹⁰!

Over the next ten years, thousands of trees could be planted, items could be recycled, litter could be collected, and the world could be changed.

Our own school is blessed with space for hundreds and hundreds of trees, and we have the nature reserve across the road to add to as well. We have ordered 400 trees from the Woodland Trust to plant around our school field this year as part of the Queen's Jubilee Green Canopy.

least another 10 years, my legacy here will not only be to teach thousands of students about the importance of protecting the environment, but also to do something about it.

Will you join me in this mission? Will you commit to doing the ten simple things below? Could you join our Earthshot Prize council? Would you be willing to financially support our work by making a contribution to our School Fund? JFK said, "We choose to go the moon (and do the other things), not because they are easy, but because they are hard." Hard choices need to be made. Ambitious ideas need to be thought of. We have "Faith in Learning" – we believe in the power of ideas to change things. Let's all support our students in coming up with their own Earthshot ideas.

My "Power of Ten" List:

 Help with the recycling at home every week, ensuring that everything that can be is recycled.

- Never buy water in plastic bottles. Always take a reusable bottle.
- 3. Switch off lights and taps when not in use.
- 4. Help with planting, watering and picking edible produce at home.
- 5. Pick up at least one piece of litter every day.
- 6. Eat vegetarian at least one day per week. Cut down on meat especially beef.
- 7. Make sure all paper and card at school goes into the right bins.
- 8. Take soft plastics into a supermarket where they can be recycled.
- 9. Walk or cycle to school.
- 10. Plant a tree this year.

I will be checking in with students again after next week to see how they are getting on with this Earthshot and what other ideas they may have for our school.

Mandarin Department - Chinese Bridge Competition



What is this event about?

The 'Chinese Bridge' competition is the world's largest Chinese competition for Chinese learners. It has become an important platform for students from all over the world to learn Chinese and understand Chinese culture. As of 2016, millions of young people from more than 110 countries have participated in this competition.

In previous years, the 'Chinese Bridge' competition was only for university students who had learnt Chinese for years. In 2021, the first 'Chinese Bridge' competition for young learners in the UK, organised by the centre for Language Education and Cooperation, UK, took place on 26th June.

The theme of the event is Chinese, Joy and Fun with the aim of providing a stage for young Chinese learners worldwide to demonstrate their Chinese language proficiencies, to stimulate the motivation of learning Mandarin in joy and fun. Participants are students aged between 5 and 14 years old (absolute non-native speakers). They are tested on listening, speaking, reading, writing and also on Chinese culture skills.

We won!

Four of our Year 9 MEP students were entered for the competition. Three of them got through to the final and all of them won the first prize of key stage 3!

Our students spent a lot of time in preparation for it. I was extremely pleased with the enthusiasm and determination all our participants demonstrated during the process. To me, they are all winners!

We were informed that there were 254 entrants from all over the UK. We are so proud of our students' achievements to have reached this stage!

The worldwide final 'Chinese Bridge' competition will take place in November, via Zoom. Our winners will represent the UK to participate in the final competition. We wish them BEST OF LUCK!

Uniform

Food Department

This week's recipe is one of my favourites for this time of year. I love autumn, the crunchy leaves on the ground, and the changings of colours of the trees and best of all the different types of seasonal squash in the shops. What better way to celebrate this season with a delicious pumpkin cake to share with family and friends. I hope you enjoy making this.

Mrs English Head of Food



For the cake:

- 300g self-raising flour
- 300g light muscovado sugar
- 3 tsp mixed spice
- 2 tsp bicarbonate of soda
- 175g sultanas
- ½ tsp salt
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 200g butter, melted
- zest 1 orange
- 1 tbsp orange juice
- 500g (peeled weight) pumpkin or butternut squash flesh, grated

For drenching and frosting

- 200g pack soft cheese
- 85g butter, softened
- 100g icing sugar, sifted
- zest 1 orange and juice of half

Method



STEP 1

Heat oven to 18oC/fan 16oC/gas 4. Butter and line a 30 x 20cm baking or small roasting tin with baking parchment. Put the flour, sugar, spice, bicarbonate of soda, sultanas, salt into a large bowl, and stir to combine. Beat the eggs into the melted butter, stir in the orange zest and juice, and then mix with the dry ingredients until combined. Stir in the pumpkin. Pour the batter into the tin and bake for 30 mins, or until golden and springy to the touch.

STEP 2

To make the frosting, beat together the cheese, butter, icing sugar, orange zest and 1 tsp of the juice till smooth and creamy, then set aside in the fridge. When

the cake is done, cool for 5 mins then turn it onto a cooling rack.

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Prick it all over with a skewer and drizzle with the rest of the orange juice while still warm. Leave to cool completely.

STEP 3

If you like, trim the edges of the cake. Give the frosting a quick beat to loosen, then, using a palette knife, spread over the top of the cake in peaks and swirls. If you're making the cake ahead, keep it in the fridge then take out as many pieces as you want 30 mins or so before serving. Will keep, covered, for up to 3 days in the fridge.

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


PAUS E Shine brightly

"You are the light of the world ... let your light shine among men that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven" (Matt. 5:14-16)

As we approach the All Saints' Holiday, I ask you to think about what you will do this Halloween? Join in with the secular celebrations? Creep around in the darkness? Hide with the lights off? Hustle the family out of the house? Think again. Instead, simply let your light shine! After all, where does your light shine the brightest, but in the darkness! Be inspired by the Saints and remember with gratitude all those dear to you that have departed from this world. In Matthew 5:14, Jesus tells His disciples "You are the light of the world". He also calls us to illuminate and make visible the reality of Christ's presence. Remember, it is the reflection of the Light of the World, Jesus Christ Himself, that people will see in us.

In Philippians 2:15, the Apostle Paul says, "Believers, you are to shine as light in the world". The Greek word used here is very similar to the word for the beacon that a lighthouse emits. That beacon is bright and unmistakable in its purpose. It warns of danger. It directs to safe harbour. It provides hope for those who have lost hope. Every day we are surrounded by people searching around in the darkness, separated from the God who loves them. God uses His children, like beacons from a lighthouse, to show the way to Him.



When we return to school, we will celebrate the feast of All Saints' Day (1st November) and, on All Souls' Day (2nd November). It is comforting to know that no Christian is solitary. Through baptism that we become members together of the body of Christ. We become members of a company of saints and our mutual belonging transcends death:

One family, we dwell in him, one Church, above, beneath; though now divided by the stream, the narrow stream of death.

The Church of England website eloquently explains All Saints' Day and the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed on All Souls' Day:

'All Saints' Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the

Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. It is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace, and for the wonderful ends to which it shapes a human life; it is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that sanctity may grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living. The Commemoration of the Faithful Departed celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly: those who gave us life, or who nurtured us in faith.

Redemption is a work of God's grace; it is God who redeems us in Christ and there is nothing to be done beyond what Christ has done. But we still wait for the final consummation of God's new creation in Christ; those who are Christ's, whether or not they have

passed through death, are joined in prayer that God's kingdom will be revealed finally and in all its fullness. We also sense that it is a fearful thing to come before the unutterable goodness and holiness of God, even for those who are redeemed in Christ; that it is searing as well as life-giving to experience God's mercy.'

Reflect on these words and take time to pray this All Saints' holiday:

Dear God,

We praise you for giving us the glorious example of the Saints. We aspire to meet their company, praising you forever in Heaven. Help us to follow in their footsteps and the example of Jesus Christ. Help us submit to Your call, seeking Your order in all things, just as the Saints did. Help us to commit ourselves to Your glory, and to the service of our neighbours. As we remember those we love, but see no longer, may we give thanks for the ways that they nurtured us and touched our lives. May we remember that we are saved by your amazing grace and shine as lights in the world always.

Free School Meal Vouchers


All Saints' Holiday


In order to continue supporting families entitled to Free School Meals over the school holiday, the local authority will again be issuing vouchers to those eligible across Essex. The scheme will again be co-ordinated by Wonde, using the same process as last academic year.

Parents and carers of eligible children will receive an email from Wonde next week to allow you to claim a voucher for this period. You should have now received this so please check your junk mail if you have not received an email yet. The message will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.

Details of the process and more questions about Wonde can be found on their website here https://help.evouchers.com/hc/en-gb The vouchers are worth £15 a week per child and can be used to buy food in most supermarkets.








Cross Country

Becket Keys PE Department hosted a successful District Cross Country 2021 with four other schools including Anglo, St Martins, Brentwood County High, Shenfield and Ursuline.



On the 19th of October the first half of Cross Country occurred; Year 7 up to Sixth Form girls competed throughout the day. Luckily, as schools started to arrive the sun came out, adding extra excitement for the competition to start.

The first race was our Year 7 girls. This was their first time completing a Cross Country Race, a distance of 1600m, but even though they were nervous, the girls still tried their hardest and got great results. Imogen Hutton came in 11th place and Isabel Collins came in closely behind her taking 13th. They all did themselves proud.

After this race was an exhilarating competition with our Year 8 girls fighting for the top 10 places for this 2000m race. Evie Warn took home 2nd place, Chloe Squirrel

3rd with Niamh Stevenson taking 9th place.



The next race was our Year 9 girls, also 2000m. They had tough competition, but all the girls put in all the work they could and it paid off with Elizabeth Thompson coming 6th, Katie Todd coming 13th and right behind her Emma Cooper taking 14th.

Finally, our last race of the day was the Year 10,11,12 and 13.
These girls really gave it their all, running 2500m and it definitely paid off producing excellent results: Maddie Barker leading the way in 1st place, Erin Delea in 7th, Tilly Wright in 9th, Izzy Brook in 14th and Philippa Burrell in 16th.

The boys' Cross Country took place on the 21st of October, even though it was only 2 days later, the weather had drastically changed and it was very windy. However, this did not stop the boys from competing at their best. The first race was once again Year 7s, and they were excited to be a part of the event. They pushed through the cold weather and participated very well throughout the 2000m.

The Year 8s were up next with a 2500m race and bringing confidence to the table was Josh Eida who fought for first place during the whole race, but at the last corner was overtaken but still took home a proud 2nd place and Oliver McDermot with a great race taking 9th.

The next race was the Year 9s. They all fought hard around the 2500m course. Max Sanderson kept a good pace throughout came in 7th and the rest of the boys were not far behind. They had tough competition, but they all did so well.



Finally, the last race of this years Cross Country was the Year 10,11,12 and 13s running a 3500m course. The boys gave it all the effort they had and made themselves proud with the first 3 having a close result of: Calum Hayes in 8th, Sam Carey 9th and Luke Rouse 10th.

Thank you to all the schools and students that attended the day. Well done to those who took part.
