#### Mrs Trebess Writes:



The weather was kind to us yesterday and allowed us to gather the entire school together on the playground, with a service to mark and commemorate Remembrance Day. Many of our students wore their poppies with pride, and without exception, students marked the occasion with dignity and respect. It was a privilege to stand with them to mark such an occasion.

The story of why poppies are used as a symbol of remembrance is, in equal measures, wondrous and poignant.

During WW1, much of the fighting took place in Western Europe. The countryside was blasted, bombed and fought over repeatedly. Previously beautiful landscapes turned to mud; bleak and barren scenes where little or nothing could grow.

There was a notable and striking exception to the bleakness - the bright red poppies. These resilient flowers flourished in the middle of so much chaos and destruction, growing in the thousands upon thousands. The war created prime conditions for poppies to flourish.

Rather ironically, the destruction that was wrought by humankind created the very conditions in which poppies thrive. The continual bombardment disturbed the soil and brought the

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seeds to the surface. They were then fertilized by nitrogen in the explosives and lime from the shattered rubble of the buildings.

It was in the second year of the war – in 1915 – that the first records appeared in letters sent home of no-man's land being "ablaze" with scarlet poppies. From this time onwards, letters written by soldiers constantly referred to the fields of poppies and featured heavily in soldier's poems.

We remember them.

Yesterday morning, all members of our school community gathered on the playground for a Memorial Service led by Mrs Sharp and Mr. Silver. Liam Apicella-Howard sounded the beginning of the two-minute silence with The Last Post and signaled the end with The Reveille. You can view this here: https://youtu.be/9NJZTnIn-GM

In peace they gently lay.



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### Year 8 Trip 2022 – Manor Adventure





Please note this is the main trip for Year 8 this year, due to the uncertainty of foreign travel.

Year 8 students will have the chance to go on an end of year trip to Norfolk Lakes, run by Manor Adventure!

This exciting trip will take place from Friday 27<sup>th</sup> May to Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> May 2022, leading into the Whitsun holiday.

Due to uncertainties around what travel will be possible with COVID, we are not undertaking any foreign trips this year so the Year 8 Madrid/China trips will not be taking place. However, this will be an exciting replacement trip, especially as students were unable to go to Bushcraft in year 7!

The trip overall costs £254 with a deadline for the £60 deposit by today, Friday 12<sup>th</sup> November; this deadline was extended by one week in case there was any confusion over the Madrid/China trips still running.

Manor Adventure has been operating since 1991, now in seven different locations, with Norfolk Lakes opening in 2016. This adventure trip will give students the opportunity to learn new skills outside of the classroom that will benefit everyone enormously by developing inner confidence, social skills and teamwork through trying new activities.

Throughout the three day residential trip, students will take part in nine different activities including obstacle courses, high ropes and many, many more!

Investigations took us to the coast to assess the sustainable coastal management of Silloth which involved some valuable learning experiences about using fieldwork equipment.










We also explored Keswick to study the central topic of 'place' which involved interacting with the locals; which the students took to like ducks to water.






With a bit of exertion, we managed to go beyond our comfort zone and reach new heights of learning!

- Hit the DT+ app/icon (Apps appear in alphabetical order)
- 4. You can now watch any productions of your choice (There are 100s)
- You can view interviews with actors, designers, directors etc...
- 6. You can use a range of teaching materials and print these too






As always, it is great to see the students of Becket Keys showing their respectful natures in a simple, but meaningful way.

# The Virtue of Peace

Winston Churchill had been Prime Minister for five weeks when, in his speech on 18<sup>th</sup> June 1940, he said:

"The Battle of Britain is about to begin. Upon this battle depends the survival of Christian civilisation," he warned. "Let us therefore brace ourselves to our duty and so bear ourselves that, if the British Empire and its Commonwealth last for a thousand years, men will still say: 'This was their finest hour'."

Sadly, his words can still ring true. There are still acts of terrorism in our world. Remembrance services are just as significant and indeed of increasing significance in our society.

In Micah Chapter 4 verses 1 to 4, we read:

In days to come the mountain where the temple stands will be the highest one of all, towering above all the hills. Many nations will come streaming to it and their people will say, 'Let us go up the Hill to the Lord, to the temple of Israel's God. For he will teach us what he wants us to do; we will walk in the paths he has chosen. For the Lord's teaching comes from Jerusalem; from Zion he speaks to his people.'

He will settle disputes among the nations, among the great powers near and far. They will hammer

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their swords into ploughs and their spears into pruning knives. Nations will never again go to war, never prepare for battle again. Everyone will live in peace among his own vineyards and fig trees, and no one will make him afraid. The Lord Almighty has promised this.

This reading speaks of the hope and assurance for Christians that God is with us and for us on our journey to our future, whatever we may encounter on the way. The prophet Micah speaks of a brighter and peaceful future where nation will not take up sword against nation, nor train for war anymore. We may not know what the future holds for us, but we do know **who** holds the future for us.

Leviticus 26 verse 6 reads:

'I will give peace in the land, and you shall lie down, and none will make you afraid.'

Whatever our view about what is going on in our world, we can express our common humanity in our hearts by praying and pausing to think of the value and worth of every life lost and the heart ache of those left behind. Our thoughts are also drawn to those

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currently serving in the forces on active service in fields of conflict. We can pray for those who mourn, those who fear for loved ones serving in the armed forces and for those who have returned from conflict affected in mind, body or spirit.

This famous poem always moves me when I read it:

The Soldier by Rupert Brook
If I should die, think only this of
me:

That there's some corner of a foreign field

That is for ever England. There shall be

In that rich earth a richer dust concealed;

A dust whom England bore, shaped, made aware, Gave, once, her flowers to love, her ways to roam,

A body of England's, breathing English air,

Washed by the rivers, blest by suns of home.

And think, this heart, all evil shed away,

A pulse in the eternal mind, no less

Gives somewhere back the thoughts by England given; Her sights and sounds; dreams happy as her day; And laughter, learnt of friends; and gentleness,

In hearts at peace, under an English heaven.

Benedict de Spinoza (a Dutch philosopher) reminds us:

"Peace does not necessarily mean the absence of war; it is a



virtue, a way of thinking, an attitude of mercy, trust and righteousness."

We want to live our lives without worry and fear. We can only achieve this by walking along the ways of the Lord: the way of light and truth, of prayer and humility, of faithful Scripture study where we seek God's revealed will for our lives. Through prayer the Holy Spirit opens up our hearts for the love of God in Jesus Christ. Where His love dwells, there His peace will reign. Peace cannot come to our country or the world unless it first comes into the hearts of people. Love must become visible in you and me, manifesting itself in our words, deeds and chosen lifestyle. The peace in our hearts also creates peace in the area that surrounds us. From there it will

stretch wider and wider, until peace reigns in our country and God's world.

We are all, therefore, personally responsible for peace. Unless we surrender our lives to the love of God, peace will remain an empty dream.

#### Let us pray:

Lord God increase and strengthen the desire for peace in every human heart, so that the temptation to violence, injustice and revenge may be overcome, and people will live no longer in fear, but in freedom. **Amen.**
