CURRICULUM

Mr Scott-Evans Writes:

Over the past two years, alongside the small matter of dealing with Covid, our teachers have been getting on with the important job of reviewing the Key Stage 3 curriculum. This has involved thinking through its intent and implementation. We offer a broad and rich curriculum, giving our students a balanced education right through to GCSE when they focus their attention on the English Baccalaureate (English, Mathematics, Science, Spanish/Mandarin and History/Geography), RP and one other subject.

In terms of what to teach in Year 7,8 and 9, in the main, we have decided to continue to teach the National Curriculum. We know that this provides our students with a well-curated education decided upon by experts.

However, there are still important questions around additional topics to be taught and the sequence in which things are learned: "Why this? Why now?"

Having made these decisions, we have worked hard to communicate to our students the curriculum journey that is planned for them. This is referred to regularly in class, in displays and via our <u>website</u> which also allows parents easy access to the entire <u>programme</u>.

The next phase of our review has been to consider the <u>impact</u> of our curriculum. Most importantly on an individual basis (through assessment), but also on a macro level looking at each subject and how it performs compared to others. To help us to do this we have been developing stage ladders. I have written to parents

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about these today and produced a 4 minute <u>video</u> to accompany my letter. Again, there are details about these ladders and how we will use them to report to parents on our <u>website</u>.

We are confident in our curriculum and our assessment approaches, and we are sure that the small changes we have made will ensure students really enjoy the engaging and enriching experience of Key Stage 3. It is the bedrock of our school curriculum providing the perfect launchpad into GCSE and giving the broad experiences required to enjoy the stretch of A Level.

Of course, there are challenges, not least the impact of the lockdowns, the impact of imposed contact tracing isolations, and the fact that staff and students continue to have their attendance affected by Covid if they contract it. However, we will continue to tackle these with our usual optimism and energy, and with the support of our parents.

Parental interest in the curriculum here is really high, and we are often asked how parents can support. To finish, here are my top five tips:

 Ask your son/daughter what he/she is learning about and ask him/her to teach you things. The more students do this the more they will remember.

- 2. Tell them how interested you are and how proud you are of them. Focus on being proud of their effort and diligence rather than 'cleverness'. Telling your son/daughter s/he is talented or smart sounds like a good thing to do, but it actually piles on the pressure. Never over celebrate high test scores, focus instead on congratulating the hard work that led to that high score.
- 3. Find documentaries, podcasts and books to share on the topics that they are studying. Remember, you can see exactly what they are learning term by term on line. A great place to go to for extra on-line lessons and virtual tuition (completely free of charge) is Oak Academy.
- 4. Visit museums, galleries, castles, gardens, coasts, rivers etc. Actual field work and trips have been low on the ground recently: can you make up for that?
- 5. Look in your son/daughter's bag! Check the books are organised, tidy, neatly presented. Can you see how the curriculum is being taught? Is your son/daughter keeping up? Is work up to date and finished? If you are not sure about anything, contact the subject

teacher using the <u>web-</u> <u>portal</u>.

I hope you enjoy looking at our Curriculum on-line. Although this article is about Key Stage 3, you can see Key Stage 4 and 5 on the website too. It has taken our teachers hours and hours to load all this up for families to see — make the most of it! It is a rich resource.



We know 11th November as Remembrance Day. But did you know that in China, it is the Singles' Day — a festival celebrating people who are not in relationships?

Originally the date was celebrated as a cynical response to traditional couple-centric festivals by a small group of college bachelors; however, in 2009, Alibaba's CEO Daniel Zhang began to use the day as a 24-hour online shopping holiday. This day is now better known as the Double 11 Online Shopping Carnival, an event spanning 11 days. It has now become the largest physical, retail and online shopping day in the world. In 2019, Chinese consumers spent US\$42 billion (£31 billion) online in 11 days. In 2020, the number was US\$74.1 billion (£57.7 billion). Online retailers are hoping to create a new record in 2021.

Our Year 7 Mandarin group created posters to tell us about the festival. Here are three of the best productions and three honourable mentions.




Year 7 Reading Project


Romance novels, historical fiction and adventure stories- these are three literary genres I would hate to read. These stories tend to bore me (yes, me an English teacher) and that's okay! For this reason, I have created the Year 7 Reading Project.

Every month, Year 7 students are given an excerpt from a particular genre, in form time. Once a month, I will write a short piece in this newsletter with recommended texts that are of the same genre the students are looking at. Here are my recommended autobiographies and biographies:








Food Department

I often see people buying premade gnocchi and jars of sickly sweet pasta sauce in the supermarket and I wish I could give them this simple recipe to make delicious Italian dishes at home. This is particularly true of gnocchi, where the supermarket version is very dense and does not have a great flavour. The sauce is extremely versatile and goes well with all kinds of pasta. This recipe is the one I use at home and in school as it easy and the results are delicious.

Recipe of the Week Gnocchi with Arrabbiata sauce – serves 2 300g Floury Potatoes

1 egg – preferably free range 90g Plain flour, plus more for dusting Pinch salt

Cook the potatoes by lowering them whole in their skins into a pan of salted boiling water, bring back to the boil and simmer for 30 minutes until just soft. Drain and set to cool then peel. Hold them in a tea towel to peel if they are still hot.

Mash the potatoes – make sure there are no lumps.

Make a hollow in your pile of potatoes, then pour in the egg and sprinkle over some of the flour. Start to blend everything with your hands, adding more flour a little at a time.



Roll into long, thumb-nail thick cylinder on a lightly floured surface, again working lightly and quickly. As you roll you will also be gently stretching the dough. Keep the surface well-floured as you don't want the gnocchi to stick.

Cut the dough into thumb-nail long lengths.

Roll the gnocchi in a little flour. Holding each piece very lightly, form each into a small concave gnocchi shape: hold them against the prongs of the back of a fork, pressing just enough to get the imprint.

Bring a large, deep pot of salted water to the boil. Working with a few at a time (don't too many at once), drop in the gnocchi and listen for the wonderful kissing noise they make as they go in.

Let them cook for 2 minutes, you will know that they are ready when they bob back up to the surface, then scoop them out with a slotted spoon.


Taste - they should be sofficí e leggeri (soft and light), the gnocchi equivalent of al dente.


Arrabbiata sauce

1 onion finely chopped
1 celery finely chopped
1/2 carrot finely chopped
1 garlic clove finely chopped
1 tsp tom puree
1 can chopped tomatoes
2 tsp olive oil
Pinch chilli flakes

Sauté the chopped vegetables until soft, add the other ingredients and simmer for 15-20 minutes.







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P A USE

Don't worry, I have got this!

Next week, the first series of mocks begins. This can be a challenging and stressful time for students. A Prayer for Year 11 and 13 students to use:


Jesus,
