### **Word Millionaires**

Recent studies by Ohio State University and the University of Kansas indicate that children from poorer backgrounds are more likely to have a vocabulary gap. They hear fewer words from birth, have fewer words read to them during their early years and then go on to read fewer words in books themselves. A limited vocabulary means that thinking is limited. We think with words and communicate our thoughts with words. The more words we have the more likely we are to be able to have more complex thoughts and the more successful we will be.

James Murphy, author, and cofounder of 'Thinking Reading' asserts that every secondary teacher and every parent of a

secondary age student needs to address low vocabulary as the highest priority. His view is the sheer quantity of words is the significant factor and that we need to ensure students read a million words per year. By my calculations, if we get students to read in silence for 4-5 minutes in every lesson and we continue to use our weekly silent reading time, students will read at least 800,000 words in school. That leaves 200,000 words to be tackled at home. On average, young fiction has between 200 and 300 words on a page. A 200page book could therefore have between 40,000 and 60,000 words in it. Aiming to get your son/daughter to read four or five books per year, should, easily achieve the target of making them a word millionaire! I would

### **Chow Mein**

### Ingredients

- 5og Egg Noodles
- 20g Beansprouts
- 2 tsp sunflower oil
- 2 tbsp. peas
- 2 tbsp. sweetcorn
- ½ onion sliced
- 3 tsp of soy sauce

### Method

- Boil the kettle. Once boiled pour the water carefully over the noodles and leave to soak for 5 minutes.
- Slice the onion, thinly.
- In a frying pan, heat the oil and fry the onions until soft and slightly brown.
- Drain the noodles over the sink in a colander, and then put them back into the bowl.
- Add the onion and beansprouts to the frying pan and stir.
- Also, add the peas and sweetcorn to the frying pan.
- Stir altogether then add the noodles, mix well then add the soy sauce.
- Turn the heat off and place the noodles into the foil container.

You can arrange an auto top up via your account and, if you wish, set a daily spend limit.





# At the heart of Christmas



### At the heart of Christmas is hope.



'At the heart of Christmas' is the Church of England theme for Advent and Christmas this year. It is introduced on the Church of England website as follows:
'In 2020, many of us experienced a Christmas when so many of the ways we traditionally mark the season were suddenly denied to us.

This year, of course, we hope and pray that many of the familiar experiences that help Christmas come alive return to our homes, our churches and communities. But whatever else December brings, it will offer us an opportunity to enter more deeply into the joyful mystery that lies at its heart: God becoming human in the birth of Jesus Christ.

Inspired by readings from the Gospels of Luke and John read at so many Christmas services, 'At the heart of Christmas' is an invitation to everyone to discover – or rediscover – the good news of God's saving love as revealed in the birth of Jesus. It is also a challenge to each of

us to ponder in our hearts – as Mary did – what the extraordinary events of the first Christmas might mean for us now and in the years ahead.'

The more we ponder the significance of the events of Christmas, the more powerfully we will experience Advent. Our Lord will penetrate the layers of distraction of this time and reveal what we are waiting and hoping for.

Listen to the words of the Prophet:

### Joy of the Redeemed

**35** The desert and the parched land will be glad;

the wilderness will rejoice and blossom.

Like the crocus, <sup>2</sup> it will burst into bloom;

it will rejoice greatly and shout for joy.

The glory of Lebanon will be given to it,

the splendour of Carmel and Sharon; they will see the glory of the Lord, the splendour of our God.

<sup>3</sup> Strengthen the feeble hands, steady the knees that give way:

4 say to those with fearful hearts, "Be strong, do not fear; your God will come,

he will come with vengeance; with divine retribution he will come to save you."

<sup>5</sup> Then will the eyes of the blind be opened

and the ears of the deaf unstopped.

<sup>6</sup> Then will the lame leap like a deer,

and the mute tongue shout for joy.

Water will gush forth in the wilderness

and streams in the desert.

<sup>7</sup> The burning sand will become a pool,

the thirsty ground bubbling springs.

In the haunts where jackals once lay,

grass and reeds and papyrus will grow.

8 And a highway will be there; it will be called the Way of Holiness;

it will be for those who walk on that Way.

The unclean will not journey on it;

wicked fools will not go about on it.

<sup>9</sup> No lion will be there, nor any ravenous beast; they will not be found there. But only the redeemed will walk there,

<sup>10</sup> and those the Lord has rescued will return.

They will enter Zion with singing;

everlasting joy will crown their heads.

Gladness and joy will overtake them,

and sorrow and sighing will flee away.

These words help us re-enter the ancient tradition of a people longing for a Saviour. The contrasting imagery is powerful. The darkness, gloom and perched deserts capture a sense of what we feel when we are distant from God. Yet the hunger, thirst and vulnerability is replaced by God's salvation, blooms in the desert and rejoicing; a time when tears are wiped away. In fact the message of Christmas is in the waiting, if we just take the time in all the busyness and confusion to look for it.

Hope at Christmas is more than
an empty wish, because Jesus
secured the future for all who
trust in him.

What hope means to most people is wishful thinking or an emotional longing for something better. This idea of hope depends on the circumstances of life, which could be hopeful or hopeless. But life is unpredictable and uncertain. The Biblical meaning of the word hope does not mean just wishing for something. Hope is a confident expectation or assured anticipation of something good, not yet experienced.

As you wait with hope and eagerness, perhaps use the Church of England daily family activity calendar. I cannot tell you much about what lies behind each door, as they cannot be unlocked until the 1st December!


