we will stay fully open. We have good attendance of both staff and students. We have plans in place to be able to partially close the school and work flexibly with some students on-line at home if staff absence becomes more of an issue. We hope that we will not need these plans.

How are we coping with teacher absence?

We have two full time cover teachers, Mrs Simmons and Mr Rossi. We also have a high number of teachers who have additional 'free' periods on their timetables that can be used to cover lessons, when required. This system means that most cover lessons are taught by teachers who know our school and our way of doing things. Where we need them, we call upon agencies for additional staff. Our school is a very popular destination for supply teachers as they know students conduct themselves well here and it is a pleasure for them to come.

Where we have long term absence, we cover this with subject specialist cover teachers from one or two trusted agencies who can offer us high quality colleagues. We can also call upon people like Mr Tunstall and Mr Jacob who are recently retired and often willing to come back to help us out. I am sure that you will join with me in praying for staff who are off at the moment.



Will the exams go ahead this summer?

All the indications are that they will. The Department for Education keep reasserting that they will. My professional association (ASCL) believes that they will. The Russell Education Trust believe that they will. I believe that they will.

There are going to be some minor adaptations. These will be announced by exam boards by 7th February (latest). I am not expecting much to change; I think we will be looking at a fairly typical full set of exams for students in Year 11 and Year 13.



Will students keep having to wear masks in classrooms?

All we know is that they will be recommended for all of January. The decision will then be reviewed. The Government have said that they appreciate that they are not ideal for learning. They know that it is not pleasant for students or staff to work in this way. However, the priority is Page 2 of 15

reducing the transmission of Covid, and masks have been shown to do this. Please keep supporting us in this by sending your son/daughter with two masks per day and/or letting us know if there is an exemption.

Will lessons continue to be offered on MS Teams?

As much as possible, teachers have MS Teams open in the background when teaching. Their focus is on the students in the classroom, but the virtual link to those at home should be open. The technology is there and paid for and we are trying to use it as much as possible. We have upgraded our internet connection this week and we are hoping that this will improve things further for those at home. We know that sometimes the sound and image can be distorted or delayed.



As I have communicated before, it is not always possible to have the lessons transmitted live to students at home. In this situation, students should look at Show My Homework to see if there is any work set there for them to do. If not, they could use Oak Academy or other websites like Dr Frost Maths for relevant learning materials. Please also remember that these live lessons are only for those with Covid. We are not providing remote learning

for students who have a headache or a cold!

Will parents' evenings be on-line?

The majority of our parents' evenings will continue to be online. The software is working well and for many reasons it seems like a positive step. That said, we appreciate that some parents have rarely (ever!) come onto the school site, and we want to find ways to welcome them into school as and when it seems helpful to do so.



Will school trips go ahead?

At present, all our school trips are UK based and can go ahead. In fact, the Year 11 GCSE Geography field trip is taking place this week. It has gone very smoothly thanks to the students and the staff carefully following the advice given to them.

Will students in Year 11 and Year 13 be given any consideration for the

disruption they have experienced in their learning?

Yes! Although it is impossible to predict the difference this will make for any individual student, the Government has promised that the results this year will be better than they were in 2019 (pre-pandemic). This reassurance means that the most important thing is for students to perform as well as they possibly can to ensure that they are in the pole position to be awarded the higher grades. We cannot predict what any individual would need to score to get a certain grade. All we can say is that the higher the score the higher the chance! Clearly, this benefit will tend to help those who already are doing well enough to sit exams and get scores. It will do little for those most affected by what has happened. Therefore, we must all pull together to ensure that our students are not left behind. Everyone needs to feel fit, ready, and strong enough to perform. Staying in school, responding to teacher advice, and working sensibly every week will make the difference.

I think that is enough crystal ball gazing for now. Have a lovely weekend and...

Road Safety



Did you know?

Teenagers are more at risk on the roads than they think. Most teenagers do not realise that they are more likely to be killed or injured in a road collision than any other age group. Find out how to help your teenager stay safe.

Help protect your child

Please talk to your son or daughter and reinforce road safety messages to help keep them safe:

- stress the need to concentrate and be careful at all times;
- warn of the dangers of distractions – listening to music, texting, phoning or even chatting to friends while walking are big distractions;
- keep talking about the dangers of traffic;

- point out people who are endangering themselves;
- encourage your teenager to practise judging the speed and distance of approaching vehicles on busy roads and identify safe gaps in the traffic;
- stress that you should never lose concentration and follow others blindly into dangerous situations.

Cycling

It is a good idea to:


- buy and encourage your son or daughter to wear a cycle helmet, and something fluorescent and reflective to improve visibility;
- encourage your son or daughter never to take lifts on the back of a friend's bike;
- remind your son or daughter not to listen to music while they are cycling;
- make sure your child is aware that cyclists must obey all traffic signs and traffic light signals.





Year 7 Reading Project


Fantasy Literature


'The Balloon Thief' by Aneesa Marufa

'The Skin of the Sea' by Natasha Bowen


This thrilling debut is infused with the history, language and mythology of West Africa. Set in the mid 1400s when the Portuguese first began abducting and then buying West Africans, it pursues an interesting perspective on the terrible human cost of the Slave Trade.

Yemoja has created many Mami Wata, mermaids tasked with escorting the souls of enslaved people thrown into the sea. Simindele, a teenage girl, is one of them, but when she instead saves the life of a boy, she unwittingly puts all the Mami Wata in peril and must seek the forgiveness of the supreme deity.

'Shadow Town' by Richard Lambert

Toby, a lonely, unhappy boy from suburban London who finds himself pulled into an alternate world during the upheaval of his parent's impending divorce.

Toby's dad is an unkind grump, embittered by his lot in the world, and consumed by the fantasy novel he's been writing since before Toby was born. Toby's mum is a climate activist. Neither parent really pays him any attention, and his sole friends are their lodger and her cat, Alfred. Toby's miserable lot is shaken up when a shadow appears in his garden and his dreams, and he finds himself transported to a strange land, where elemental forces (blazing fires, floods and earthquakes) are at play in a kingdom ruled by a tyrant.

Focus on Careers

Live online sessions every Monday at 7.30pm GMT.

Medical work experience, application help & certificates to help you on your way to medical school.

Every Monday evening at 7.30pm there are work experience sessions running online for students aged 14 - 18 who might be considering careers in healthcare. The sessions have proved to be very popular with over 300 students from across the UK joining in each week.

A different medical case is presented each week and our doctors, with the help of the students attending, diagnose and treat the patient in the interactive 2 hour sessions.

Students are able to obtain a certificate every month for their participation in the sessions.

If there are any students interested in becoming doctors (or any other career in healthcare), this company are offering them a 1 month free subscription - all they need to do is visit www.theweeklysurgery.com and use our school code: WEEKLY90 for their 1 month free for which they will also obtain their certificates to use in their university applications.

The code will be valid until the 20th January 2022.

It's usually £39 per month and they are free to cancel before their renewal and just take part in the free month should they wish.



The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14).


