
EYOUTH SPEAKS COMPETITION





'A Wrinkle in Time' Madeleine L'engle

'Last Gate of the Emperor' Kwame Mbalia and Prince Joel Makonnen



Free School Meal Vouchers Lent Holiday

In order to continue to support our families entitled to Free School Meals during the Lent Holiday, we will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and guardians of eligible children will have received an email from Wonde to allow them to claim a voucher for £15 for this period. Please check your junk mail if you have not received this.

The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.




The School Community Prayer Group hosted by our Headteacher Mr Scott-Evans is every week on Wednesday at 8.45am.

Book of the Month - February



Dylan was six when The End came; when the electricity went off for good, and the 'normal' 21st century world he knew disappeared. Now he's 14 and he and his mam have worked to survive in their isolated hilltop house above the village of Nebo in north-west Wales, learning new skills, and returning to old ways of living. Despite their close understanding, the relationship between mother and son changes subtly as Dylan must take on adult responsibilities. What mam misses, Dylan has no use for, being perfectly adapted to the new world and his place in it. And they each have their own secrets, which emerge as, in turn, they jot down their thoughts and memories in a found notebook - the Blue Book of Nebo.

In this tender and tragic prize-winning novel, Manon Steffan Ros not only explores the human capacity to find new strengths when faced with the need to survive in a post-apocalyptic world, but also questions the structures of the contemporary one.



In sentences:

Etymology: from the Latin 'dis' meaning 'away' and 'crepare' meaning to crack or break




Remember that Homework Club is up and running! Every afternoon after school students can stay until 4.30pm and complete their homework in C11.












The art of simple living

If there is one thing most of us aspire to, it is simply to be happy. Kate Humble write about her book 'A Year of Living Simply – My journey from complexity to contentment':



'This isn't about living a life of penury, devoid of joy or fun – quite the opposite. It is about finding, or rediscovering, the aspects of life that really matter and having time to value and enjoy them. It is a search for simplicity and the contentment that goes with it.'

Whilst I read this book during a camping trip last Summer, the messages have stayed with me:

'It seems', I said, as we stood in the dappled evening shade of the beech trees, the dogs milling around our legs, 'that contentment and simplicity are intrinsic. That the reason so many of us in Western society are not content is that we live lives that are over-crowded and over-complicated. We've confused simplicity with convenience. But convenience doesn't seem to bring happiness.'



In the rush of our lives, we can all be guilty of buying things for convenience and equating this to happiness. However, this book explores sustainability, working with nature and building communities. It was definitely not about an easy life and in many instances meant hard, but rewarding, work. As a Christian, for me this is about remembering Jesus' promise of 'life in all its fullness' (John 10:10) and making time for our relationship with God. Incidentally, it is linked to the Church of England Vision for Education stands: wisdom, hope, community and dignity.

The concept of a 'Cycle of Grace' was introduced to me at a Church of England Conference and has proved useful ever since; both personally and working with others in our school community.



It was original created by Frank Lake, a clinical psychiatrist aiming to support clergy in being more effective in understanding and accepting the psychological



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origins of parishioners' personal difficulties. It can also be related to Jesus' example. Jesus knew who he was and accepted this. Yet, it took 40 days in the desert thinking about this and the support of John the Baptist. Importantly, he sustained himself taking time away from the crowds to reflect and pray. He could then identify the significant work he had to do. He did not simply start with the outcomes and what needed to be achieved. How often do we celebrate our strengths? How often do we accept who we are? How often do we give time for sustenance solitude, prayer, time with friends, time in nature, time for moving on. . . We need to make time for these things.

This has a lot to do with rhythms, habits and routines in life. Our routine can be doing the same things at set times every day or having things you want to do included daily, rather than fitting them in when we have the time. It is all about choosing how you spend your time with intention, choosing experience over material things, decluttering and nurturing self, others and nature (caring for God's world). Some of the daily routines that support simple living are meditation, exercise (walk in the woods), reading, journaling, limited social media time, planning to grow your own or eat healthier less processed foods. Even daily chores (including washing up or emptying the dishwasher) can also be viewed differently. All of these things can help to bring

focus and order our lives; helping to make our lives simpler. The simplest of tasks can bring a sense of achievement. Be mindful of this feeling. Remember that choices become habits that can bring daily happiness and fulfilment.

This poem "Leisure" by William Henry Davies was written over a hundred years ago, but I think that it is so relevant to today. It is about how the hectic pace of modern life can take its toll on the human spirit. Many of you will know this from Centre Parcs advertising!

What is this life, if full of care, We have no time to stand and stare?

No time to stand beneath the boughs And stare as long as sheep or cows.

No time to see when wood we pass, Where squirrels hide their nuts in grass.

No time to see in broad daylight Streams full of stars, like skies at night.

No time to turn at Beauty glance, And watch her feet how they can dance,

No time to wait till her mouth can
Enrich that smile her eyes began.

A poor life this if, full of care, We have no time to stand and stare. Take a moment to think about how you could make a small change to your daily life that would bring sustenance and renewal. Commit to this change now.



Let us pray:

Dear God,

We thank you for your faithfulness and goodness.

Help us intentionally focus on the things that are most important.

Focus are lives to simply, humbly accept ourselves for who we are, celebrate our strengths, serve others and trust in you.

God of hope, fill us with happiness, joy and peace as we trust in you.

May we overflow with hope, by the power of the Holy Spirit.

May we experience life in all its fullness and share this blessing with others; as we strive to make the world a better place.
