Mr Peggs (Assistant Headteacher and Head of Sixth Form) writes:

At the start of this term, the interview process for our new Senior Prefect team took place. This group consists of a Head Girl, a Head Boy and four Deputies, and they will be prominent figures at Becket Keys over the next year as they organise events, coordinate Prefects, speak at functions, welcome visitors and much more.

All Year 12 Prefects were invited to apply by submitting a formal letter of application. Mrs Course (Deputy Head of Sixth Form), the current Senior Prefect team and I then considered these applications and the contributions the students had made to the school during their time in Year 12, both as Prefects

and in other ways. Eighteen students were shortlisted and they then had three further opportunities to show their suitability for the roles. 

My land is melting ice.



Jamie Hancox has won the National Rotary creative writing competition with his poem about the environment above. Amazing achievement Jamie well done!








Prayers from the heart

Our Year 11s and 13s are currently experiencing an intense period of revision. In the busyness, teachers continue to remind them of the importance of faith, living out our Christian values and the power of prayer in their lives. As a school community, the theme for our prayers has been focused on preparing for and taking assessments, as well as celebrating the richness of each subject our students study. It therefore seems appropriate to revisit the importance of prayer and the difference it can make in our own lives, as well as the lives of those for whom we pray.

The account of Daniel in the Lions' den (Daniel 6:1-28) clearly showed the power of prayer combined with faith and obedience:

Darius decided to appoint a hundred and twenty governors to hold office throughout his empire. In addition, he chose Daniel and two others to supervise the governors and to look after the king's interests. Daniel soon showed that he could do better work than the other supervisors or the governors. Because he was so outstanding, the king considered putting him in charge of the whole empire. Then the other supervisors and the governors tried to find something wrong with the way Daniel administered the empire, but



they could not, because Daniel was reliable and did not do anything wrong or dishonest. They said to each other, "We are not going to find anything of which to accuse Daniel unless it is something in connection with his religion."

So, they went to see the king and said, "King Darius, may Your Majesty live forever! All of us who administer your empire—the supervisors, the governors, the lieutenant governors, and the other officials—have agreed that Your Majesty should issue an order and enforce it strictly. Give orders that for thirty days no one be permitted to request anything from any god or from any human being except from Your Majesty. Anyone who violates this order is to be thrown into a pit filled with lions. So let Your Majesty issue this order and sign it, and it will be in force, a law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be changed." And so, King Darius signed the order. When Daniel learned that the order had been signed, he went home. In an upstairs room of his house there were windows that faced toward Jerusalem. There, just as he had always done, he knelt down at the open windows and prayed to God three times a day.

When Daniel's enemies observed him praying to God, all of them went together to the king to accuse Daniel. They said, "Your Majesty, you signed an order that for the next thirty days anyone who requested anything from any god or from any human being except you, would be thrown into a pit filled with lions."

The king replied, "Yes, that is a strict order, a law of the Medes and Persians, which cannot be changed."

Then they said to the king, "Daniel, one of the exiles from Judah, does not respect Your Majesty or obey the order you issued. He prays regularly three times a day."

When the king heard this, he was upset and did his best to find some

way to rescue Daniel. He kept trying until sunset. Then Daniel's enemies came back to the king and said to him, "Your Majesty knows that according to the laws of the Medes and Persians no order which the king issues can be changed."

So, the king gave orders for Daniel to be taken and thrown into the pit filled with lions. He said to Daniel, "May your God, whom you serve so loyally, rescue you." A stone was put over the mouth of the pit, and the king placed his own royal seal and the seal of his noblemen on the stone, so that no one could rescue Daniel. Then the king returned to the palace and spent a sleepless night, without food or any form of entertainment.

At dawn, the king got up and hurried to the pit. When he got there, he called out anxiously, "Daniel, servant of the living God! Was the God you serve so loyally able to save you from the lions?"

Daniel answered, "May Your Majesty live forever! God sent his angel to shut the mouths of the lions so that they would not hurt me. He did this because he knew that I was innocent and because I have not wronged you, Your Majesty."

The king was overjoyed and gave orders for Daniel to be pulled up out of the pit. So, they pulled him up and saw that he had not been hurt at all, for he trusted God.

Then King Darius wrote to the people of all nations, races, and languages on earth:

"Greetings! I command that throughout my empire everyone

should fear and respect Daniel's God.

"He is a living God, and he will rule forever.

His kingdom will never be destroyed, and his power will never come to an end.

He saves and rescues; he performs wonders and miracles in heaven and on earth. He saved Daniel from being killed by the lions." Daniel prospered during the reign of

Daniel prospered during the reign of Darius and the reign of Cyrus the Persian.

Our experiences of prayer may not be as dramatic as being protected and saved by God in a den of lions, but our experiences can still be life changing. As we pray for our Year 11s and 13s at this time, we hope that they will know the presence of God with them and that this will calm their heart and galvanise their minds. All things are possible through the strength that God provides (Philippians 4:3). We encourage them to enjoy quiet moments and use these to punctuate their days with renewed stillness. It is also important that they are reassured that where we cannot find the words, God knows them anyway; He simply listens through their hearts.


Finding time to pray in our busy lives, and sustaining prayer even in difficult times, can be challenging. However, we need to be disciplined and consistent in our prayer, like Daniel. Mother Teresa believed that silence is the first step towards building our relationships with God. She said, 'We forget that in the silence of the heart God speaks, and from the fullness of the

heart we speak. Only when we have heard [God] in the silence of our hearts, only when we have learned to listen to God in the silence of our hearts, only then can we say: I pray.' Mother Teresa understood that making time for silent communion with God is often a sacrifice. It is not easy to do with all of the demands on our time and the many distractions around us. Not only does she call us to make this sacrifice, but she also not need to be spoken, they can be moments (however short) of silence; from a walk in the countryside to a moment by a stream. In the words of Mother Teresa:

'The fruit of silence is prayer. The fruit of prayer is faith. The fruit of faith is love. The fruit of love is service. The fruit of service is peace.'

Some years ago, on a retreat, this is how the importance of silent prayerfulness was explained to me: 'If you still your mind, you can hear your own heart. And at the core of your heart is the indwelling of God. It is just like when you love someone, you just sit there and you look at each other. You just silently stare, and there is a wonderful presence between you. God is present and you are present—to each other and yourself. It is a matter of just being there.'

The prayer of silence has a long history. Jesus went away to pray at times, away from the crowds, from the noise, from the spoken services of the synagogue. The early desert mothers and fathers went to the desert to pray. Silence was built



into the structure of their rules of life. Silent prayer may also be known as meditation, contemplation or centering prayer. May we encourage each other to take time, set it aside to rest, hear God and have an opportunity to think about our relationship with God. Within our busy schedules, we seem to spend our days running back and forward, but where does God come in all of this? We can be almost too busy to pray! Think about having a quiet time for yourself; it can give you space just to simply be. Jesus said to his disciples and a crowd of people: 'Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden is light' (Matthew 11:28-30).

Moving forward, set yourself aside some time alone - a gift of being with yourself and of course our heavenly Father. This secret place of silent communion with God

includes no ritual; it is the still and quiet place of the heart and mind. Wherever we are, we can practice this silent communion. This gives us plenty of freedom to pray – we carry our sanctuary with us - and our silent recognition of the power of our Father's love blesses us and those around us. Our moments of silence are effective as we reach inward in quiet communion with God. The silence, or quieting of the senses, allows us to feel His loving hand, which guides us to the answers we need and calms our fears. In this way, true silence is our active listening to our Father in heaven who blesses us openly.

God promises us in His Word that He hears every word that we pray to Him. Like a good parent, He is waiting, ready, and willing to listen to our worries, concerns, and needs. Whether we are seeking forgiveness, strength, or healing, prayer provides the channel to communicate with God.

Consider the words of the hymn, 'Be still for the presence of the Lord' by David J Evans: **'Be still,** for the presence of the Lord,

The Holy One, is here;
Come bow before him now,
With reverence and fear:
In him no sin is found
We stand on holy ground.
Be still, for the presence of the
Lord,
The Holy One, is here.'

In this silence, the Lord can whisper in your heart and mind. You can also hear your own heart. You communicate that you are there, quiet, but attentive to the Lord.

I also pray, that when you take time alone, the solitude will renew you and, like morning sunlight on flowers, touch you with peace.

Let us pray:

God of stillness, help us find a space of quietness, so that we may discover the inner meaning of silence and learn the wisdom that heals the world. Send peace and joy to each quiet place, to all who are waiting and listening. May your still small voice be heard.







