Mr Scott-Evans writes....

How not to revise.

We are now a couple of weeks into the formal exam season. With the majority of exams still to take place and the Whitsun holiday ahead of us, I thought I would take a moment to offer some advice to those students who still (despite all our advice) are not sure how best to revise. My thanks to Inner Drive for once again inspiring much of my material today.

First, let me tell you some of the things you should definitely NOT be doing if you want to do well in exams. You will not like the first one!

 Do not have a smart phone! The best thing to do is to hand in your phone until the end of the exams. It is the biggest time-wasting drain on



your schedule. Just get rid of it. Failing that, the next best thing to do is to make your smart phone into a 'dumb phone'. Make it black and white (in accessibility settings), remove all social media, Netflix, apps, games and any other distractions. Only keep things like exam timetables and the basic functions. If you do that you will save hours every week and massively increase your

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 chance of securing good
 grades. This step costs
 nothing but will raise your

 other intervention I can
 offer due to the sheer
 number of hours you will
 gain in a week!
- 2. Do not revise whilst listening to music. The latest research by Perham and Currie shows a clear negative impact. Those who revised in silence achieved 61% success, those who listened to music with no lyrics achieved 55%, those who listened to songs with lyrics only achieved 37%! Music is a distraction and takes up processing space. Stop listening to music while revising, and you will get a higher grade.
- 3. Do not just read, re-read and highlight. These activities take a long time and have very little positive effect on exam results. All the evidence shows that although it feels useful it is usually actually a waste of time.



- So, what are the best ways to revise? Lots of testing (known as retrieval practice) done in silence is the best strategy. Here are my top tips to make this even more effective.
 - 1. Use spacing. One hour of Chemistry each day for five days is much more effective than cramming for five hours on one day. Space out your revision! A 2007 study by Rohrer and Taylor showed that the students who spaced their revision scored 74% accuracy in their exam compared with only 49% for those who crammed.
 - Use interleaving. 30
 minutes of Shakespeare,
 30 minutes of Spanish
 Vocab, 30 minutes of
 Trigonometry, 30 minutes
 of River Erosion etc. is
 much better than longer
 blocks.
 - 3. **Use brain dumping**. Take a topic, write down all you can remember in silence with no reference to notes. Check what you forgot. Add it in using a different colour from memory. Then check a third time. What did you still forget? Add it in using another colour.
 - 4. Use flashcards. Make them for each topic. Check the <u>Leitner system</u> for how to use them with spacing and interleaving.
 - Plan answers to questions. Take a long answer question. Plan out

your response as if you were in the exam. Do this for several questions. Check your plan against the mark scheme. Past papers and mark schemes are all available on the exam board websites. You can find a list of our exams here. Use the list to look up the exam board and specification.



- 6. Write quizzes. Write questions for yourself and give the answers. Then hand the quiz to a family member to test you on it. You must get tested on it. It is not good enough to just read the quiz through. By being tested you will build your strength for the stresses of the exam. You can do this with key vocabulary/dates/quotes quite easily, but do not waste time testing yourself on things you know that you understand already!
- 7. Practise introductions and conclusions. It is a good idea to practise opening/closing paragraphs to essay questions that you think will come up. Write some and check with your

teacher to see what s/he thinks.

- Reduce to three. Read a section of notes and then push yourself to reduce the content of what you read to three bullet points (no more than ten words each).
- 9. Transform. Read a paragraph or two of important science or geography or history content then transform what you have learned into an image with no words. Or vice versa: take a diagram, study it carefully and then change it into a paragraph of explanation.
- 10. Collect and connect.

 Think about topics which are linked and search for quotations/practitioners/k ey facts that will apply across all of them. Learn these facilitating facts off by heart through regular testing. Make flashcards to help.

Feeling inspired? Ready to take the plunge and commit to getting rid of the phone for a month and dedicating yourself to the task? Well, here's my final 3 step plan to get you going.

STEP 1: If you have not already done so, make a list of what you need to revise. Highlight the things that you find difficult. Stop wasting time revising the stuff you know well. Focus on the hard bits you tend to avoid. Remember this year there is the advanced

information for each subject at GCSE and A Level.

STEP 2: Make a spaced timetable. Study each subject little and often. Mix up subjects and topics. Keep going with a mixture every day. Be sure that you will cover everything you really want in the time you have. Again, be ruthless, cross off the things you know well and study something hard!

STEP 3: Get started! Use the methods I have described. Test yourself, in silence, with no music. It is not glamorous or easy, but it works.

I really hope that this article helps. I shall be praying for all our students in all year groups as they set about revising this Whitsun. The school website has lots of details about our <u>curriculum</u> and the exams. Have a look!

I also want to wish Year 8 all the very best with the trip to Norfolk; I hope you have a fantastic time.


The weather looks like it will be superb for you.

Equipment for Exams

As the exam season begins, we want to remind you what equipment your son/daughter will require for his/her exams:

Black pens – biros are best.

Bring more than one! Do not write in any other colour or with pencil.

Pencils

Eraser

Pencil sharpener

Ruler

Protractor

Compasses

Highlighters – for use with questions only, not answers.

Calculator – make sure you clear anything in the memory and leave the lid at home.

Coloured pencils – for DT.

Everything should be stored in a clear pencil case/bag. **There is no need to bring a glue stick.**

Things not allowed in an exam are:

- Mobile phone
- Watch any type of watch is now forbidden, not just a smart watch
- Correcting fluid/tape or erasable pens
- Notes/papers
- Food or drink only water in a clear bottle is allowed.

Unauthorised items should either be left at home or in a coat/bag on the school grounds. Invigilators will give you an opportunity to hand unauthorised items to them before the exam begins. If you have made a genuine mistake and forgotten to take something out of your blazer pocket, this is the best time to hand it over.

Free School Meal Vouchers Whitsun Holiday

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Whitsun break 2022 has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays, we will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and carers of eligible students will receive an email from Wonde next week to allow them to claim a voucher for £15 for this period. Please check your junk mail if you have not received this by Friday 27th May. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.

The Ascension of Jesus

Yesterday, we celebrated the great feast of the Ascension. It is the 40th day of Easter. Jesus had completed his work here on earth and ascended to Heaven. If your son/daughter has uniform that they have grown out of please consider donating it to the school. It can be sent into reception any day with your son/daughter.




