Mr Scott-Evans writes:

Dear Parents/Carers

Latest <u>guidance</u> from the Department for Education (DfE) says that 'the role of parents is crucial in helping schools develop and maintain good behaviour. To support the school, parents should be encouraged to get to know the school's behaviour policy and, where possible, take part in the life of the school and its culture.'

I am writing with these things in mind today. Firstly, I want to point out to you that the school's behaviour policy is here on the school's website alongside most of our other policies. I would encourage all of you to read it. It is vitally important that everyone knows the approaches the school takes over issues of conduct in school. For example, what are the consequences that the school

might use? Did you know that we sometimes use Saturday detentions? Did you know that we sometimes confiscate property like mobile phones? Have you seen the list of things that will almost certainly lead to suspension or exclusion? Did you realise it includes possession of a banned item? And do you know what the list of banned items includes? You can find the list here. Would you support us if we suspended your son/daughter for bringing a banned item like chewing gum to school, for example?

The DfE say that 'parents have an important role in supporting the school's behaviour policy and should be encouraged to reinforce the policy at home as appropriate.' So, I would encourage you to read it and be

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ready to support us when required! The DfE says that, 'where a parent has a concern about management of behaviour, they should raise this directly with the school while continuing to work in partnership with them.' So, as always, I would like to remind you that you can contact us via the staff portal on the website, here.

Secondly, the DfE says that schools should 'reinforce the whole-school approach by building and maintaining positive relationships with parents, for example, by keeping parents updated about their children's behaviour, encouraging parents to celebrate pupils' successes, or holding sessions for parents to help them understand the school's behaviour policy.' We do these things through our reporting processes and parents' evenings. We also ensure that parents are informed every time their son/daughter is put into a detention or sent out of class.

I am also hosting some meetings for parents on 7th December. There will be a special prayer meeting focussing on the good conduct of students inside and outside of school from 8:45am to 9:15am. This will be followed by a Friends of Becket Keys (FOBK) Annual General Meeting which will elect a new committee and spend some time receiving any feedback that parents have on the Behaviour Policy. We have not had an AGM for FOBK since before Covid. FOBK provides a

great way for parents to get involved in the 'life of the school and its culture.'

I hope that you will join us for the prayer meeting and the AGM if you are able to. If not, then please do send any comments to us for our consideration via the portal mentioned above.

Music Department — 10th Anniversary House Music Competition

As part of the Becket Keys 10th Anniversary Celebrations, in term one, the Music department launched the inaugural House Music competition. This took place on November 11th and November 18th with all Year 7 houses involved in the Unison Cup, solo instrumental performers representing their house in the instrumental prize, and vocalists performing in a chamber concert competing for the solo vocalist prize. All three components were hotly contested with our adjudicators commenting on the high standards and enthusiasm of the performers. The Unison Cup was won by 7PP who sang the classic Kate Bush song 'Running Up That Hill' followed very closely by 7WW singing 'Valerie' and 7FS performing Queen's, 'We Will Rock You'.

The solo instrumental prize went to Diana Bognar from EW playing the piano, second place to Elliot Smith-Tun from HS on piano, and third place to Daniel Saunders from FS on drums. On Friday evening there were 16 vocalists competing for the solo vocal cup. This was perhaps the most difficult to judge as all singers were outstanding. In first place was Isabel Slaney from PP, followed very closely by Aneshka Carroll from EW, Mairéad Jordan in FS and Jess Martin from WW.

Book of the Month -November



"I've got two claws, Katie. Two giant, evil, freaking Freddy Krueger monster things. I am not calm."

Evie Wilder is living a normal life, used to living with "a rare form of diabetes". Except for the fact her mum has gone missing, she just found out she's a werewolf, she and her sister have to go into hiding in a motel whose weird manager keeps pushing Evie to go "full wolf", and there's not a single helpful vampire slayer to be found.

With the help of Kevin, the dorky manager of the guesthouse where Evie and Kate go to lie low, Evie starts learning to harness her wolfish side. But there's something a bit odd about Kevin...

Meanwhile, reports of animal attacks are increasing, local teens are going missing, and Evie is about to find herself at the centre of a supernatural showdown – plainly there's more than one predator on the loose.

This book is bloodily funny and appallingly enthralling, especially for fans of vampire and werewolf fiction.

Preparing for Advent

This Sunday marks the first Sunday of Advent. It seems to me that, for whatever reason, this year the season has approached faster than anticipated! Maybe it is because life is so busy or maybe it is a sign that I need this Advent season even more than ever before! At the core of the Advent season is the notion that we will take time to slow down, to reflect, and to work to become ready to see Jesus whenever he comes into our lives. Which is, of course, always. So, let us slow down. I think that is what God is asking of each of us. I know that is what he is asking of me. To slow down, acknowledge his presence, to reflect and to pray.

The poem 'Christmas' by John Betjeman (1954) comes to mind. It conveys the busyness of traditional preparation for Christmas, as well as the comfort and warmth of familiar things, but ends with the profound truth:

The bells of waiting Advent ring,
The Tortoise stove is lit again
And lamp-oil light across the night
Has caught the streaks of winter rain
In many a stained-glass window sheen
From Crimson Lake to Hookers Green.

The holly in the windy hedge And round the Manor House the yew



Will soon be stripped to deck the ledge,

The altar, font and arch and pew, So that the villagers can say 'The church looks nice' on Christmas Day.

Provincial Public Houses blaze, Corporation tramcars clang, On lighted tenements I gaze, Where paper decorations hang, And bunting in the red Town Hall Says 'Merry Christmas to you all'.

And London shops on Christmas Eve Are strung with silver bells and flowers

As hurrying clerks the City leave To pigeon-haunted classic towers, And marbled clouds go scudding by The many-steepled London sky.

And girls in slacks remember Dad, And oafish louts remember Mum, And sleepless children's hearts are glad.

And Christmas-morning bells say 'Come!'

Even to shining ones who dwell Safe in the Dorchester Hotel.

And is it true,


This most tremendous tale of all, Seen in a stained-glass window's hue, A Baby in an ox's stall? The Maker of the stars and sea Become a Child on earth for me?

And is it true? For if it is,
No loving fingers tying strings
Around those tissued fripperies,
The sweet and silly Christmas things,
Bath salts and inexpensive scent
And hideous tie so kindly meant,

No love that in a family dwells, No carolling in frosty air, Nor all the steeple-shaking bells Can with this single Truth compare That God was man in Palestine And lives today in Bread and Wine.

Sometimes we need time to slow down and see things anew. We need to give proper time and appreciation to Christ's story; His birth, His sacrifice and how he changes us and the world.

I enjoy poetry and will be rereading Mark Greene's uplifting book of Christmas poems 'ADVENTure' this Advent. The



book's poems, illustrations and Bible quotes encourage reflection. In his introduction to the book, he writes:

'Christmas, the Christmas that is not about the bubbly frenzy of all the preparation for the big day, still retains its shimmering mystery: ordinary people caught up in the divine drama that is the hinge of history. They are invited to take part, as we are: seeking, as we can; choosing, as we do; pressured, as we are: afraid, exhilarated, and, in the end, grateful, awed, content.'

Inspired by Hebrews 11:1, later Mark Green writes:

'Often, when we imagine the future, it's like the present but more so. But history and our lives teach us that it is not always so . . . As for the Jews of Israel under Roman occupation in, say 10BC,

well, they had for centuries hoped for the arrival of the saviour, a Messiah. He has been long predicted but was not imminently expected but then, out of the blue . . . God had been working in an unfashionable northern town, far from the madding crowd, in the lives of an apparently ordinary young women and a village carpenter . . . and their lives and of course all human history were about to change.'

Slow down and take time to be part of the His story, to prepare our hearts and lives for the coming of Christ, in confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see. Through prayer, we can connect with God's grace and love in asking Him to ready our hearts as He prepared all of history to receive the gift of His Son.

Let us pray:

Dear Heavenly Father,

We pray for focus and devotion during Advent. Fill us with Your presence, slow us down this Advent. Let me not be in a rush, so that we can fully appreciate the wonders of this season. In the busyness of our preparation, be our still small voice of calm.

In Jesus' name, Amen.




All parents/carers are invited to attend the 'Your Child, Their Future' Event on Thursday 24th November from 6:00pm - 7:30pm.











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Sports News
