# Why is assessment important?

We are coming to the end of another very busy and successful term. Our Year 11 and Year 13 students have done a fantastic job with their mock exams during the last couple of weeks. They have approached the exams with great focus and maturity. We couldn't have asked any more of them. The rest of the school have also been busy with end of term 'key tasks' or assessments, which have been designed to test the learning that has taken place this term.

We know that assessments and exams can be a source of stress and worry for some students. So why do we do them? Why are they important?

We know that practice makes perfect. Giving students lots of experience of assessments and exams is important, right from Year 7. Just as you wouldn't run a marathon without first training for many weeks, so taking exams is a learnt skill that requires training over time.

Another obvious reason is to see how much progress students have made and what they have learned. But this is only the start of the process. Once we are aware of what students can do, we need to know what students cannot do. Arguably, this is more important! Teachers analyse the

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data from assessments questionby-question. They are then able to give whole-class and individual feedback on the areas where students are struggling most.

I always say to my students at this point in the school year that rather than focusing on the mark, focus on the feedback! Knowing where and why things haven't quite gone to plan is much more useful for making improvements than knowing the grade that they have achieved. The academic year is a journey: we are nowhere near the end yet!

Regardless of the level of success that students have had in this most recent round of 'key tasks' and exams, the priority should be to identify what they need to do better and then they need to work on improving it. If all students do this after each 'key task' or exam, we will be celebrating record-breaking exam results once again next year!

## Give the gift of reading





## Geography Hazards Conference 2022

Taking the step up from Year 13 A-Level Geography to undergraduate studies at university is a monumental shift for many students. To support Becket Keys students in their transition to further education and beyond we arranged to attend the Geography Hazards Conference in London at the end of November.


The day was full of first-hand case studies, examples and subject specific knowledge and details that the students were able to add to their notes and understanding on the hazards topic, with over 700 other students from across the UK.

A lecture style event, led by university professors, eminent geographers, former chief examiners and subject experts, it was a thoroughly rewarding experience.

Inspiration and awe were the order of the day. The students kept a keen eye on the information shared, especially the innovations from Japan about harnessing cockroaches to search for CO2 emitted from survivors under rubble of collapsed buildings using GPS.

Now fully equipped with contemporary case studies and examples, as well as top tips and techniques from a range of experts we wish our Year 13s well in applying their learning and structuring top level answers in their forthcoming examinations.

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
## Year 7 Mandarin Day

In welcoming the Chinese New Year, 'The Year of the Rabbit,' we would like to inform you that a celebration is being organised for all Year 7 students. This day has been a huge success at Becket Keys in previous years. Mandarin Day for this academic year will take place on Friday, 20<sup>th</sup> January 2023.

Although not everyone in Year 7 is learning Mandarin; this event had been thoroughly enjoyed by all the Year 7 students in the past, and it is a great opportunity for all students to experience a different culture.

Students will go into six different workshops throughout the day; two of these will be run by external specialists. Students will not only gain a better understanding of Chinese culture through craft: Chinese papercutting and Chinese water painting, but also watching a film, experiencing Chinese martial arts and cooking a Chinese dish. Students will also do the fun snap bangers in the science session to explore the excitement of the Chinese invention – gun powder. 

#### Book of the Month -December

Alfie Wright? Alfie Wrong, more like. Alfie has never really fitted in anywhere – he doesn't have any friends, and even his mum seems embarrassed of him. So when he's evacuated to a farm in rural Devon run by kind old Aunt Bell and her gentle giant of a son, Alfie can't believe his luck. The War seems a long way off, and among the cows and pigs and geese Alfie's happier than he's ever been – especially when he makes friends with one of the local boys, Smidge. But Smidge, for all his friendliness, is not all he appears. And the mystery that surrounds him seems to be connected to the Midwinter Burning, an annual ritual held at the Standing Stones, high up on the cliffs. Aunt Bell says it's all just a bit of harmless superstition, but when Smidge goes missing, Alfie finally discovers who his friend really is.. Can Alfie help him, or is his fate sealed?

This is a fascinating, engaging timeslip novel with a dual narrative that shows us life as an evacuee and in ancient history. The landscape is vividly described adding layers of interest to the tale. Excitement, fear, and horror make this a page turner that will keep readers engrossed to the very end.

## **Comfort from Mary**

"His Mother Mary kneeling down, Unto the Lord did pray. O tidings of comfort and joy, Comfort and joy"

Mary can be identified as a source of spiritual comfort that also leads to joy in Christ, through her love of God and care for God incarnate. She also demonstrated that it is completely human to feel lots of different emotions. She rejoiced in Christ's birth, but also bore the pain of Christ's humanity. I wonder at the foot of His cross, if she knelt and prayed, in the same way that she may have done at His birth. Through all she remained committed to our salvation.



Thinking back to the first Christmas, it could hardly be described as 'comfortable'! Mary, the mother of Jesus, and Joseph, her husband, had to experience discomfort in order for the first Christmas to happen:

'In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you." Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end." "How will this be," Mary asked the angel, "since I am a virgin?" The angel

answered, "The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. Even Elizabeth your relative is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be unable to conceive is in her sixth month. For no word from God will ever fail." "I am the Lord's servant," Mary answered. "May your word to me be fulfilled." Then the angel left her.'

Luke 1:26-38

Mary did what God asked, even though it meant giving up her comfort. In addition, Joseph, her husband, was faithful to the law, and yet did not want to expose her to public disgrace. He had in mind to divorce her quietly, but, after he had considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream and said, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit." Joseph also did what God asked, even though it meant giving up his comfort.

Whilst Mary and Joseph chose to give up their comfort, they gained something incredible. They became part of the greatest moment in history, the birth of our Saviour! You and I may never be visited by an angel, but we all have the same choice to make. Christmas is not about you, me, or our comfort, it is about the coming of our Saviour.

So, this Christmas, how can we get a little uncomfortable in order to be part of something bigger than ourselves? Maybe:

- Be kind to a someone you struggle to like.
- Volunteer to serve someone who is hurting or in need.
- Ask for less and give away more.

Mary's example can provide us with comfort. Faith and trust in the Lord can also provide comfort, but also calls us to step out of our comfort zone and reach out to others. What might God's plan for you be?

## Free School Meal Vouchers Christmas Holiday

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Christmas period has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and carers of eligible children should have received an email from Wonde this week to allow them to claim their voucher. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for.

The current retailers available are Asda, Aldi, B&M, Farmfoods, M&S, Iceland, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Waitrose and Tesco. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.
