Mr Scott-Evans writes:

Dear Parents/Carers

This is my last newsletter of 2022. I wonder if you will read it! Imagine how it makes me feel to think that you might not. Here I am on the last day of term, crafting a letter to you all, and my thought right now is that it might be ignored!

Last week, Mr Witchalls, a regular member of our school prayer group, came in to lead collective worship each day with a similar question for our students. He asked them whether if their parents bought them a present, they would choose not to open it. Of course, that would be ridiculous they all agreed.

It would be bizarre and sad, wouldn't it?

Mr Witchalls then asked them about how it would be if the present had cost the parents everything they owned. Maybe they had sold everything to buy it. Imagine leaving that gift unopened! Imagine if it had even cost a parent their life: an organ donated, for example. Not just a little letter like this ignored, but a gift that had cost everything!

Perhaps you can see where this is going.

Mr Witchalls then linked this message about a gift, to the message of Christmas. Christ has come as the ultimate gift. One that changes our relationship with God forever. One that is full of all the things we need: love, joy, peace, hope and forgiveness. And yet...each Christmas it can go ignored, neglected and

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forgotten. Even though it cost him everything. Death on a cruel Roman cross was the ultimate destination for the baby we remember at this time of year.

I know some of you will not be reading my newsletter today. You will be too busy. Tell me about it! This opening article has taken me exactly 29 minutes to write. Not a big cost to me or to society. However, it does upset me to think that anyone might be celebrating Christmas this year without accepting the true meaning of the best gift that has ever been given. One that cost the giver everything he had.

John 3:16 says:

"For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

I would urge you to look at this gift again this Christmas.
Whether in church or at home. It is a gift that has changed my life forever and I would long for you to know it for yourselves. A great place to look is Luke's Gospel account. Reading that would be a great way to unwrap the gift of Jesus this Christmas.

Give the gift of reading



Geography Conference December 2022

It was a cold and snowy day, school was closed due to the 15cm of snow covering Brentwood, but the intrepid Sixth Form Geographers still made their way to Westminster for the annual conference at the Emmanuel Centre.



The students were Introduced to Google Arts and Culture and the use of GIS, drones, 3D mapping of images and sound to explore 'no mans lands'. We were wowed by how the technology used in Bolivia just a few years ago by the technology goliath is now available in the latest iPhone; opening up the possibility for students' NEAs in the future.





We called in at Downing Street on the way to the venue to wish the PM a Merry Christmas, but unfortunately, he was otherwise engaged.




The day was full of inspiring talks and lectures on a range of topics including sustainable environments and urban guerrilla gardeners.

The session was fully interactive, using <u>Sli.do</u> to gain audience perceptions and ask questions of the speakers, many of which were extremely insightful and probing.


Issues associated with inequality and access to reliable and clean water supplies were made very real by Dr Sonia Hoque for the University of Oxford when illustrating the conditions millions face in the megacity of Dhaka, with 'hanging toilets' and pollution of waterways and the link to the western nationas fast fashion industry.



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Professor <u>Danny Dorling</u> introduced the concept of 'peak child' to the captivated audience and his discussion of human and social geography and the lack of investment by successive governments into social services, impacting the future of the UK. He used maps and charts to illustrate his points and ideas to great effect, such as the one below.





The final speaker of the day was <u>Ness Knight</u>, who vividly described her adventures which included exploring the depths of the tropical rainforest in French Guiana to find the source of a previously unmapped river.



The whole audience were captivated by her speech. They were on the edge of their seats as they heard how Ness had to eat live insects that tried to climb back up her oesophagus and daily extracting grubs that had embedded themselves in her skin just to survive in some of the most remote parts of the world.



Free School Meal Vouchers Christmas Holiday

Further funding for Free School Meal vouchers for the Christmas period has been allocated by the local authority. As with previous holidays will be using the school voucher system, Wonde, to issue vouchers.

Parents and carers of eligible children should have received an email from Wonde this week to allow them to claim their voucher. The email will contain a link to 'redeem a voucher'. You will be taken to Wonde's 'evouchers' page (previously named Schoolvouchers), where you will need to enter your details and confirm your email address before being asked to select the retailer you wish to receive a voucher for.

The current retailers available are Asda, Aldi, B&M, Farmfoods, M&S, Iceland, Morrisons, Sainsburys, Waitrose and Tesco. You will then be given a PIN and the option to view the voucher. Having confirmed the PIN, you will be issued your voucher. The voucher barcode can be printed off or scanned on a smartphone for use in-store.




If you are doing your Christmas shopping on line? Why not see if you can help raise some funds for FoBK through your online purchases in a few easy steps:

As per the email sent out to parents during the week, the school have had confirmed cases of scarlet fever.

Although scarlet fever is usually a mild illness, it should be treated with antibiotics to minimise the risk of complications and reduce the spread to others.

We would like to remind parents that the symptoms of scarlet fever include a sore throat, headache, fever, nausea and vomiting. This is followed by a fine red rash which typically first appears on the chest and stomach, rapidly spreading to other parts of the body. On more darkly-pigmented skin, the scarlet rash may be harder to spot, but it should feel like 'sandpaper'. The face can be flushed red but pale around the mouth.

If you think you, or anyone in your family, has scarlet fever:

- see your GP or contact NHS 111 as soon as possible;
- make sure that a full course of any antibiotics prescribed by the Doctor is taken:
- stay at home, away from school or work for at least 24 hours after starting the antibiotic treatment, to avoid spreading the infection;
- Please email the school to make us aware.



Book of the Month -December

Alfie Wright? Alfie Wrong, more like. Alfie has never really fitted in anywhere – he doesn't have any friends, and even his mun seems embarrassed of him. So when he's evacuated to a farm in rural Devon run by kind old Aunt Bell and her gentle giant of a son, Alfie can't believe his luck. The War seems a long way off, and among the cows and pigs and geese Alfie's happier than he's ever been – especially when he makes friends with one of the local boys, Smidge. But Smidge, for all his friendliness, is not all he appears. And the mystery that surrounds him seems to be connected to the Midwinter Burning, an annual ritual held at the Standing Stones, high up on the cliffs. Aunt Bell says it's all just a bit of harmless superstition, but when Smidge goes missing, Alfie finally discovers who his friend really is... Can Alfie help him, or is his fate sealed?

This is a fascinating, engaging timeslip novel with a dual narrative that shows us life as an evacuee and in ancient history. The landscape is vividly described adding layers of interest to the tale. Excitement, fear, and horror make this a page turner that will keep readers engrossed to the very end.

Students should not have any extreme hairstyles and hair must not be dyed or shapes cut into the hair e.g. stripes or undercuts.


Please remember that all students will be in need of a COAT – Plain BLACK without coloured flashes, logos or slogans, no 'fashion items', no 'puffer' jackets.

John 3:16 tells us that Jesus came because God loves us so much that he does not want any of us to miss out on spending eternity (forever) with him. - What would you be willing to give up for those you love? (Favourite possessions, choosing the evenings TV viewing, time for hobbies, money, career aspirations, etc.)
- How much do you think God had to love us in order to give His son for us?

Let us pray:

Father in heaven, thank you for the gift of your son Jesus who came because you love us so much and want to spend forever with us. Help us to believe that Jesus came to save us and help us to show your love to one another. Help us to share the great joy of this Good News. **Amen.**

Remember, slow down this Christmas. Reflect on God's eternal love and encourage others to share in God's gift. This is what will fill you with everlasting joy.



I pray that the Prince of Peace will spread His love and joy over you and your family this Christmas and always.

May the Spirit of Christmas bring you peace.

May the joy of Christmas bring you hope
and the message of Christmas reveal God's amazing love.
