Mr Scott-Evans writes:

Sharpen the Saw

There are a few books that I have read several times. One of these is Stephen Covey's '7 Habits of Highly Effective People'. The book was first given to me by a close friend from church who, being a few years ahead of me, could see I was struggling with the demands of leadership, and he wanted to help me learn the principles through which effective people operate. I must have read this book at least four times since then! I have also dipped into it over the years many times to revisit some of the key passages and to share them with staff and students.

The 7th Habit is 'Sharpen the Saw', Covey draws inspiration from the well-known parable of the little girl who comes across a lumberjack labouring away at a tree and asks him why he does not stop to sharpen the saw. The lumberjack, overwhelmed by the task at hand, replies that he is too busy and does not have time to stop to sharpen his saw. The girl knows better than the stressed-out man! Often, I find this the case here at school too; the students are better at this habit than the adults. For example, they fully embrace a long lunch break and a good break in the morning.

The 7th Habit is all about renewal and it is the most important because none of the other habits will work unless we are able, fit and well to enact them. If we allow the task at hand to be the only thing we focus on, we will burn ourselves out.



Biblical Pause Now the work of Christmas can begin.

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So, having had a tough end to 2022, I started the New Year by reading this section of Covey's book again. I reminded myself of the principles of the 7th Habit; I then talked about this with our staff in our first session on the INSET day on Wednesday. We also looked at the Bible and read what Jesus taught his disciples about seeking first His Kingdom and His righteousness and how, in doing so, all these other things will also be added unto us. (Matthew 6 v 29-34)

Stephen Covey a devoted Christian himself agrees that the spiritual dimension is just as important as the other areas of renewal: physical, emotional, social and mental.

The New Year is often a time of resolutions. I wonder how many of us have physical ones.

Adjusting diet, exercise and sleep patterns are all very important, but they are often the only ones that people consider. I would like to encourage us all to think more widely this year. Parents – how

about discussing this with your children as we start 2023?

Firstly, how about mental renewal? What are you reading and learning? What about your children? Are they learning and developing in more than just the essentials of school? An instrument, a sport, and/or a hobby should be part of everyone's childhood, surely. Reading for pleasure should also be firmly on the agenda. What are they reading? When was the last time they went to the library? When was the last time you allowed yourself to do that!?

In terms of social renewal, meeting with friends and family may well have been a feature of Christmas, but what is next? How are your family connecting with others? Intergenerational social connections are particularly special and should be highly valued. Church is always a great option for this.

Emotional renewal comes in the form of things that are likely to bring us deep joy and satisfaction. A trip to the theatre, a walk in the woods, a holiday booked for the summer. Sometimes, just having these things to look forward to is enough to bring an emotional boost. What else? A board game? A new house plant? A pet?

Now let us go back to spiritual renewal. Where does prayer, Bible reading and reflection fit for you in all of this? Maybe for some of us it is time to go back to church once a week. Others may want to find a podcast to inspire us. Another book I must

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recommend again is 'The Ruthless Elimination of Hurry' by John Mark Comer; it is ideal for those of you who feel too busy in the modern world. I am on my second reading of this one!

Whatever your resolutions this year, I pray that the year ahead will be a blessed one for you and your children; may 2023 be the best yet for Becket Keys and all who come to school here.

Mr Scott-Evans recently wrote to all families to see if you would like to donate any books to Becket Keys Church of England School. Many thanks to those who have already contributed.



At Becket Keys, we look to ensure that we are preparing students for life beyond school; this includes encouraging students to attend school regularly, and of course, on time.

Remember that the school gate closes at **8.25am**. This allow sstudents enough time to be at their first lesson on time. Period 1 begins at 8.30am.

Brentwood can be tough to manoeuvre during rush hour, so we encourage students and parents to contact the school in the case of *genuine* lateness such as delayed public transport.

Main School Uniform



A letter was sent to parents before Christmas with reminders about uniform and the high standards we have at Becket Keys.

Feedback from our families is crucial to our development; parents have mentioned to us that they appreciate consistency and firmness with regards to uniform, and so, with this in mind, we want to make a strong start in 2023.

Hair & Make-up

Students in Years 7-9 are not permitted to wear any make-up. The only make up allowed is concealer to cover up spots and blemishes. Students who do wear make up to school will be asked to remove it.

Obviously false eyelashes and/or nails are not permitted, please

ensure such items are removed if they were a 'treat' for Christmas.

No extreme hairstyles i.e. not less than grade 2 in length, hair must not be dyed (not even natural colours!), no shapes cut into the hair e.g. stripes, undercuts. Long hair must be tied back at all times. Older students (Years 10,11) can have it partially tied up. Younger students (Years 7,8,9) must have it fully tied up.

Any hairbands, clips or ribbons should be neutral, black or purple.

Bags & Coats

Please ensure, in all cases, that these items are **black**.

Year 7 & 8 students must have Becket Keys' bags from SmartyPants.

Older students are allowed to choose their own bags, but no large logos please.

Coats must be **plain black** for all year groups.

Shoes

Please ensure all students have returned to school in January with the correct footwear, trainers should only be worn, if there is a medical issue (a note must be supplied and kept in the student's blazer).



Jewellery

Students may wear one small silver or gold stud in the lobe of the ear, but they must be removed for all PE lessons. It is not acceptable to put tape over the ears. No other body piercing or jewellery is acceptable and will be confiscated. Smart watches are not permitted.

Equipment

Please ensure you check your son/daughter's stationery. The January sales are a good time to top up pencil cases! Please check for red/black/blue pens, whiteboard markers, pencils, rulers, rubbers and calculators. These are all basic requirements at Becket Keys.

We understand that the pavements may be congested so students must be patient and considerate.

We would also remind parents to take care and be mindful of pedestrians and other drivers when travelling. We do not want any student to be injured so please avoid driving down Sawyers Hall Lane if you can and meet your son/daughter at another location. The Brentwood Centre is ideal and only a short walk away.

YOUTH SERVICE Inspire Enable Achieve

The Young Essex Assembly (YEA) is the elected youth council for Essex and is supported by Essex Youth Service.

Every two years, 75 young people representing all districts across Essex are elected on to the YEA where they review priorities, consult organisations and decision makers to ensure young people are a key part of discussions and decisions made at all levels.

The Young Essex Assembly encourages young people to become active members of their local and wider community and enables them to influence change.

The members of the Young Essex Assembly meet once every month, they call these meetings 'sittings'. Members will also be a part of an area group working on local issues. Each member is asked to take part in another group, which focuses on current work the YEA is undertaking. These are called 'Sub-Groups'.

All sittings are held within the County and will often take place on a Saturday or on a day during the school holidays. Smaller

Requirements

This is the level of requirements for YEA members:

- The minimum age to join the YEA is 11 years and attending secondary school.
- The maximum age to join the YEA is 19 years, or up to 25 years if you have additional needs.
- You must either live, work or study in the district you wish to represent.
- You will be expected to attend a monthly meeting in Chelmsford, which we call a Sitting, plus a monthly Local Link meeting in your local area.

meetings, which involve the subgroups, usually take place during an evening mid-week.

There are 75 YEA members, representing all districts across Essex. The Young Essex Assembly review priorities and consult with young people as well as campaigning to make a positive difference for young people in Essex.

Elections will be held in Summer 2023 with applications being welcomed from 1st

July 2022 and the deadline will be Friday 20th January 2023.



Now the work of Christmas begins

Today, we celebrate the Feast of Epiphany. This concludes the twelve days of Christmastide and is the traditional end of the Christmas season. In biblical terms the word epiphany, meaning "revelation" best describes the story of how the Magi or Three Kings saw a bright star on the night Christ was born. When they followed it to Bethlehem, they found the Christ child and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. Whilst decorations come down and are packed away for another year, many of us will wish that the spirit of Christmas would continue. The spirit of Christmas embraces generosity which compels us to give, to care, to share, to love and to work for the greater good.

I recently came across the poem "The Work of Christmas" written by Howard Thurman, an African American theologian, educator and civil rights leader. Instead of Epiphany marking the end of Christmas, it challenges the reader to view this day as a beginning. A day to continue the work of Christmas:

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are



home,
when the shepherds are back
with their flocks,
the work of Christmas begins:
to find the lost,
to heal the broken,
to feed the hungry,
to release the prisoner,
to rebuild the nations,
to bring peace among the
people,
to make music in the heart.

The poem "The Work of Christmas" is from Howard Thurman's The Mood of Christmas and Other Celebrations (published in 1973).

This poem has been set to music by various composers over the years, including Elizabeth Alexander and Dan Forrester. Take time to listen, reflect and meditate upon its message for you:

The poem makes the connection between the joy of Christmas and the challenging work of discipleship that the incarnation demands. It calls us to remember who Jesus was, what he did and what he cared about. Consider the words of Matthew 25:35-36:

'For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me.'

This is at the heart of Jesus' message for the world. Jesus calls the Church to follow Him and find Him amongst the lost, the broken, the hungry and the prisoner, because this is how nations are rebuilt, peace is created and real music made. As such, the work of Christmas is a lifetime concern and action.

Mary, the mother of Jesus, was said to be "perplexed" when the Angel Gabriel informed her that she was carrying the son of God, and the hope of a broken people. Her first response is understandable, but her second response is remarkable. Like

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The Starfish Story

"While wandering a deserted beach at dawn, stagnant in my work, I saw a man in the distance bending and throwing as he walked the endless stretch toward me. As he came near, I could see that he was throwing starfish, abandoned on the sand by the tide, back into the sea. When he was close enough I asked him why he was working so hard at this strange task. He said that the sun would dry the starfish and they would die. I said to him that I thought he was foolish. There were thousands of starfish on miles and miles of beach. One man alone could never make a difference. He smiled as he picked up the next starfish. Hurling it far into the sea he said, "It makes a difference for this one."



Moses and others called by God to great tasks, Mary sets aside fear and responds: "Here I am."

Our answer to the call to respond to the challenges of this world must equal Mary's: Here we are! At the start of the Gospel of John, we are told: "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it." We must believe that the light of God's people can free the world from oppression and offer love in place of hate. We must not be afraid of the scale of the many issues facing this world. As an individual, making a difference to one person's life is better than not trying at all. Loren Eiseley's starfish story beautifully illustrates this:

This story challenges are perceived limits and ability to make a difference. Collectively,

we can move the work of Christmas in the right direction.

Let us pray:

Dear Lord, the celebrations are over, the song of the angels is stilled, yet the work of Christmas begins. As we welcome a new year, help us work together to make the world a better place. Led by your example and encouraged by your grace and love, all things are possible.

In the last few months, the need for the Foodbank has increased by more than 50% and the local Food Bank is now currently feeding over 100 people every day.

JANUARY ITEMS REQUIRED
