International Women's Day, Wednesday 8th March

It was international women's day on Wednesday, and to mark this event we used materials with students this week to support their personal development regarding their understanding of misogyny.



It seems fitting to feature an inspirational woman on the front page today.

Today is Friday the 10th of March, feast of the abolitionist, Harriet Tubman, who died on this day in 1913.

Araminta Ross was born into slavery sometime around the year 1820 in Maryland, USA. Although she never learned to read or write, her mother furnished her mind with a rich treasure of stories from the Bible. As she grew up, her faith also grew strong, along with a determined desire to be free. In 1849 she realised it was not enough simply to pray for deliverance from slavery, 'She needed to combine faith with action. By escaping to the North,' writes historian Catherine Clinton, 'she felt she

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would be doing God's will.'

After a remarkable escape, she made her way to freedom in Pennsylvania and, as was common for former slaves, took a new name: Harriet Tubman.

Along the way, Harriet had been helped by 'the Underground Railroad' – an undercover network of men and women assisting escaped slaves along the track to freedom. Now that she was free. Harriet was not content to leave her extended family behind in slavery, and so she became a 'conductor' on the Railroad, rescuing many of her family members, and hundreds of others, and escorting them on their journey north. Harriet became a leading abolitionist. In fact, she was so successful that slaveowners posted a \$40,000 reward for her capture or death.

Thomas Garret, a stationmaster in the Underground Railroad, said of Harriet that he had never met anyone 'who had more confidence in the voice of God spoken direct to her soul. 'She "had faith in God"; always asked Him what to do, and direct her, "which," she said, "He always did."



Harriet often preached the power of persistence:

If you are tired, keep going; if you are scared, keep going; if you are hungry, keep going; if you want to taste freedom, keep going.

What inspirational words for all of us to live by.





Book Recommendations – Short Stories






























World Book Day Book Tokens










"Whoever wants to be great must become a servant." Mark 10:43


In last week's Biblical Pause, it was suggested that Lent is a perfect time to evaluate how well we put our faith in action; it is a time to challenge ourselves to ensure that our faith is clearly expressed in all aspects of our lives. Staff at Becket Keys are clear of the 'Why' of Becket Keys and their purpose in our community. We have a shared language and shared understanding of what Becket Keys is about. As a Church of England School, the 'Why' is Christ-centred. Look at the centre of the second diagram below; an adaptation of Simon Sinek's 'Golden Circle'. I have created the cross in the centre out of arrows pointing inwards. We need to think, act and communicate from the inside out to show that Christ is at the heart. This informs the how and the what; the 'lived-outness' of faith. It is with servitude that we approach our work and relationship at Becket Keys.



The world defines greatness in terms of power, possessions, prestige, and position. If you can demand service from others, you have made it! In our self-serving culture with its "me first" mentality, acting like a servant is not always a popular concept. Jesus, however, measured greatness in terms of service, not status. Thousands of books have been written on leadership, but few on servanthood. Everyone wants to lead; no one wants to be a servant. But to be like Jesus is to be a servant:

"Your attitude must be like my own, for I, the Messiah, did not come to be served, but to serve and to give my life." Matthew 20:28

God determines your greatness by how many people you serve, not how many people serve you.




For Christians, service is not something to be tacked onto our schedules if we can spare the time. It is the heart of the Christian life. Jesus came "to serve" and "to give" – and these two verbs should define your life on earth too. Serving and giving sum up is part of God's purpose for our lives. Mother Teresa once said, "Holy living consists in doing God's work with a smile."

Jesus taught that spiritual maturity is never an end in itself. Maturity is for ministry! We grow up in order to give out. It is not enough to keep learning more and more. We must act on what we know and practice what we claim to believe. Study without service leads to spiritual stagnation. The old comparison between the Sea of Galilee and the Dead Sea is still true. Galilee is a sea full of life, because it takes in water, but also gives it out. In contrast, nothing lives in the Dead Sea because, with no outflow, the sea has stagnated. We need serving experiences in which we can exercise our spiritual muscles. At Becket Keys, our inward focus on Christ leads to an outward focus on others.







The mature follower of Jesus stops asking, "Who's going to meet my needs?" and starts asking, "Whose needs can I meet?" A servant heart reveals Christian maturity. God notices even the smallest acts of kindness; picking up litter, checking someone else is OK, smiling and forgiving someone ... the list could go on indefinitely. There are always things we could do or say to brighten the day for those we meet and reflect God's love.


St Teresa of Avila's beautifully expressed this servitude: Christ has no body but yours,
No hands, no feet on earth but yours,
Yours are the eyes with which he looks
Compassion on this world.


I love the tangible, physical nature of these words. They are direct and unmistakable. We see that the Christian life is dynamic and active; to be lived out in our lives, to be embodied. We are called individually to be **salt and light in this world**, preserving the teachings of Jesus and revealing God's love (Matthew 5:13-16). Anyone can be a servant. All it requires is character!

Let us pray:




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Mid Essex District v Liverpool Boys Football
