Mrs Dowsett writes:

This week we have been celebrating Neurodiversity Week at Becket Keys. Founded in 2018, Neurodiversity Celebration Week is a worldwide initiative that challenges stereotypes and misconceptions about neurological differences.

On Wednesday's whole school collective worship, I spoke to our students about how neurodiversity means recognising that everyone's brain works differently. The human brain is an amazingly powerful organ, and no human brain is exactly alike. God has a plan for all of us and has made everyone to be unique.

In Jeremiah Chapter 1 verse 5 the Bible says "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I set you apart." The beauty of our diverse brains means that the things that some of us will find challenging that others find easy. One of my greatest challenges in life has been learning to pass my driving test. I am a competent driver but found that nerves crippled me. Eventually with persistance and effort I finally passed my driving test on my fourth attempt.

A word that I find challenging is when I hear people being described as 'normal' or 'abnormal.' I would like to argue that there is no such idea of 'normal' as we are all unique. I would like challenge us to not use the word 'normal' and instead use the term diverse which is much more inclusive.

In the collective worship I spoke about the labels that are used to

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show different ways of thinking including dyslexia, Autism and ADHD. For each of these labels there are strengths as well as different ways of perceiving the world. Many famous people have spoken about their barriers to learning and how overcoming these have made them the person that they are today.

Last month I was inspired to read in the news about Jason Arday who became Cambridge
University's youngest black professor. What made his story so amazing was that Arday was diagnosed with Autism and global developmental delay. He was unable to speak until he was 11 years old and could not read and write until he was 18 years old. Arday overcame his barriers and now aged 37 he has achieved his life-long goal of becoming a Sociology professor.

Every day that I work as a teacher and at Becket Keys, I am encouraged by our students and colleagues who continue to work hard to overcome their own unique differences and challenges. I urge us all to be respectful, caring and responsible to each other's differences. One of the greatest powers we have is the ability to make a positive difference to someone through our caring words. Can you accept the challenge to make someone's day by being fair and caring?














On Monday 13th March three of our sixth form students took part in a piano masterclass with one of Europe's leading young pianists, Danilo Mascetti. We were invited by the director of music, Andrew Wright at Brentwood Cathedral to take part in our second such masterclass.



All three students performed exceptionally well, and Danilo focused on how to produce a beautiful tone from the piano and spoke about the differences between the fortepiano of Haydn's time to that of the much larger grand piano that Debussy would have enjoyed.

This was a unique opportunity for our students to have a lesson with a leading artist and play the new grand piano in the Cathedral. We were treated at the end by a performance from Danilo who enthralled the audience with a very moving Ukrainian piece ending with a dramatic Beethoven work.

Come and join the Coronation Festival at King George's Playing Field on Monday 8 May

Brentwood Council will join towns and cities across the country to celebrate His Majesty King Charles III being crowned alongside the Queen Consort.



The Coronation will take place at Westminster Abbey on Saturday 6 May, with a series of special events planned. This extended bank holiday 6-8 May 2023 will provide an opportunity for communities throughout the United Kingdom and Commonwealth to come together to celebrate the historic

Coronation of His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen Consort.

To celebrate, Brentwood Council in collaboration with the Imperial Youth Band, Brentwood School Big Band, St Thomas' Church Mass Choir and Deputy Lieutenant Graham Clegg are pleased to be hosting a Coronation Festival on Monday 8 May from 12-5pm in King George's Playing Field.

The free event will be an afternoon full of entertainment in the park to celebrate the King's Coronation with food, drink and family activities. Recalling His Majesty's lifelong dedication to public service, supported by The Queen Consort and other Members of The Royal Family, it is hoped the Coronation will bring communities together in volunteering initiatives and create a legacy from the Coronation weekend. With this in mind there will be a strong sense

of community and many groups will be in attendance, from uniform groups to local charities and voluntary sectors, all coming together to celebrate the King's Coronation.

Buckingham Palace is also encouraging residents to take part in street parties and gatherings, the Big Lunch and Big Help Out events, as part of the celebrations.

Brentwood Borough Council's Chair of the Community, **Environment and Enforcement** Committee, Councillor Will Russell, said: "The Coronation of a new monarch is a significant moment in our history and many people in the UK and across the Commonwealth will be keen to celebrate. The Coronation Festival at Kind George's Playing Fields will be a wonderful time to celebrate with friends, family and neighbours but it also provides an opportunity to give something back to the community.

"The programme of events has been specially developed to be in line with the King's recognised interests in volunteering, nature, the environment and communities. I would like to encourage everyone in Brentwood to come along on Monday May 8th to mark this national celebration".

Street Party

Residents are reminded that local communities planning to hold street parties to mark the Coronation are encouraged to apply now if they need temporary road closure for their event. The application form and details are now live on the Council's website. To help residents commemorate the Coronation the Council is waiving the usual administration fee for street party road closures, but applications will need to be registered by no later than **Friday 17 March 2023**.

May, will encourage communities to come together, celebrate their connections and get to know each other better. It will bring the Coronation festivities into the heart of every community. 

At Becket Keys, we look to ensure that we are preparing students for life beyond school. We encourage students to attend school regularly and on time.


Remember that the school gate closes at **8.25am**. This allows students enough time to be at their first lesson on time. Period 1 begins at 8.30am.

Help from the Lord

'I lift up my eyes to the hills — from where will my help come?'

Psalm 121 is a song for the journey to Jerusalem, appropriate for this time of Lent as we consider Jesus' and our own Lenten journeys. It is referred to as a 'Psalm of ascension' or travel:

I lift up my eyes to the hills from where will my help come?

My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

He will not let your foot be moved; he who keeps you will not slumber.

He who keeps Israel

will neither slumber nor sleep.

The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade at your right hand.

The sun shall not strike you by day, nor the moon by night.

The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life.


The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time on and for evermore.

These words, from the psalmist, David, speak of both a sense of threat and a hope of help. These words, or similar, are voiced by millions of people around the world daily. Words that are spoken, though not always heard, and not always answered. 'My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.' More words. This time, words that speak of a source of protection, even deliverance from danger namely the Lord. These words are proclaimed in the Psalter for others to take up as their own song. Yet what use are these words to those who suffer conflict, marginalisation, and injustice? What comfort to those who are offered little peace, opportunity, or freedom? What use is a song if it is not rooted in reality? For those across the world who have endured the reality of conflict and extreme violence, how do these words resonate? For those who, daily, do not have access to clean water or enough food? For those who endure the brunt of a typhoon or the injustice of displacement from the land that has been theirs for generations? One priest said: 'We call this book the book of life, and that is what it is, for there is a word in this book, which if we hear it, we will live.' How do these words of the psalmist, these

words of God, become the-word-made-flesh for the many people who cannot yet sing this song? What must happen for all of God's people to hear these words of protection and find new life in them?

We can embody the Word of God, put it into action and be part of the essential work of building safe lives – that others might take up the song: 'My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.' There is a danger to focusing on our own stories, blinkered to the struggles of the wider world. Take time this weekend to widen your view, to search beyond the immediate horizon. Reflect on the words of this Psalm:

- Read over Psalm 121 slowly, and notice if there are any lines, verses or even single words that catch your attention.
- What are they? What is it about them that draws your attention?
- Do you have any experience that speaks to that verse or word?
- Spend some time slowly repeating the phrase from Psalm 121 that you noticed, and let it sink into you. After a while, consider how the words might help you in your support of others, such as in situations of conflict?



What would these words look like if put into action?

 Finally, taking this phrase (or indeed another from the psalm) ask, 'How do these words help us love God, others, and perhaps ourselves, more?'

Listen to the words of the hymn 'I lift my eyes to the quiet hills' written my Timothy Dudley (a retired bishop of the Church of England). He was the Archdeacon of Norwich Cathedral, as well as the Bishop of Thetford, so he was inspired by our own wonderful countryside and hills close to home. Rest in the presence of God, our strength and shield:


For those who have watched over us,

Amen.







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Girls' Netball Year 7 & 8
