World Mental Health Day is an annual awareness day observed every 10th October. It's the World's Federation for Mental Health (WFMH) initiative with the objective to raise awareness of mental health matters, to increase efforts to support mental health, and to reduce the stigma often attached to mental illness.

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

We were inundated with volunteers for the Open Event this year and three of our Year 7 girls, Ava Foster, Phoebe Anderton and Lara Muir stood up on the stage in front of a packed Main Hall and shared their experiences of coming to Becket Keys as new Year 7 students. All three performed beautifully and we are delighted that their experiences have been so positive.

Here is what Phoebe had to say:

Good evening, I'm Phoebe and I am in year seven at Becket Keys. If I am honest, I felt very nervous about moving from primary to secondary school. I loved my time at primary school and the move to secondary school seemed like a big step. I remember looking around the school this time last year and thinking to myself that I would never be able to find my way around and remember everything.

I needn't have worried – everyone at Becket Keys has been so friendly and welcoming to us year sevens. I think the thing that stands out about this school, is the teachers; their support with classwork, homework and moving around the school has been great. I feel safe knowing that I could approach any of them if I had an issue, particularly my new form tutor who we see on a daily basis. One of the biggest changes from primary to secondary is the amount of homework you receive. All of your homework is given on an app called satchel one. I have found this really useful as it makes it very clear what is expected of you and when. This has really helped me manage my time and not become overwhelmed.

Joining Becket Keys has given me the opportunity to try a variety of new things including becoming part of the drama club, using Bunsen burners in science and using recording equipment in music. There are so many clubs on offer – both at lunchtime and after

school - there really is something for everyone. This has been a great way for me to meet others who have similar interests and gain more confidence. The teachers are really passionate about their subjects and making the lessons interesting.

A big highlight for me has been the food at Becket Keys! There is always something delicious to choose from and I have really enjoyed the independence in choosing my own snacks and lunch each day and using my thumb to pay for it!

Starting at Becket Keys has definitely pushed me out of my comfort zone and given me the courage to try new things - I represented the school at cross country this week, which is something I would never have done this time last year. Each lesson is with a different group of people which again, is a great way of mixing with a wide range of different people.

Overall, I have really enjoyed my start at Becket Keys – I feel safe, welcomed and well supported by everyone here and hope that if you join the school you will be happy in your time here too.

Mid-Autumn Festival

The Mid–Autumn Festival, also known as Moon Festival or Mooncake Festival, is a traditional festival celebrated in China. It is the second-most important holiday after the Chinese New Year with a history dating back 3,000 years.

The Mid-Autumn is on 15th August lunar month each year. This year it was on the 17th of September. On this day, the Chinese believe that the moon is at its brightest and fullest size, coinciding with harvest time in the middle of Autumn.

In our Mandarin Year 7,8 and 9 classes, students were read the legendary story of the Mid-Autumn Festival, and we explained that Chinese families normally get together on this day to have a feast, followed by moongazing and eating the festival snack, mooncakes, a rich pastry typically filled with sweetbean, lotus-seed paste or other savoury filling. The round shape of the mooncake symbolises the full moon and the family reunion.

Our Year 7 and 8 Mandarin Excellence Programme students





'Nobody ever told me there was a space called poetry where I could find a shape for all the thoughts I carried.'

This first-person poetry narrates the journey of a boy navigating the highs and lows of secondary school – from a first day of long sleeves and clumpy shoes, to burning textbooks on graduation.

The poems vary in style, structure and theme, but this book takes the reader on an emotional rollercoaster; from anger at your teachers to those blissful, simple days with your mates. There is a space in Matt's poetry for all teens to feel seen, whether poetry is their thing or not!

It should be noted that this book contains swear words and includes content which readers may find challenging. However, while difficult themes are addressed, they are explored sensitively and with plenty of lightness to balance the darker moments.

It is a great example of the power of poetry as a form of expression for young people.
