We have always been blessed with volunteers who come into the exam halls to assist with invigilation, while also praying for the students as they take their exams. A regular prayerful invigilator, often shares how rewarding it is to silently pray for each student's focus, peace, and future, all while keeping a watchful eye on the room. He has mastered the art of "praying with his eyes open," ensuring he can notice any students who might be struggling or losing focus and offer a prayer of support for them in that moment. He walks the room, praying for their results, their future steps, and that they would feel calm in the midst of exam pressures.

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
Science Club

Black History Month October 2024

Black History Month was first celebrated in the UK in October 1987, and was the initiative of Ghanaian analyst Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, who had worked as a coordinator of special projects for the Greater London Council (GLC). The concept of Black History Month originated in the US, at Kent State University, where it was first proposed in 1969 and first celebrated from January 2-February 28, 1970.


Within six years it was being marked in educational institutions all across the country, with President Gerald Ford telling Americans to 'seize the opportunity to honour the too-often neglected accomplishments of Black Americans in every area of endeavour throughout our history'.

Black History Month is also celebrated in countries all over the world.


From science and sport to literature and law, *Brilliant Black British History*, by Atinuke and illustrated by Kingsley Nebechi, celebrates the talented black people who have helped build Britain. Suitable for children aged 7+, the book explores key and complex historical topics such as the world wars, slavery, the industrial revolution, Windrush and the Black Lives Matter movement.



















Homework Club is available for all students.
