# Mrs Sharp writes: Preparing for the Most Important Days of the Christian Year

As we set aside time to spiritually prepare for Christmas Day, it makes sense to also prepare for the two most significant days of the Christian year: Good Friday and Easter Sunday. Lent offers us a unique opportunity to reflect on our existence and recognise our need for a Saviour. Like Advent, Lent is a time to open the doors of our hearts wider and deepen our understanding of our Lord. This way, when Good Friday and Easter arrive, they are not just another day at church, but a chance to receive the abundant graces God has to offer.

Unlike the childlike joy associated with Advent and the anticipation

of the precious baby Jesus, Lent is a penitential time. It is an opportunity to contemplate the profound sacrifice our Lord made for us on the Cross, enduring anguish and pain. However, Lent does not end in sadness and despair; it points to renewal, the hope of the Resurrection and the promise that every tear will be dried (Revelation 21:3). Christ rose triumphantly from death, becoming the victor over sin, evil, and death forever.

The nature of suffering is complex and does not offer easy explanations or answers. Yet, the answers we seek often make the most sense in light of the Cross. There is nothing in the world that provides such a powerful answer to life's toughest questions as the two pieces of wood on which our

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
Saviour died. Although I was drawn to Christianity in search of joy, it is the Cross that keeps me coming back day after day, year after year. This time of year reminds me of what Jesus did for me. When I look into the eyes of our suffering God, I am in awe. The complexity, love, and humanity of our Lord shine through.

Christ's sacrifice and subsequent resurrection are the two truly decisive points of the Christian faith. Without one, there would be no salvation; without the other, no hope. This is why Good Friday and Easter Sunday are the most important dates on the Christian calendar, even more so than Christmas. This Lent, set aside time to marvel at the omnipotence of God and His encompassing love for humanity and the world. Be encouraged by the fact that the omnipotent Lord God reigns over everything. Approach life with faith and courage.

#### Dear Lord,

Help us set aside time to draw closer to Your heart, that we might know You better and understand You more completely. We pray that we would not only give things up for Lent but that we would give You glory through Lent, Lord. May our actions reflect our hearts, and may we worship You through all that we say and do, now and always.

Amen.




# Pi Day

Pi Day is celebrated on March 14th around the world. Pi (Greek letter "π") is the symbol used in mathematics to represent a constant — the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter — which is approximately 3.14159. Pi Day is an annual opportunity for math enthusiasts to recite the infinite digits of Pi, talk to their friends about math, and eat pie!

Pi has been calculated to over 50 trillion digits beyond its decimal point. As an irrational and transcendental number, it will continue infinitely without repetition or pattern. While only a handful of digits are needed for typical calculations, pi's infinite nature makes it a fun challenge to memorize, and to computationally calculate more and more digits.

### Pi: A Perennial Puzzle

Pi has interested people around the world for over 4,000 years. Many mathematicians – from famous ones such as Fibonacci, Newton, Leibniz, and Gauss, to lesser well-known mathematical minds – have toiled over pi, calculated its digits, and applied it in numerous areas of mathematics. Some spent the better parts of their lives calculating just a few digits. Here is a sampling of the many milestones in the life of pi.



Early decimal approximations for pi were obtained in a number of different ways. For example, in ancient Babylon, rope stretchers marking the locations of buildings and boundaries estimated pi to be 258 = 3.125. The ancient Egyptians determined the ratio to be  $(169)2 \approx 3.16$ . The earliest calculations of pi were largely based on measurement.



Archimedes, a Greek mathematician, was the first to use an algorithmic approach to calculate pi. He drew a polygon inside a circle and drew a second polygon outside of the circle. Then he continuously added more and more sides of both polygons, getting closer and closer to the shape of the circle. Having reached 96-sided polygons, he proved that 22371 < pi < 227.



The Renaissance saw many developments and work on pi, including the creation of the name pi. Until 1647, it didn't have a universal name or symbol. English mathematician William Oughtred began calling it pi in his publication *Clavis Mathematicae*, but it wasn't until Leonhard Euler used the symbol in 1737 that it

became widely embraced. The reason for adopting this particular Greek letter is because it is the first letter of the Greek word, perimetros, which loosely translates to "circumference."



In 1767, Swiss mathematician Johann Heinrich Lambert (above) proved pi is irrational and in 1882 Ferdinand von Lindemann proved pi is transcendental, which means  $\pi$  cannot be a solution to a polynomial equation with rational coefficients. This finding is significant because, until this point, it was believed that one could construct a square and a circle with equal area, known as "squaring the circle". Proving the transcendence of pi showed this is not possible and the phrase "squaring the circle" is now used as a metaphor for trying to do something that is impossible.

With modern technological advances, pi has now been calculated to 31 trillion digits. However, only the first 39 or so are needed to be able to perform all calculations in our observable universe with virtually no error. Though it is news every time the digit record is broken, we can now use technology to explore other aspects of pi.

### **Fun Facts About Pi**

- 1. March 14 or 3/14 is celebrated as pi day because 3.14 are the first digits of pi. Math nerds around the world love celebrating this infinitely long, never-ending number.
- 2. The record for reciting the most number of decimal places of Pi was achieved by Rajveer Meena at VIT University, Vellore, India on 21 March 2015. He was able to recite 70,000 decimal places. To maintain the sanctity of the record, Rajveer wore a blindfold throughout the duration of his recall, which took an astonishing 10 hours! Can't believe it? Well, here is the evidence.
- 3. Pi is actually a part of Egyptian mythology. People in Egypt believed that the pyramids of Giza were built on the principles of pi. The vertical height of the pyramids have the same relationship with the perimeter of their base as the relationship between a circle's radius and its circumference. The pyramids are phenomenal structures and are one of the seven wonders of the world.
- 4. Pi wasn't always known as pi. Before the 1700s, people referred to the number we know as pi as "the quantity which when the diameter is multiplied by it, yields the circumference". Not surprisingly, people got tired of saying so much whenever they wanted to talk about Pi. The Welsh mathematician William Jones, a friend of Sir Isaac Newton, began using the symbol for pi in 1706.
- 5. The calculation of pi is a stress test for a computer. It works just like a digital cardiogram since it indicates the level of activity within the computer's processor.
- 6. Chinese people were far ahead of the West in finding the digits of pi. Why? Chinese mathematicians were ahead in the pi game because of two reasons: they had decimal notations and they had a symbol for the number zero. It wasn't until the late middle ages that European mathematicians started using the number zero.






## Book of the Month - March





Water fountains are available in the Bistro and Orangery for students to use at the beginning of the day and during break and lunchtime.











# Essex County Schools Rugby 7s


