




Please note: the dishwasher in the school kitchen is currently broken.





Year 9 Boys' Rugby

Tuesday the 11th March. 12 rugby hungry Year 9s set off on a mission which left no certainty with its outcome. The prospect of coming away with anything more than a couple of consolation victories appeared, on the surface, to be a worthy prize at the start of the day. However, the Becket Keys Brigade had other ideas.

Stepping foot on the minibus, there was a different feel to this team. A feel that was alien to this bunch, until now. This feeling was of brotherhood, togetherness and determination.

Upon arrival, the boys faced familiar competition where they matched up with rivals Emerson Park in the tournament opener. The match flowed more like a game of tennis as opposed to a rugby match with the constant back and forth of points being scored at both ends of the pitch. Despite the boys' valiant effort, they lost the opener 5-4. This defeat sparked a new energy and desire which banded the boys together. They were determined to better their results regardless of the opposition.

The next game against Plume was the deal breaker. Plume thumped Gosfield 55-10 in their first game which gave the boys the impression they would be fierce opponents. However, with tries from Jude and Rupert in the



early instances, the applecart was upset, and the boys stunned the opposition. Plumes attempted revivals were futile as with every try scored, the boys put the game further out of reach to eventually seal the deal with a 7-3 victory.

Avoiding defeat in the next game against bottom of the group Gosfield would mean we would qualify in the top 2 spaces. The squad rotated and gave the opportunity for some legs to recover. With the boys winning comfortably to seal the game with a 4 try victory, the boys were on to the semi-finals.

Topping the group were rivals Emerson Park who didn't lose a game in the group, so the boys were faced with local competition in Appleton school who won their group undefeated. The game felt like two titans locking heads with neither side really getting a foot in the game until Harrison found

space on 2 occasions to blitz through and put the boys 2-0 up inside the first few minutes. Slight complacency meant the boys let their lead slip where Appleton brought the game closer to 2-2. The boys needed to compete hard in the scrum and secure their plan in case they were unable to better the opposition. Fortunately, the front 3 banded together and overcame the opposing 3, securing the ball and allowing the boys to use their possession to sucker punch Appleton and win the game 5-3.

It would only be fate that we would face Emerson Park in the final. The team that we had not

yet beaten and were still firing on all cylinders. The boys were ragged, battered and bruised but were still up for a fight. The atmosphere around Westcliff Rugby club pitch 3 was reminiscent of Rocky Balboa vs Apollo Creed. Both teams went hammer and tongs with unrelenting force. Franklin was stepping and jigging his way through the midfield. Ethan and Charlie bulldozing their way into rucks and tackles. The two Ollies worked tirelessly to do their bit for the team. 

Book of the Month - March



Set during the American segregation era, this is a spellbinding story of struggle and determination.

Twelve-year old Charley is set on becoming the first female pitcher to play professional baseball, even if that's a lofty dream for a Black girl in the American South in the 1920s. Even so, her grandfather Kofi's thrilling stories about courageous ancestors and epic journeys make it impossible not to dream big. She knows he has so much more to tell, but according to her parents, she isn't old enough to know about certain things, like what happened to Booker Preston that one night in Great Bridge, and why she can never play on the brand-new baseball field on the other side of town. When Charley challenges a neighbourhood bully to a game at the church picnic, she knows she can win. Then a dispute on the field leads to Charley making a fateful decision, one that will bring consequences she never could have imagined.
