### **VE Day Prayer**

#### Victory in Europe Day – A Week of Reflection and Remembrance

Mr Scott-Evans writes.....

This week, our school community has come together to honour the 8oth anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day, a moment in history that marked the end of World War II in Europe on 8 May 1945. Through special tutorials, moments of silence, and a shared prayer, our students have reflected on the courage, sacrifice, and resilience of those who lived through the war and those who gave their lives for peace.

In tutorials this week, students paused to say the following prayer together:

"The Lord gives strength to his people; the Lord blesses his people with peace." (Psalm 29:11)

Gracious God,

On this day of remembrance, we give thanks for the end of war in Europe in 1945.

We remember with gratitude those who gave so much: the courage of the soldiers, the resilience of the civilians, the sacrifice of many who did not return.

We give thanks for peace, hardwon, longed-for, and for the hope that rose from the ashes of destruction.

As we mark this significant anniversary, we are reminded of the words of Sir Winston Churchill, who declared in his VE Day speech in 1945:



"We may allow ourselves a brief period of rejoicing; but let us not forget for a moment the toil and efforts that lie ahead."

This message still resonates today. It reminds us that peace is not simply the absence of war, but the presence of justice, compassion, and unity. These are values our school community is known for.

In a moving <u>speech</u> delivered this week at Westminster Abbey, King Charles III echoed the legacy of his grandfather, King George VI, and quoted Churchill calling on us all to continue the work of peace:

"We should remind ourselves of the words of our great wartime leader, Sir Winston Churchill, who said 'meeting jaw to jaw is better than war'. In so doing, we should also rededicate ourselves not only to the cause of freedom but to renewing global commitments to restoring a just peace where there is war, to diplomacy, and to the prevention of conflict.

"For as my grandfather put it, 'We shall have failed, and the blood of our dearest will have flowed in vain, if the victory which they died to win does not lead to a lasting peace, founded on justice and established in good will."

As Head Teacher, I am proud of the thoughtful and respectful way our students have engaged with this week's commemorations. It is clear that they understand the importance of remembering the past — not just as a history lesson, but as a guide for how we live today.

Let us continue to be peacemakers in our school, our homes, and our town.



## **Celebrating Kaylin** Nachwa Muwenda's Triumph at the Jack **Petchey Speak Out Regional Finals!**

We are thrilled to announce that Kaylin has achieved an outstanding victory at the Jack Petchey Speak Out regional finals! Competing against students from various schools in the region, Kaylin's remarkable performance earned her the firstplace title!



Kaylin captivated the audience with her confidence, energy, and eloquence. Her speech was not only intriguing and funny but also left everyone with an inspirational message on regrets. Her ability to connect with the audience and deliver such a powerful message is truly commendable.

The Jack Petchey Speak Out Challenge is a public speaking competition designed to help young people develop their communication skills and



confidence. Over 30,000 young people participate in the Speak Out Challenge each year.

Here's how it works:

Workshop: It all begins with an expert-led, interactive workshop. During this workshop, students learn the fundamentals of public speaking and create their own speeches from scratch. They then deliver these speeches to their classmates and a small panel of judges, usually consisting of teachers.

**Assembly Final**: Selected students from the workshop move on to the Assembly Final at their school. Here, they perform their speeches again to a larger audience of teachers and students, practising for the next stage.

Regional Final: Winners from the Assembly Finals represent their schools at the Regional Final. This event is held live, and family, friends, and teachers gather to support the speakers. A panel of local dignitaries judges the performances, and one speaker is chosen to advance to the Semi-Final.

Semi-Final: At the Semi-Final, all regional winners present their speeches to a panel of judges. The judges narrow down the competitors to just 15 speakers who will move on to the Grand Final

Grand Final: The Grand Final is a major event held on a West End stage in London. The 15 finalists deliver their speeches to an audience of over 1,000 supporters, including MPs, Mayors, influencers, dignitaries, and an esteemed panel of judges. One speaker is crowned the 'Grand Champion'.

As the regional champion, Kaylin will now advance to the next stage of the competition, where she will face other regional finalists. We are incredibly proud of her achievement and wish her the best of luck in the upcoming finals.

Let's all join in celebrating Kaylin's success and supporting her as she continues to shine!

## **British Council Chinese Speaking Competition**

# Excellent Result for Becket Keys!

The Chinese Bridge Secondary
Speaking Competition for UK
schools, organised by the British
Council and the Centre for
Language Education and
Cooperation, UK, commenced in
March. It is the biggest national
competition in Chinese speaking.



The aim of this event is to provide a stage for young Chinese learners in the UK to demonstrate their Chinese language proficiencies and to enhance their motivation for Mandarin learning.

The event allows non-native Chinese learners who have studied Mandarin Chinese between one to seven years to participate. Participants are evaluated on their listening, speaking and reading skills, as well as Chinese cultural awareness.

Ten of our Mandarin Excellence Programme students entered the competition, and six of them were through to the final. They spent a lot of time in preparation



for this competition. I was extremely pleased with their enthusiasm and determination demonstrated throughout the competition. To me, they are all winners!

On Friday, 2<sup>nd</sup> of May, I took our students to London SOAS for the final competition. This year's competition was particularly intense, with the majority of finalists coming from private and grammar schools. Despite the tough competition, our students performed exceptionally well and achieved outstanding results:



#### Why is she coming to Becket Keys?


- PC Ryan wants to get to know you to find out if you have any worries or concerns in Brentwood.
