Student Achievement – Ben Shelton Year 13

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award (DofE) is a youth achievement award that encourages young people to challenge themselves and develop new skills. It is available at three levels: (Bronze, Silver, and Gold), each with increasing commitment and difficulty.

Ben Shelton has been going through this programme and tells us about his experience here, including a recent visit to Buckingham Palace!

Ben writes: The Duke of Edinburgh Award can be started from age 14 with the Bronze Award, 15 with the Silver Award and 16 with the Gold Award. You can start at any of the awards (age appropriate) however, as the awards progress they are more challenging therefore personally I would recommend moving through all stages.

There are 4 sections to complete for bronze and silver and 5 for the gold award. All of them resulting in an expedition as part of the stage.

For the Bronze and Silver Award, I achieved this with Essex Youth Group based at the Hermit Club in Brentwood. However, for the Gold Award I was a member of my local air cadets and completed this with them. Some local Scout groups and other uniformed organisations offer the Duke of Edinburgh scheme too.

As part of my Gold Award for the physical element my goal was to complete a half marathon. I trained for this for 12 months and, in 2024, participated in the Brentwood half marathon achieving a time of 1 hour 50 minutes.

For the skills section I learnt guitar and obtained a grade 5 music grade for electric guitar.

For the volunteering section, I helped my local church and community with regular events.

For my residential which is only required for the Gold Award, this was achieved with Becket Keys help by assisting with a school residential trip.

During my time completing all of the different levels I made lots of friends, learned life skills and faced a lot of challenges.

Computer Science Department

National Coding Competition Results

Before Easter, 19 students from Year 7-Year 11 took part in a national coding competition run by the Raspberry Pi Foundation at Cambridge University. This is the first year the competition, has run in this format, previously running under the title Oxford University Computing Challenge (OUCC).

Like the OUCC, the competition was open to students who scored in the top 10% of the country in the Bebras computational thinking competition which ran near the beginning of the school year. For this competition, students were entered into one of four categories: Novices, Explorers, Navigators and Pathfinders.



Students had 45 minutes to come up with coded solution for 10 different challenges. Of those that participated, ten students achieved scores that put them in the top 10% of the country for their category (indicated in gold) and of those, five students achieved a perfect score of 48 points.

Summer Reading Challenge Volunteering

Are you age 14 or over? Are you looking for something to do during the summer holidays? Why not become a Summer Reading Challenge Volunteer?

What is the role about?

The Summer Reading Challenge is a national programme that runs during the school summer holiday. Children of all ages are encouraged to read six library books. All children taking part receive a certificate and a medal when they complete the challenge. You will be working with children and their parents or carers, encouraging them to join the challenge and talking to them about the books they have been reading.

What will it involve?

Duties include:

Talking with children about the books they have been reading and encouraging them to share their views and ideas

Handing out reading rewards including stickers and medals

Helping children to have fun and enjoy the Summer Reading Challenge

Encouraging children to read for pleasure

Assisting with administration, eg membership, filing and assisting



with other library duties when time allows

What will you get from volunteering?

Valuable work experience and new skills, good for the CV

Confidence in talking to children and adults and the chance to meet new people.

Pleasure of encouraging children to enjoy reading and the opportunity to make a positive contribution to the community.

What skills and experience do you need?

A good team worker, able to work with library staff and other volunteers and be reliable, well organised and calm under pressure.

Be friendly and approachable an be enthusiastic about encouraging children to read and to be able to communicate with customers of all ages including parents.

How much time would you be asked to contribute?

To be agreed, but a minimum of 18 hours (approximately 6

sessions of 3 hours each). You are welcome to complete more hours, and it may also be possible to volunteer for the Summer Reading Challenge at other libraries, by arrangement with the relevant libraries.

What training and support will you receive?

Your placement library will invite you to a training session where you'll be given a tour of the library and the opportunity to meet library staff. We will send you a number of email updates during the summer with information about your role, details about the Summer Reading Challenge and links to training and resources. There will also be ongoing support from local library staff.


How do you apply?


The closing date is **Sunday 22 June.**


