My name is Claire, and I am very honoured to have been invited back to the school to present you with your awards this evening. It is such a privilege to be back here at Becket Keys. It is very surreal to return to a place that shaped me so much and see you students sitting where I once sat. I joined Becket Keys in 2012 as a member of the founding cohort.



This was such a unique experience, as we had no older students to look up to, as we were the oldest from the start. However, this was also very exciting as it meant that we had the opportunity to create something brand new and shape the school's culture, traditions, and identity from the beginning

And to see the school as it is now, thriving and full of life, is incredibly special, knowing I played a small part in laying those foundations. Especially when I think back to the early days, when there was so much pushback. People questioned whether Brentwood needed another school. But this room, right here, is proof that it did.

Becket Keys has not only grownit has flourished. That didn't happen by accident. It was the resilience and unwavering faith of Mr Scott-Evans, the Governors, the Teachers, and the parents that brought this vision to life. Their dedication gave us a place where we could truly thrive. And I am so proud to say that I went to Becket Keys. My time here helped me discover a lot about myself- it was the perfect environment to grow, to be challenged, and to learn who I was as an individual. Lessons learned: I remember stepping into Year 7 not knowing what to expect. Then leaving the School as Head Girl, with many memories in between.





That journey taught me so much about growth, faith and leadership. One of the things I loved most about my time at Becket Keys was how much I got to try. In my time, I signed up for the school council, was elected as Captain of Ennis and Whitehead, played on most of the sports teams, set sports day records, sang in the talent show, and even performed in the theatre shows just for the fun of it.







I found a passion for sport, acting and music that I didn't know I had. And one of my favourite memories was the Ski trip to America. I had never skied before- it was completely new to me- and I absolutely loved it.



That experience really taught me the power of saying yes to new things. That is the message I want to share with you tonight: school is the best place to experiment. You're in a space filled with support- amazing teachers who genuinely want to see you succeed and a wealth of resources at your fingertips. So use this time to try things and experiment. When you leave school and step into the adult world, the safety net starts to get thinner. You will still have support, of course, but it won't be as unwavering and constant. That is why now is your time. Say yes, throw yourself in, and discover what lights you up.



Since leaving Becket Keys:

After Becket Keys, I went on to university and studied Philosophy, and I found myself really drawn to it. I graduated with a first-class honours, and I truly believe that's because I enjoyed what I was studying. When you're passionate about something, it doesn't feel like a chore- it becomes something you want to give your time to.

And now, I'm living my dream as



cabin crew for British Airwaystraveling the world, engaging with different people and cultures, and seeing some of the most incredible sights on the planet. I've fed giraffes in Kenya, paraglided in Cape Town, and stood in front of the Pyramids in Egypt- places I never imagined I'd go.





But I want to be honest: leaving school was overwhelming. You're suddenly expected to have it all figured out. And that can feel like

a lot. But because I tried so many things whilst I was at school, I had a clearer idea of what I actually liked- and just as importantly, what I didn't. That made those big decisions a little easier. What I wish I had done differently: If I could go back and tell my younger self one thing, it would be this: don't worry so much about getting things wrong. When you're in school, it can feel like every test, every friendship, every choice is huge. But it's not. You don't have to be perfect. You're here to learn, and learning includes making mistakes. So, take full advantage of what Becket Keys offers you. Ask questions. Try that sport. Learn that language. Get involved. Let your teachers help you. And have faith in yourself.

To me, faith in learning means believing that effort pays off, even when you can't see it straight away. It means trusting your teachers, putting your time into what matters, and having the courage to try even if you might not succeed. And most importantly, it means believing in yourself, you will discover what's meant for you if you give yourself the space to grow. To all of you here tonight, especially those receiving awards - well done. You're already showing that faith in learning leads to amazing things. And for everyone else keep going. Stay curious. Be brave! And most of all, enjoy this incredible time in your life.

On 10th July 2025 students from Year 9 will hear testimony from Holocaust survivor, Tom Keve as part of a visit organised by the Holocaust Educational Trust (HET).

The testimony will be followed by a question and answer session to enable students to better understand the nature of the Holocaust and to explore its lessons in more depth. The visit is part of the Holocaust Educational Trust's extensive all year-round Outreach Programme, which is available to schools across the UK.

Mr Bay (Head of History) has said:



A Memorable Day at Westminster with Team Global

On a recent enrichment trip, I had the pleasure of accompanying ten enthusiastic Year 12 students to Westminster as part of the **Team Global** programme—an initiative designed to broaden students' understanding of politics, law, and global affairs.

Our day began with a fascinating visit to the **UK Supreme Court**, where students were given a guided tour of the historic building. They had the unique opportunity to engage in a mock debate based on a real-life case,





allowing them to step into the shoes of legal professionals and critically examine judicial reasoning. We were also fortunate enough to sit in on a live trial, offering students a rare glimpse into the workings of the highest court in the land.

Next, we headed to the Institute of Economic Affairs (IEA), a leading think tank focused on economic and social policy. Here, students took part in an engaging seminar where they explored the role of think tanks in shaping public policy. A particular highlight was the discussion on the UK housing crisis, which sparked thoughtful questions and debate among our students.

The highlight of the day, however, was undoubtedly Afternoon Tea at the House of Lords with The Baroness Benjamin of Beckenham. The students were captivated by her inspiring words about public service and perseverance. Sharing tea in such a prestigious setting was a truly unforgettable experience for all involved.



To round off the day, we were treated to a guided tour of the Palace of Westminster, where students explored the rich history and architecture of the UK Parliament. We were lucky enough to sit in the public galleries of both the House of Commons and the House of **Lords**. In the Lords, students observed a live debate during the second reading of a bill on housing and infrastructure, witnessing democracy in action as three peers discussed the future of national development.



This trip was not only educational but also deeply inspiring. It offered our students a unique insight into the institutions that shape our society and encouraged them to think critically about their roles as future leaders and citizens.



If anyone forgets a bottle or doesn't have one, they can request a second-hand bottle from Main Reception.



The Foodbank Network was founded in 2004 in Salisbury, since then The Trussell Trust has helped communities work together to launch foodbanks nationwide in a wide range of towns and cities.

In 2023/24, food banks in the Trussell Trust's network provided 3,121,404 three-day emergency food supplies and support to UK people in crisis. Of these, 1,144,096 were distributed for children.



The average person in Britain has up to £26.99 in loose change or forgotten cash lying around their house, equating to a national total of more than £760 million that could be donated, according to research by Greene King.



25 YEARS OF MAKING POSITIVE CHANGE_

Twenty-five years ago The Diana Award was founded on the belief that young people have the power to change the world, and for the last 25 years, we have been working with them to do just that.

Over the last three years, over **3800 young people** have participated in our Online Careers Fair project. The project improved their transferrable careers skills, knowledge of routes to education, employment and training, and confidence.



Player of the Match - Henry for his 3 wickets and 26 runs.


