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Bearing Fruit That Will Last: Oscar Smith's Quiet Leadership in Action

"You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit—fruit that will last... This is my command: Love each other."

John 15:16-17

At Becket Keys Church of England School, we speak often about our Christian mission: to nurture young people who live lives of purpose, service, and love. This week, we were reminded of what that looks like in practice through the actions of one of our Sixth Form students, Oscar Smith.

On Tuesday evening, Oscar was present at the scene of a serious motorbike accident on Weald Road. As a trained and experienced cadet, Oscar did not hesitate. He calmly stepped forward, assessed the situation, and began to offer support not only to the injured person, but also to the bystanders who had stopped to help.

Oscar's response was measured and mature. He introduced himself, checked the casualty's condition, and gave clear, confident instructions to those around him. He directed cars to block the road for safety, ensured the casualty's head and neck were supported, and maintained calm communication with the emergency services. When his first aid kit arrived, he put on his

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gloves and applied bandages with skill and composure, continuing to reassure everyone present.

What stands out is not just Oscar's technical ability (though that was clearly evident) but the way he carried himself throughout. He remained calm, compassionate, and focused, offering reassurance and leadership in a moment of real uncertainty. Witnesses described him as "inspiring" and "a credit to his school," and even the police recognised the value of his contribution, asking him to continue supporting the scene until the paramedics arrived to take over.



Oscar's actions were not about heroics or recognition. They were the natural expression of someone who has taken their training seriously and who lives by a deep sense of responsibility to others. In that moment, he



lived out the words of Jesus in John 15: bearing fruit that will last, and showing love not just in thought or word, but in action.

We are proud of Oscar not because he did something unexpected, but because he did exactly what we know he is capable of. His quiet leadership, his care for others, and his willingness to serve are qualities we see in him every day at school. This incident simply gave others the opportunity to see them too.

Oscar reminds us all that faith is not just something we speak about, but it is something we live.

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We give thanks for his presence in our community and for the example he has set us all.





Year 9 Hear Holocaust Survivor Testimony from Tom Keve

As part of Enrichment Day on 10th July, Year 9 had the privilege of attending a Holocaust Survivor Testimony event held in Runcie Hall. The session was led by Tom Keve, who shared the moving story of his family's experiences living in Nazi-occupied Hungary during the Second World War.

Tom spoke about the hardships his family faced, the dangers they lived through, and the lasting impact those events had on their lives. His story gave students a powerful, first-hand insight into the realities of the Holocaust — something that is difficult to fully understand through books alone.

Our students listened with great respect and showed real empathy
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throughout the talk. It was a powerful reminder of the importance of remembering the past and learning from it.



Enrichment Day offered a valuable opportunity to learn beyond the classroom, and this session will no doubt stay with our students for a long time.

Mathematics Department - The Jellyblubber Colony



the real-world collecting data is time-consuming and expensive. Consequently, it is not generally good practice to collect data from an entire group of interest (known as the population), which may be people, animals or even an unknown form of jellyfish.

In an activity dealing with data analysis, students were introduced to a new species of jellyfish that has been found off the Sussex coast and nicknamed, 'jellyblubbers' by local people. It is impossible to count how many 'jellyblubbers' are present, but some data has been collected and is ready to be analysed.... this begs the question: 'On average, how big is a jellyblubber?"

This problem gave the students a backdrop to how sampling can be used to draw conclusions about a much larger population.

As we approach the final days of the school year, Science Club wrapped things up with a bang, celebrating the annual 2024–2025 Science Club Awards!


Throughout the year, our budding scientists tackled all sorts of challenges with curiosity, creativity, and collaboration.




If anyone forgets a bottle or doesn't have one, they can request a second-hand bottle from Main Reception.

The fielding star was Teddy Stevens who was able to take 4 wickets and take two catches which set his bar high for the season ahead. With the bat, the star was Max Massarella who very quickly racked up 25 runs to see himself retired.

The second game was at home to Great Baddow who often have a lot of sporting prowess. For the second time we lost the toss and the visitors also told us to pad up and set a target - and set a target we did! 153 runs later and multiple boundaries we found ourselves confidently bowling. Having set such a high target, we knew limiting Baddow to singles was enough and we didn't need to risk any overthrows through sloppy fielding. The star performers were both Sam Turner and Sam Anderson as they took 3 wickets each in quick succession.



Game three was back on the road to Burnham-on-Crouch, an away fixture that requires a strong mindset because an hour on the coach can often lead to poor decision making. We racked up a staggering 169 runs and Max picked up our first SIX! Henry was the fielder of the day as he took 3 wickets and even had a look as his hattrick!

Division final – We faced Anglo in the final away at theirs to see who would be crowned the division champions. I was unable to dwindle down my squad, so we
