Chess is a two-player strategy board game where the goal is to checkmate the opponent's king by threatening it with inescapable capture. Played on an 8x8 grid with 16 unique pieces for each player (king, queen, two rooks, two bishops, two knights, and eight pawns), players move their pieces according to their specific rules to capture enemy pieces and achieve checkmate.


Lee Raven – Boy Thief Zizou Corder

You can find this book in the school library.




Five Hundred Miles Kevin Brooks





Robinson Crusoe Daniel Defoe

Who has not dreamed of life on an exotic isle, far away from civilization?

Here is the novel which has inspired countless imitations by lesser writers, none of which equal the power and originality of Defoe's famous book. Robinson Crusoe, set ashore on an island after a terrible storm at sea, is forced to make do with only a knife, some tobacco, and a pipe.

He learns how to build a canoe, make bread, and endure endless solitude. That is, until, twenty-four years later, when he confronts another human being.

This book has become one of the most widely published books in history and has been adapted for versions in film, television and radio. It has also been the subject of plays, opera, cartoons and even computer games!

Previously Looked After Children



If your child has previously been in the care of a Local Authority in England or Wales and has an adoption, Special Guardianship or Child Arrangements Order, they are entitled to extra support through Pupil Premium Plus funding. Currently, the amount is £2,630 per student and it must be spent to improve outcomes for previously looked after children. It is important to note that the funding is not ring-fenced for the individual child, which allows the school flexibility to ensure it has maximum impact. As the parent or carer, you must declare your child's status and provide evidence of the legal order to us in order for us to claim the funding. You and your child are also entitled to support from our Designated Teacher (Mrs Claire Dowsett), and from the Essex Virtual School. If you wish to have a conversation about your child, we will treat the information with the strictest confidence. They had the unique opportunity to experience a range of cultural activities, including visiting a local Beijing international school to interact with Chinese students, practising their Chinese while shopping at Temple of Heaven Market, and exploring Beijing's famous landmarks.

Students' reflection

Visiting China will probably be an adventure I remember for the rest of my life. It was full of everything that I was not used to, and it showed me the difference in culture and style. After the school confirmed our trip to Beijing, anticipation was in the air. We left on the 1st of July and made our (long) journey from Heathrow Airport to Beijing. After around 10 hours, we arrived at our destination! The second we left the airport, it really struck me that we were in another country: the air was humid, the sky leaking raindrops the size of ping pong balls. We walked outside, staring at the unique, gravity-defying architecture in awe.

It was around 3 in the afternoon on the 2nd of July, and we embarked

on the two-hour sleepy coach journey to the Leafin Hotel. The excellent hotel had spacious rooms that provided the perfect place to recuperate after a long day of lessons and sightseeing. After the first night, we woke up and made the trip to Beijing Language and Culture University (BLCU). Our teacher, Ms Zhang from BLCU, taught us for the entirety of our stay. While we were in China, we learnt lots of new vocab, and I know that my studies benefited from it greatly along with the other 13 students who came.

I want to say thank you very much to the three teachers (Mrs Martin, Ms Zhang, and Miss Tian) who came with us and gave up their time to give us the most enjoyable experience possible. They were very patient and helpful inside and outside of the classroom. During our stay at the university, we had multiple culture lessons including those stories on the first day. We had lunch, followed by learning about Chinese songs and dancing with Taichi fans. That evening, we had the opening ceremony, where news teams recorded the event,

and different people gave speeches, including Bhav from our school. The whole event showed me how welcoming Chinese people are.



The ceremony was followed by a large welcome dinner with dishes you wouldn't see on your average Chinese takeaway order. I think that the cabbage or sweet and sour chicken was my favourite, but there was a lot of variety in types of dishes, such as noodles and shrimp, potato and mushroom, and cold chips.

On the 4th of July, we had morning lessons and then papercutting, Chinese calligraphy, and mask painting in the afternoon. All these classes were taught by professionals who took care, time, and dedication to refining our technique and only encouraged us

to carry on when we butchered their graceful art with our less than excellent attempts. But in the end, we had mastered the basics, and that was quite an accomplishment.

After dinner, we went to the sports circuit and learnt some Chinese square dancing with our Chinese peers. This was also covered by the news, and Harry and Helet were in an interview with them. On our third full day, we had some extremely jam-packed lessons followed by some cultural lessons including a tea ceremony, painting Chinese flowers, and crafting some intricate knots. The whole day was very educational and opened my eyes to how dependent China is on its rituals.

Our excursion day! We were visiting the Great Wall, before heading to a restaurant nearby for some local food. The Great Wall was very impressive, and the history behind it stretched centuries. The views spanned miles over frosty mountains that looked spectacular. After lunch, we saw some elegant Chinese acrobatics and then had dinner near the Olympic Bird's Nest Stadium. This was our first real opportunity to explore China in groups; we took this chance to speak to locals and take photos while we made lifelong memories!

Over the next few days, we did many things, including visiting one of the most high-end private schools. It was an excellent insight into the Chinese school system. Later in the week, we also visited a panda zoo, the Forbidden City, Wangfujing Street, and other central shopping streets.

All in all, we really enjoyed our 10-day visit to China and will remember it for a lifetime. The closing ceremony was spectacular, and the effort that was put into planning this trip was greatly appreciated on all fronts. I hope that if others get to go, they will enjoy it as much as we did!

The climb to the top of the wall was hard work, but the hard work paid off as the view from the top of the wall was so majestic. We did not walk back down but instead took a slide back down, which was so fun, and we could control the speed so we could go really fast or slow. Afterwards we went to a restaurant for lunch and then watched a circus performance. The performances were entertaining to watch. We then went to visit the

Olympic stadium, but we were not allowed to go inside, so we all went to the different shops around it and got some food from the trucks.



There were other days where we would go to shopping malls in China. We all learned how to haggle, and we all haggled lots of items down to their real prices. It was a wonderful experience to see the shopping malls, and they were so big compared to the ones we have in England. Also, we went to the street markets, and there were lots of roads full of shops or markets. Everywhere you went, there were people asking you to see their shop. I bought lots of souvenirs to share some of my experience in China with my family.

Finally, the food. The food in the restaurants that we went to needed some getting used to, but it










At Becket Keys, we look to ensure that we are preparing students for life beyond school. We encourage students to attend school regularly and on time.


Remember that the school gate closes at **8.25am**. This allows students enough time to be at their first lesson on time. Period 1 begins at 8.30am.


Brentwood can be tough to negotiate during rush hour, so we encourage students and parents to contact the school in the case of *genuine* lateness, such as delayed public transport.




