

One such figure is St Martin de Porres, the patron saint of social justice. Despite facing racial discrimination in 16th-century Peru, he devoted his life to caring for the sick and poor, embodying the belief that every person is made in the image of God. He founded hospitals and orphanages and worked tirelessly for those on the margins of society. Canonised in 1962 by Pope John XXIII, Martin is honoured as the patron saint of social justice, racial harmony, and mixed-race people.

#### Scripture reminds us:

"There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus."

Galatians 3:28



May this inspire us all students, staff, and families to continue building a school where everyone is welcomed, valued, and empowered to flourish. # KS<sub>3</sub> Science Club with Mr Achillea


Science Club is after school every Monday and any student in Year 7-9 is welcome to join Mr Achillea in W21 for a chance to improve their Science skills and take part in additional practical experiments.


Mr Achillea shares.....

Our budding scientists have had a busy and exciting term in Science Club! They kicked off the year by investigating the chemistry hidden inside everyday fizzy drinks. Students explored the acidity of various cola brands and how they react with metal carbonates like limestone (calcium carbonate).

Before diving into the experiments, they learned essential lab techniques including using activated charcoal to remove colour and carefully filtering their samples to produce a clear solution ready for testing.

As we wrap up the term, Science Club students got creative with a hands-on project that turned everyday materials into something extraordinary. By mixing milk and vinegar, they produced bioplastic which is a natural plastic made from milk proteins. After separating the curds from the whey, students pressed the curds into moulds

and left them to set overnight. The next day, they unveiled their very own bioplastic keyring fobs.

One student shared: I really enjoy coming to this club as we get an opportunity to make different things.




## **Mandarin Department**

The Mid–Autumn Festival, also known as Moon Festival or Mooncake Festival, is a traditional festival celebrated in China. It is the second-most important holiday after the Chinese New Year with a history dating back 3,000 years.

The Mid-Autumn is on 15th August lunar month each year. This year it was on 15th of October. On this day, the Chinese believe that the moon is at its brightest and fullest size, coinciding with harvest time in the middle of Autumn.



In our Mandarin lessons with Year 7,8 and 9 MEP classes, Miss Tian and Mrs Zhang shared the legendary story of the Mid-Autumn Festival and explained to the students that Chinese families normally get together on this day to have a feast, followed by moongazing and eating the festival snack, mooncakes, a rich pastry typically filled with sweetbean or lotus-seed paste or other savoury filling. The round shape of the mooncake symbolises the full moon and the family reunion.



Our Year 7, 8 and 9 Mandarin Excellence Programme students were given the task to design a poster about the traditional Chinese festival for the poster competition. The work submitted showed the students had done lots of research into the festival. We are amazed by the high standard of the work that our students produced! The posters are not only informative, but also visually appealing, and they showcase the artistic skills our students have.








Chess Club is open to all, beginners and experienced players are very welcome. Every Tuesday lunchtime in Library B.
