Remembrance Service at Becket Keys – A Moment of Reflection and Unity

As we approach Remembrance Day, our school community has been deeply engaged in preparing for our annual service, which will take place on Tuesday 11th November. This week, students have been reflecting on the meaning of remembrance through collective worship, discussions in tutor time, and thoughtful activities designed to help them understand the significance of this national moment.

We've been incredibly proud of how maturely and respectfully our students have responded. From exploring the symbolism of the poppy to considering the impact of conflict both past and present, they have shown great empathy and insight. Their engagement with the prayers, scripture, and historical context has been truly moving.

The service itself will be held outdoors, with the whole school gathered around the edge of the playground. Students will stand with their forms, wearing poppies and holding an order of service.

We will hear readings from Joshua (Head Boy) and Anna-Kaye (Head Girl), listen to the solemn notes of *The Last Post*, and observe a two-minute silence marked by the sound of the gun from the Brentwood War Memorial. Canon Darren Barlow will be joining us to offer a

Geography Department - Y13 Residential Blencathra



The A-Level Geographers have recently returned from the Lake District National park and the fabulous Blencathra mountain and field studies centre.

The annual Year 13 field trip is a chance for the students to witness firsthand the geography and splendour of the Fells whilst collecting their primary data for their NEA (Non-examined assessment). This piece of work accounts for 20% of our overall A-Level Geography grade and is a great stepping stone towards their next steps after Becket Keys. The students practise and apply a range of skills and presentation techniques in producing a 4,500+ word project on a topic of their choice.

As part of the fieldtrip the students enjoyed visiting and exploring: the human geography of Keswick, climbed Cat Bells, saw Scotland across the Soloway Firth, studied sand dunes and the heavily managed coastal settlement of Siloth. We were blessed with the weather and had a jolly good time as well as making new friends and learning new things. Thank you to all those involved and the staff who made this fieldtrip possible and a memorable experience.

Enrichment Day – November 2025




School Uniform


It is important to all of us that every one of the students who attend Becket Keys looks smart in their uniform at all times. All students are required to wear shoes and not trainers.


