Reflect on these questions:


- Who are the people you love most?

Thursday 18th December is a half day for students. They will be leaving school at 12.40pm. There is no lunch service on that day, however the usual offerings will be available at break time.





These books have since been enjoyed by our students who have been discovering the 'gifts' in their form room book swaps and the school library.

If you did not encounter it last Christmas, below is everything you need to know to get involved.

We all know that as avid readers, we can end up with too many books to store. I know that my own bookcase can end up overflowing, and it becomes difficult to even see what I have. Then, for Christmas I often receive new books, and there is nowhere for them to go. Like most people, many books will only be read once, and then they sit gathering dust. The 13th Gift Joanne Huist Smith

This is a heartwarming Christmas story about how a random act of kindness transformed one of the bleakest moments in a family's history into a time of strength and love.


After the unexpected death of her husband, Joanne Huist Smith had no idea how she would keep herself together and be strong for her three children, especially with the holiday season approaching. But 12 days before Christmas, presents begin appearing on her doorstep with notes from their "True Friends." As the Smiths came together to solve the mystery of who the gifts were from, they began to thaw out from their grief and come together again as a family. This true story about the power of random acts of kindness will warm the heart, a beautiful reminder of the miracles of Christmas and the gift of family during the holiday season.

The Man Who Invented Christmas Les Staniford

As uplifting as the tale of Scrooge itself, this is the story of how Charles Dickens impacted the Christmas holiday in the Western world. It is now a major motion picture.


Just before Christmas in 1843, a debt-ridden and dispirited Charles Dickens wrote a small book he hoped would keep his creditors at bay. His publisher turned it down, so Dickens used what little money he had to put out *A Christmas Carol* himself. He worried it might be the end of his career as a novelist.

The book immediately caused a sensation. And it breathed new life into a holiday that had fallen into disfavour, undermined by lingering Puritanism and the cold modernity of the Industrial Revolution. It was a harsh and dreary age, in desperate need of spiritual renewal, ready to embrace a book that ended with blessings for one and all.


Christmas Day in the Morning Pearl S. Buck

The Nutcracker Alexandre Dumas







Your writing can take any form you would like. This is an opportunity to be as creative as you like.


A memento must feature somewhere in your writing. It should be the item which sparks the idea for your writing.


A memento is an object kept as a reminder of a person or event.



Complete our survey

Over the past year, Essex County Council been working closely with the local community on Sawyers Hall Lane to make the streets around local schools safer. Based on our feedback, they have:

- Installed a new pedestrian guardrail to improve safety.
- Installed a new raised table to slow down traffic on one section of the road.
- Made the footway widening permanent and added pencilshaped bollards.
- Added safer tactile crossing points.
- Cleared overgrown vegetation.
- Recruited a new School Safety enforcement officer to address safety concerns. The officer encourages any driver who parks illegally or inconsiderately to be cautious and considerate and offers information on alternative ways for parents/carers to get to and from school, where practicable. They have the powers to enforce if necessary.
- Promoted the three "park and stride" sites at William
 Hunter Way car park, Chatham Way car park and
 Doddinghurst Community Church, encouraging parents and
 carers not to park on the streets immediately surrounding
 the schools.

We would now like to hear from you about these changes. We also want to understand more about how you travel day-to-day.
