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Mr Scott-Evans writes.....

Writing, Thinking and Learning in an Age of AI

"Apply your heart to instruction and your ears to words of knowledge." Proverbs 23:12
We are living through a remarkable moment in education. In my 29 years of teaching, I have never known anything like this. Artificial intelligence and smart phones are changing how students learn, revise and complete homework at extraordinary speed. Moreover, they are changing their lives and their brains. These tools can be powerful, inclusive and time-saving but they are also dangerous and we need to explore this whole area thoughtfully.

Mrs Dowsett, showed me a recent article by [Alex Quigley \(January 2026\)](#). It has prompted an important question for schools, families and students alike: what might we lose if learning becomes entirely digital and automated? I'd like to follow this up today and next week.

Quigley reminds us that handwriting is not simply a traditional skill that a few archaic teachers like me are clinging to out of habit or nostalgia. Writing by hand is in itself an important form of thinking. The physical act of holding a pen, forming letters, annotating a text, sketching a diagram or jotting down notes engages the brain in ways that deepen understanding and strengthen memory particularly for young people who are still developing as learners.

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
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Book of the Month

A new book for a new month. Another excellent recommendation for February.

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This week, I re-read the book 'How to be Here' by Rob Bell. In his book, Bell talks about the importance to him (as a creative writer) of good quality paper, pens and a desk to work at. These are the tools of his trade, and he says that they are worth the investment. My son has been asking for a new top to his desk because he wants a good space to write at. Having spent hundreds of pounds on a laptop for him, why would I begrudge him £15 for a new desk top? Parents: are you equipping your son/daughter with high quality pens, notebooks and a space to write in? Students: are you looking after your stationery and respecting the role it plays in your learning? Are we investing in the tools we need for success?

Research consistently shows that:

1. handwriting supports spelling and vocabulary development;

2. note-taking by hand improves comprehension and recall;
3. drawing and annotating help students organise and remember ideas.

This is sometimes described as embodied learning (learning that involves the body as well as the mind). Musicians and athletes understand this; it applies just as much in any classroom. Writing is not an optional extra: writing is thinking.

None of this is me or Quigley making an argument against technology or AI. Although, I am tempted to suggest we switch off the internet and go back to the halcyon days of 1988! Used well, digital tools can support learning, remove barriers and extend thinking. Quigley's key insight is that technology should support thinking, not replace it. When students receive summaries rather than make notes, or rely on AI before grappling with ideas themselves, learning can become shallow even if it feels efficient. This is a warning to the teaching profession and to parents and students. How are we using AI? Is there a danger that we are not thinking for ourselves anymore?

As a school community, this matters for all of us:

- for all students who need to improve their handwriting to be neat, legible, and efficient to produce;

- for students revising for exams;
- for teachers choosing how and when to use technology;
- for families supporting learning at home.

We need balance and wisdom. We want students to be confident users of modern technology and strong, thoughtful learners who can slow down, reflect, and engage deeply.




In a fast, digital world, the simple act of writing something down may be one of the most powerful learning tools we still have.


